

Will Drill in Today. The Associated Oil company will drill its well on the Snyder land, about five miles west of Moran, in today. The well is about a mile and a half north of the Callahan county line and is said to have a showing of oil and gas. It has been capped awaiting some connections from Cisco.

New Town, Leeroy, Booming. The new town of Leeroy, which is being started on the boundary line between Eastland and Stephens counties, is taking a steady boom, according to reports from all sources. There are about 100 rigs up in and about the community and everything is getting under way for a heavy drilling campaign during the spring.

Texas Company Chief Scout Back. There must be something important doing down around Callahan and Coleman counties.

C. F. Smith, chief scout of the north central Texas division of the Texas company, put on his hat and coat in a hurry Saturday and dashed out to make a tour of wildcat territories in surrounding counties. He returned Monday and said that things looked pretty good in Callahan and Coleman counties, which may mean a whole lot.

Mr. Smith is only responsible for the oil operations in 58 counties, and after he has ascertained as accurately as possible just what every well in these 58 counties is doing, he is through for the day and can go home, if he wants to, if another day hasn't already started by that time. His scouting force, however, is probably the largest in any one section of the state and covers the ground thoroughly.

So when Mr. Smith goes out into the field himself it generally means that something unusual is looming up on the horizon.

Spencer Company Gets Good Man. C. V. Morgan, formerly with the scouting department of the Sun company, is now identified with the Spencer Petroleum company of Cisco in a similar capacity. Mr. Morgan holds a high rating among the oil men

in the fields and both he and the Spencer Petroleum company will be mutually benefited by his offices.

Oil Man's Wife Ill. Mrs. H. M. Anderson, wife of the general superintendent of the north central Texas division of the Texas company, is ill at her home in Cisco with a severe attack of influenza. Mrs. Anderson took sick Sunday evening. Mr. Anderson is influential in oil circles here.

Good Well to the Northeast. A well making about 525 barrels was brought in Saturday by the Prairie Oil & Gas company about three miles northeast of Eastland. It is the company's No. 1 Hanks, and is an offset to the Royal Duke Hanks No. 1, which came in some time ago making 1500 barrels.

While the new well is not in the nature of a wildcat it shows that there is a lot of good undrilled production coming this way.

Mid-Kansas Gets a Good One. The Mid-Kansas No. 1 Harrell, S. P. R. R. survey, section 459, brought in a well Saturday which is making 600 barrels. The lease is located about 10 miles northeast of Cisco. While the well does not open up new territory it will be a great encouragement for more extensive drilling up near the Stephens county line in Eastland county. The well was shot between 2141-2292 with 400 quarts.

Prominent Oil Man Here. T. B. Hoffer of Fort Worth, in charge of the Tex-Ken division of the Powers interests and formerly with the Humble Oil & Gas company, was a visitor in Cisco Saturday. His trip was purely of a business nature.

30 Completions at Dublin. DUBLIN, Feb. 17.—Recently tabulated figures as to drilling activities in Erath county show that during the month of January there were twenty completions in the county and all of them producers.

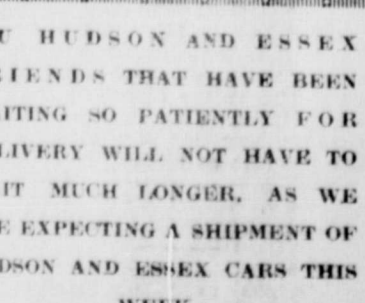

THE FARMER AND HIS ROADS. Periodically we hear some one remark that the farmer should keep the roads adjoining his property in good condition—or that the county should do this and so.

Generally these remarks come from some passing motorist, who himself is cutting the road up with his heavy car. Manifestly, good roads are an aid to every farmer, as they are to every one who uses them.

Unquestionably the state and county should take every means of keeping the roads in proper condition. Improvements should be made and repairs should be kept up. We should rejoice to see every foot of roadway in this county a veritable boulevard.

But why hang it onto the farmer so insistently, when as a matter of fact, the farmer is only a minor consideration in the constant destruction of the road?

There was no great public outcry for road improvement until the automobile came into vogue. But now that the automobile has ceased to be a luxury for the few and has come into general use, especially in the centers of population, everybody seems to think the farmer ought to do more work on his roads.

Automobiles do more to destroy country roads than all other agencies combined. They should bear their proportionate share of the cost of maintenance.

There is a state tax on automobiles. But what becomes of that tax? Have you noticed any of it put to good use on the roads in this community? And yet automobiles from every part of the country are tearing our roads to pieces three hundred and sixty-five days in the year.

We believe in good roads, but we also believe in the doctrine of the square deal.

If the motorists complain of the condition of our roads, let the state hand over a fair share of the tax on cars and we'll put those roads in the pink of condition.

Or, we strongly suspect that the farmers would be perfectly willing to keep the roads in repair themselves, if they were allowed to charge a small head tax on every motorist who passed over them.

Some of these days there will be a county tax on automobiles, with every car required to display the county license in plain view while in the county. Then the burden of maintenance will fall at least partly where it belongs.

AMERICA is large, and we have much room to spare, but not one inch for the cuss who seeks to overthrow the government of the United States. We may, or we may not, be of the party in power, but we are Americans all, and we want nothing but Americanism—100 per cent pure. That's our creed.
