

Uvalde, Tex, Oct. 17 .- About 500,000 pounds of mohair changed hands at Uvalde this week, being sold to a representative of a Mas sachusetts mill, the price paid ranging from 20c to 30c a pound

Sol Mayer Buys big Tract of Land Down in Val Verde,

Sol. Mayer, the big Sutton county rancaman, bas purchased 26,000 acres of ranching land in Val Verde and Creckett counties from railroad parties. He paid \$2 per acre for the land, making the total deal fost up to \$52,000.

Mr. Mayer has gone to Austin to close up the deal new and will continue his large business on even a larger scale than ever before.

He already had this land leased. but finding an opportunity to purchase it at a reasonable rate, he did so. He will now stock it up with a greatly increased number of cattle.

Mr Mayer is well known in Sau Angelo having lived in the vicinity of this city for a number of years.—San Augelo Daily Stan

Antelopes Protected.

Antelopes now have all of the protection that the law can give them. Montana and Wyoming have recently enacted laws giving them absolute protection for a series of years. This is a great achievement, for the reason that the chain of protection for that species is now nearly complete. In no State or Territory is it now legal to hunt antelopes at any time and the penalties for the lawbreakers are severe.

The rainfall in the Sonora country Monday was of the heav-1903 when record of the rain fall was established in Sonora by the U. S. Government. That is the Covernment records start with 1902 The precipitation on Monday October 18, 1909 was 2:76 inches and the record for the entire month of October 1904 was 2:86. In October 1907, however, we recorded for the month 6:20 in ches, with 3:15 on the 4th, 1:78 on 5th, :28 on 6th, and :08 on 7th. The November of that year was also good and above the average being 3:84 inches. The prospects seem good for the planting of oat. wheat, rye, etc. and they should be put in the ground as soon as possible. This amount of moisture, which exceeds 3 /nches in some paits of the country is a guarantee of something green dur ing the winter and weeds in the early spring.
