Base Ball is a Business Stimulus and League Here Means Clean, Honest Sport Murphy, who has been in the

Being a base ball fan is one way of letting off steam. The American people concentrate on business affairs daily until some method of diverting the mind is absolutely esssential, and no other scheme has ever been adopted nationally than base ball.

Plans to organize a league team in Cisco, to contest during a period of several weeks in the great pastime is the natural consequence of a high strung community. It is needed here is much as big buildings, oil wells and hotels. It will be a safety valve, through which pent up energy and high pressure mental activity will be released and

relaxed. Cisco will have a team providing funds are raised, that will be a unit of the great national organization that controls the game. Cisco might not have a first division organization, but it will have at least a team made up of men who are qualified to try for the league next higher up, and might possibly develop some men who would travel into big time. It is the system, and the quality of players here will he given a thorough trial, with the coal of the American or the National leagues as an incen-

tive for the best playing.

gue team offers many features that seem to make it among the essentials. In addition to the advertising it would bring to the community, there is a certain relaxation in the game that will be a tonic to the community.



It is said that water injected into the takes four months to find itself at the outlet, thereby insuring a splendid settling. The lake is connected with the reservoir by a 16-inch pipe. There is then a 12-inch pipe running from the reservoir to a control station two miles from Stamford, the water running by gravity. At this control station an electrically driven pump increases the pressure in any desired force in case of fire or other emergency

The towns of Lueders and Avoca, opulations 700 and 500, respectively, nd a number of farms and gins and other industries, will receieve their supolies of water from the reservoir and lake through an arrangement made by the municipality. Thus it may be seen that the Stamford water source not only supplies Stamford, but two other towns and numerous rural folks and indus-

Part of Debt Paid.

The municipality has already paid off e-twentieth of the debt and will pay off one-fortieth annually. Stamford is one of the few towns building such water systems without resorting to sinking fund. The water rate will be the lowest in west Texas towns, 30 cents for the first 1000 gallons, 10 ents for the second 1000 and 10 cents for the third 1000 and more gallons. In time it is hoped that the city will have free water. The revenue from sale of ater will quickly accumulate to admit of a quick defrayment of all debt contracted on this water project. The city some time ago purchased the sewer system. When sufficient water is precured from Lake Penick, compulsory meeting up will eliminate the surface oilet so omnipresent in towns of west


