Discontinuing Purchase of Liberty Bonds For Retirement Under Present Law Would Cover \$750,000 Of The Billion, Relieving Treasury.

iate billion dollar reduction in federal taxes was suggested in a statement issued today by William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury. The present tax burden is too great, he said, and is "having an injurious effect

Mr. McAdoo proposed that collection of a tax to establish a sinking fund for retirement of the war debt, which was recommended by former Secretary Glass to begin with the fiscal year 1920, be postponed for two years, and that the deferred payments of European interest be funded until Europe is in a position to pay its interest charges. MYSTIC PITTSBÜRGH LIGHTS RESULT OF FURNACE BLAZES

PITTSBURGH .- Intense blast fur. nace activity, combined with low temperatures, has in recent weeks given to the Pittsburgh district some of the most beautiful "furnice comets" it has ever seen. But they are gradually losing their brilliancy, and with the apwill vanish until favorable conditions reappear next winter.

"Furnace comets" are great broad shafts of yellow light which pierce th black background of a murky sky in most spectacular manner. They flash almost without a moment's notice, and fade almost as quickly, only to reappear as bright, if not brighter, than before, Usually there are two of them at times rising perpendicular, but oftener cutthe sky like the beam from a

searchlight. Scientists at the Allegheny observatory explained the lights by saying that the light from blast furnaces penetrates the atmosphere above to city to a great height, and there, being caught frost crystals, send back the reflecti in the form of broad bands. For yes they have passed almost unnoticed un this year, when, because of the tinual operation of large numbers of furnaces, they became much more quent and much more beautiful.

The engine is three feet in length having the solid wheels and upright cylinder of steam engines of the pres ent day. The machine, made of brass, seems designed to run upon a submerged track. Machinists who examined it declare it contains the embryonic principles which have been reproduced in every steamboat. Like most noted inventors of the
