Negro Who Killed Another Saturday **Released On Bond**

James Carroll Calls For Officers After Using Shotgun in **Killing Tolliver**

Released on bond, awaiting action of the March grand jury is James Carroll, negro employee of William M. Allison, ranchman west of Sonora, at whose place Willie Tolliver was killed about noon Saturday.

Tolliver was recently released from the Sutton county jail after being held there several months in connection with the shooting of Mrs. Louise Coleman, a crime for which Morris Coleman, her husband was given a 35-year sentence in September. No indictment was returned again Tolliver.

No Effort Made to Escape Carroll surrendered to Cashes Taylor, deputy sheriff, soon after he shot Tolliver. A call was made by him to the telephone operator to have the officers come and get him

in front of the servants' house on the Allison ranch, according to Deputy Taylor.

Tolliver is said to have been working in a Rankin hotel since leaving here a few weeks ago. Saturday morning he came to Sutton county with Mr. and Mrs. Henry West and baby. Mr. West is night clerk at the hotel in Rankin.

As the officer was told the story, Carroll killed Tolliver as he (Tolliver) started to get out of the West car. A charge from a 12gauge, single barrel shotgun was fired, inflicting a fatal wound in the head. Death was not instantaneous but occurred while he was in the ambulance being brought to town.
