
The changes, effective July 1. 1948, are being made in an attempt to correct and eliminate abuses in tuition charges tha have been uncovered in recent

With the new contract standards, VA hopes to make certain that the federal government is not paying for more than the veteran actually receives during his-


VA emphasized that the new contract requirements affect only the following institutions whose enrollments consist mostly of ve-terans: (1) schools established since the passage of the GI Bill, and, (2) schools whose charges increased materially since the GI Bill programs began.

No change was made in VA's policy of accessing charges made other private profit schools not affected by the new ruling.




