

Tax Rate For 1937 Set at 83 Cents; 73 Cents in 1936

Recent Reduction By State of 13 Cents Makes Net Total 3c Per \$100 Lower

Sutton county's tax rate for 1937 assessed valuations of \$4,-624,598 will be 83 cents per \$100, according to Judge Alvis Johnson's announcement this week following the holding of the required 1938 budget hearing Monday afternoon at one o'clock.

Last year's rate was 73c per \$100 on valuations of \$4,348,098.



Wise To Feed Out Cattle By February

A. & M. Man Thinks Beef Market Prospects Very Good

College Station, Aug. 18.—Texas feeders have prospects of an exceptional market for such beeves as they can finish out by the end of the year and the first two months of 1938, according to G. W. Barnes, animal husbandman of the Texas A. and M. Extension

Barnes, who has recently completed a tour of the major grain and livestock areas, reports that the grain crop is good over a major portion of Texas.

"The good grain crop over a large part of the state, in combination with the shortage of grain for early feeding in the corn belt, makes this an ideal year for Texas feeders," Barnes said. He warned, however, that feeders should start their operations at once in order to get their animals well finished and on the market before corn belt beeves begin to move.

The excelent grain prospects in the corn belt have strengthened the demand for feeders and stocker animals, Barnes pointed out. Texas normally sells about two million feeders and stockers each year, he said and feeds out around 150,000 beeves.

If beeves are placed on feed as soon as the grain supply warrants, so that the animals can be marketed before early April of 1938, Barnes believes that Texas feeders could profitably finish out from 300,000 to 500,000 animals.

Consider Furniture When Planning Home

Color Consideration of Value For Pleasing Results

If you plan to use your present furniture in the new home you are going to build, this should be considered when the architect draws up the plans.

Harmony is an important factor in adjoining rooms and if you are planning on an informal modern dining room, when your livingroom furniture is, for instance, formal Georgian, it would be well to choose a plan that has the two rooms well separated.

Color may be the keynote on which two rooms of the same general character meet. One may have figured wallpaper, while the other has plain walls of one of the predominating colors in the paper. Carpeting, walls, and draperies may be identical with a difference in the type of furniture or the color schemes of the room may be reversed, such as vellow walls and blue draperies in one, and blue walls and yellow draperies in the

my concrete foundation wall?

A. Open up and clean out the crack; roughen the edges, moisten the old concrete and fill crack with mix 1 part portland cement and 3 parts sand mixed with just enough water to make a workable paste; when patch has set it should be dampened and kept damp for several days.

Q. Is indoor paint suitable for exterior use?

A. Outdoor paint can be used anywhere, but paints intended for indoor use should not be exposed either to weather or to air that is continuously moist. Paint for use outdoors must have qualities suited to exposure. It should have elasticity, that quality which allows it to expand and contract with extremes of temperature; also tightness which causes it to hold to its base and be proof against harddriven rain; toughness to stand the beating of sleet storms and other severe exposure.


Q. Is it practical to replace ordinary glass with plate glass in windows with small panes?

A. Yes, it is. It may be necessary to increase the size of the sash weights, as plate glass is a little heavier than ordinary grades. If you use thin plate glass, however, the difference may not be great enough to necessitate a change.


