

However, after a good start as king, Saul ruined his chances by letting his jealousy of David, a young shepherd, overcome him. also, and this disobedient spirit caused his downfall. God comanded Sameul to seek out and noint the one who would reign over Israel at Saul's death. The tory of Davd's anointment is too familiar to need repeating

Brought into Saul's court to play soothing music on his harp before the ailing king, David became the friend of one of Saul's sons, Jonathan and thus began a friendship which has become a legend to this day. David also married one of Saul's daughters. This contact with the king's court and these relationships with the royal family helped David learn about statecraft.

Because of Saul's increasing ealousy of this young man, whom he suspected might someday succeed him, David was forced to live the life of a fugitive until Saul's death. Atfer Saul's death, God directed David to go to Hebron, where his friends and kinsman proclaimed him king over Judah, the southern territory inhabited by the Israelties. Later, when he had nut down a rebellion started by Saul's descendants, he was made king over all Israel.

Do you wonder wherein David was a better king than Saul? It is true that David was not perfect: oftentimes, he sinned. One of the wonderful things about the Bible is that there is never an attempt to gloss over the characters of its principle figures. David committed several gross sins, but he never forgot God or the fact that God had made him king. David confessed his sins

and repented of them. David's name has been handed lown to us as the greatest king Israel ever had. "No priest, prophet, or other king stands by his side in the love, the memory, and the hopes of Israel." He rendered open and enthusiastic honor to God. He was generous to his friends and to enemies, lavishing kindness upon both. He was tactful in managing other men, knowing how to be patient for the sake of the best interests of the nation. The people loved him. and under him the naton reached

unity and strength. When near death, David ordered Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet to anoint his son, Solomon, King of Israel. It was to Solomon that God gave the honor of building his Temple, a project which was denied David because he had been a warrior, a man of blood. It was a great day in Israel's history when the great edifice was dedicated. Read Solomon's beautiful con-

secration prayer. Solomon's reign started out gloriously. Building on the foundation laid by his father, David, Solomon at first followed in his father's footsteps. He asked God to give him an understanding heart so that he might judge wisely between good and bad. This wish was granted, and, because he had asked wisely and unselfishly, God promised him riches and honor also if he kept

his laws. During Solomon's reign, Israel became very rich. Solomon built a strong navy and a strong army of chariots and horsement. Trade expanded and there was a period of relative peace. However, through the influence of heathen wives brought into Jerusalen by Solomon, the people were led to forget God and then began the decline of the Israelite nation.
