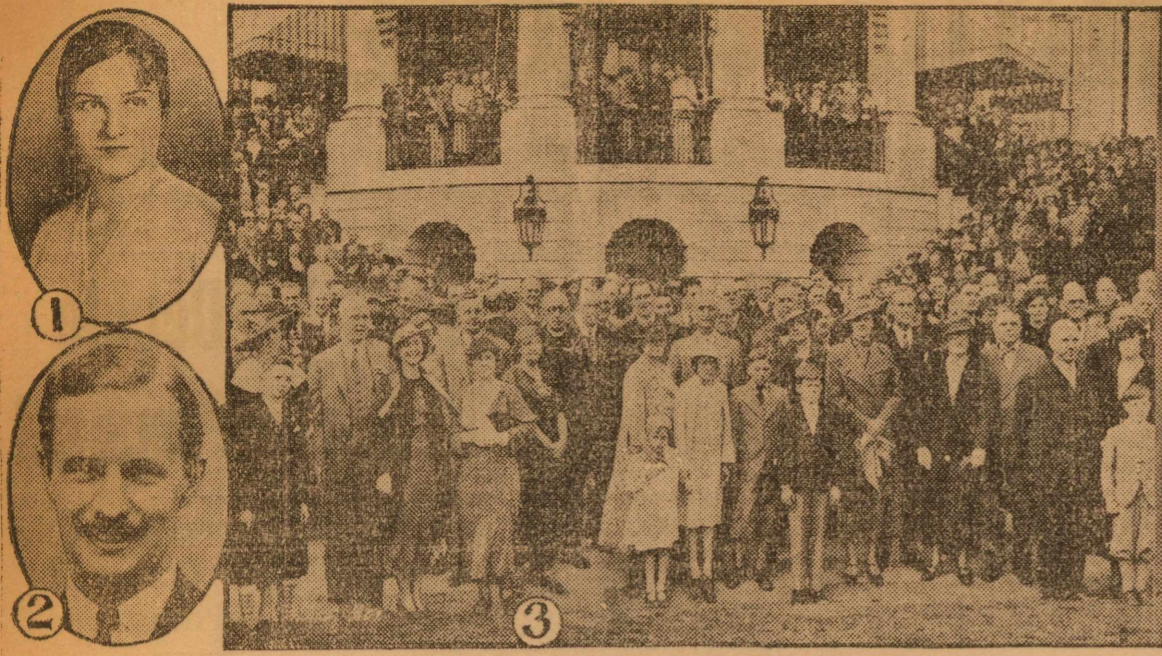

Fifteen Hospitals Operated by Shrine

More Than 37,000 Crippled Children Treated in 14 Years

Washington, D. C., May 17.—In the past fourteen years the Shrine, Masonic organization, has established 15 widely distributed hospitals, 11 of which are major institutions and 4 "mobile units." The 4 mobile units are wards for crippled children in hospitals not under Shrine management. They are located at Shreveport, La., Minneapolis, Minn., San Francisco, Cal., Portland, Ore., St. Louis, Mo., Montreal, Canada, Springfield, Mass., Chicago, Ill., Philadelphia, Penn., Greenville, S. C. and Honolulu. The "mobile units" are in Spokane, Wash., Salt Lake City, Utah, Winnipeg, Canada and Lexington, Ky.

These hospitals are maintained at an expense of about \$1,000,000 annually and to date have treated more than 37,000 children who were crippled by disease or accident.

The design of the buildings and grounds resembles spacious club or school appointments. The large grounds afford opportunity for fresh air and sunshine, so helpful to doctors in effecting cures in children.

Any child under the age of 14, with normal mentality, of any creed, color, nationality, is admitted free provided the parents or guardians are financially unable to provide treatment and provided the patient's case is one which will likely respond to hospital treatment. The average healing period is 105 days. Though the work of the hospitals is primarily orthopedic correction and cure, other handicaps such as diseased tonsils, defective visions and bad teeth are also corrected.

The work is financed by an annual contribution from each member and from gifts, donations and legacies.

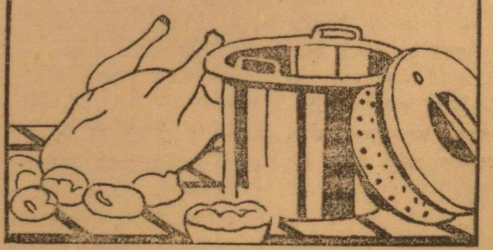

**Car License Show Increase**  
 Austin, May 17.—April gains in new passenger car registrations in sixteen Texas counties representing all sections of the state were encouraging, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Registrations totaled 5,307 in April against 5,245 in March and 2,914 in April, 1933, gains of 1.2 per cent and 82 per cent respectively. Registrations during the first four months of the year were 15,839 compared with 9,343 during the corresponding period last year, an increase of nearly 70 per cent.

**Sutton Unique in Land Debt Problem**

Lubbock District Executive Asks for Letter About Condition

Sutton county, according to a statement made to R. E. Taylor, chairman of the county committee which is a unit of the Texas Farm Debt Conciliation Committee, is the only one of the 254 counties in the state which does not have any foreclosure actions pending.

Sutton county has 973,440 acres and of this amount 869,096 acres is classified as "in farm." Crop acreage is 347, plowable pasture totals 2,889 acres and "open pasture" 865,091 acres.

Mr. Taylor stated this week that he was told this by M. G. Abernathy, Lubbock, district supervisor, at a recent meeting in San Angelo. Mr. Abernathy requested a letter from Mr. Taylor stating this fact and said that he would send it to Washington to executives of the Farm Credit Administration.

The state committee of twelve members, with headquarters in Austin, is the working unit of the national organization set up to bring about voluntary debt settlement, either by composition and scale-down of all indebtedness to a point where it can be handled as a new loan, or by an extension agreement that will permit worthy debtors to work out their financial difficulties.

**Committees Are Arbitrators**  
 County committees are selected whom, it is believed, will work fairly with both debtors and creditors. They are expected to make every effort to aid in restoring farm and ranch homes to a profitable, going basis with the aid of various governmental agencies at their command.

The Sutton county group which has been appointed to work out a sane, workable plan of settlement of debts, in the event of threatened foreclosure, is made up of Mr. Taylor, H. V. Stokes, secretary, B. W. Hutcherson, Bryan Hunt, Tom Bond.

**Convicts Help In Folk Lore Research**

Negroes Sing "Sinful Songs" for Recording for Posterity

Austin, May 17.—Under commission from the United States Library of Congress, John A. Lomax of Dallas and his son, Alan, have traveled 15,000 miles by automobile through four southern states for the purpose of interviewing nearly ten thousand negro convicts and thousands of other colored folks in rural communities.

The object of the Lomaxes was to obtain phonograph records of authentic negro folk songs. They will continue their research.

Mr. Lomax is considered a foremost authority on southern and southwestern folk lore, and was one of the founders of the Texas Folk Lore Society. He is a graduate of the University of Texas, holding both the bachelor and master of arts degrees, obtaining the former in 1897 and the latter in 1906. His son is a former student of the university.

In an article for the Musical Quarterly, Mr. Lomax tells a number of experiences he had in interrogating the black convicts and in encouraging them to sing before his microphone the "sinful songs," or secular music, of his race. He sought, not the so-called negro spirituals which have grown from the black man's acceptance of a comparatively new religious faith, but the deeply pagan strains that are the natural emotional outpouring of the primitive negro race.

The commencement address the next day will be by the Rev. L. N. D. Wells, pastor of the East Dallas Christian Church.

**Rattler Discovered At Rabbit Dinner**

Crockett County Man Declares He Has Settled Argument

The question of whether or not a rattlesnake bites its victim before making a meal of it has furnished material for many an argument in the sections of the country infested with these venomous reptiles, and to many old timers, the question has never been definitely settled.

But Will Baggett brings in a story that definitely settles the question in the affirmative. Last Friday, Mr. Baggett reported, Walter Wilkins, employed on the Baggett ranch the past seven years and now in the employ of Ed Bean who has leased the ranch, found a large rattlesnake swallow a grown cottontail rabbit.

Mr. Wilkins killed the snake, which was more than two and a half inches in diameter. Having heard the arguments on the question of how the snake dispatched its victim, Mr. Wilkins sought to settle it and skinned the rabbit. He found the flesh green from the poison of the snake's bite and the fang marks an inch apart on each side of the animal's back, just in front of the hips.

Since Mr. Wilkins' experiment, Mr. Baggett learned that his brother, Monroe Baggett, had seen a rattler bite a chicken a few years ago and then wait until the chicken died before swallowing it.—Ozona Stockman.

**JOBS IN LARGEST CITY DOUBLE THOSE LAST YEAR**

New York, May 17.—Capt Mabel Murray, director of the Salvation Army's free employment bureau for men, says the number of jobs becoming available daily is double that of a year ago. The bureau, a model for large cities of the country, placed 1,140 men during April, compared with 545 in April, 1933.

"We are finding more jobs of a permanent type than ever before," said Captain Murray. "I think the tension has eased considerably. May probably will be the bureau's largest placement month, but there's a new problem. Many of the average of 350 men who come to us daily are not fit for work; they have been jobless too long to tackle jobs requiring concentra-

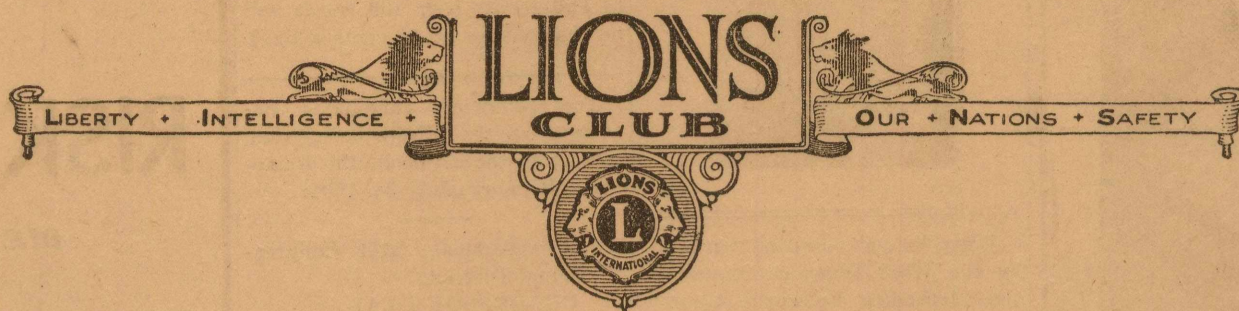

### COUNTY'S COTTON CROP MAY BE GREATLY REDUCED

Citizens of Erath county, of which Stephenville is the county seat, are to be permitted to raise only 3500 bales of cotton under the present government set-up, according to A. M. Hale of Alexander, in the same county. Stephenville is 75 miles southwest of Fort Worth. Mr. and Mrs. Hale are visiting their son, Hub Hale and family. Mr. Hale was formerly a merchant in Erath county.

The county has raised as much as 67,000 bales of cotton but for the last five years has averaged only 5000 bales. At a recent meeting plans were perfected for application for a readjustment of the ruling that would permit the raising of at least the 5000-bale average of the last few years.

Federal agents are buying 1,400,000 acres of Texas timber land for forest preserves.
