

#### SUMMER AND BARE FEET AND BUGS-ALL ARE HERE!

A very eventful summer is being anticipated with great pleasure by a group of Sonora mothers whose Boy Scout sons are receiving instruction which will lead to their securing another merit badge.

O. G. Babcock, entomologist of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is teaching "Insect Life" to six boys. An approved textbook, quite comprehensive in form, is being used. Each boy will collect fifty kinds of insects and will work out the life histories of several species.

A colony of ants or honey bees will be kept by each boy for two weeks and observations of their activities made. Allied species such as centipedes and vinegarones will also be considered by the boys-and their elders.

Study by city officials has led them to believe that money now being paid for office rent and fire equipment storage may be diverted to retirement of the loan bonds at little more cost than at present. In speaking of the government proposal W. C. Gilmore, mayor, said soon after the receipt of the loan agreement papers:

"We believe our bond money expenditure would be in the neighborhood of \$3900. This would, of course, be added to by the 'gift' of FERA funds of approximately \$1200. Our total cost then would be about \$5100 and I believe that we could conservatively say that for that sum we would be getting a building that in times not so long ago would have cost \$7500.

**Retirement Plan Explained** 

"The retirement of the bonds is his way," Mr. Gilmore continued. 'On April 1, 1935, to April 1, 1947, inclusive, we would retire \$200 a year. From April 1, 1948, to April 1, 1954, we would retire \$300 a year. Interest of 4 per cent, an unusually low rate, would be payable semi-annually.



Mr. Lomax is considered a foremost authority on southern and southwestern folk lore, and was one of the founders of the Texas Folk Lore Society. He is a graduate of the University of Texas, holding both the bachelor and master of arts degrees, obtaining the former in 1897 and the latter in 1906. His son is a former student of the university.

In an article for the Musical Quarterly, Mr. Lomax tells a number of experiences he had in interrogating the black convicts and in encouraging them to sing before his micraphone the "sinful songs," or secular music, of his race. He sought, not the so-called negro spirituals which have grown from the black man's acceptance of a comparatively new religious faith, but the deeply pagan strains that are the natural emotional outpouring of the primitive negro race.

### COUNTY'S COTTON CROP MAY BE GREATLY REDUCED

Citizens of Erath county, of which Stephenville is the county seat, are to be permitted to raise only 3500 bales of cotton under the present government set-up, accordng to A. M. Hale of Alexander, in the same county. Stephenville is 15 miles southwest of Fort Worth. Mr. and Mrs. Hale are visiting their son, Hub Hale and family. Mr. Hale was formerly a merchant in Erath county.

The county has raised as much as 67,000 bales of cotton but for the last five years has averaged only 5000 bales. At a recent meeting plans were perfected for application for a readjustment of the ruling that would permit the raising of at least the 5000-bale average of the last few years.
