Hospitals Protect Patients From Sand

Sprayed Cheesecloth at Windows Makes Life Bearable

Masks are a common sight in the Pampa section of Texas where sand and dust storms are prevalent and even the hospitals have to take steps to protect their patients from the ravages of particles in the air.

The Pampa Press told recently of the way in which the hospitals take care of those who are unfortunate enough to have to be in a hospital at a time when sand is doing its best to make life uncomfortable for everyone.

Sand does blow, hard to breathe, masks are in evidence all about town, conversation is invariable about the sand storms. How do hospitals combat the dust?

Here is the solution: Cheesecloth the size of the window is dipped in water then hung over the window. Knowing that this will soon dry, an employee is equipped with a spray filled with water, and at thirty-minute intervals, sprays the cloths. This acts as a filter, cutting out the choking, nauseating fine particles of dust that land inside a room while these dusters dominate the land. The idea originated in the Pampa-Jarratt hospital after many methods were tried, and the cheesecloth method proved most successful in practically eliminating all dust from the rooms.
