WHEREAS these accidents, which annually cause some 18,000

farm residents to lose their lives, constitute an unnecessary and WHEREAS the reduction of accidents to a minimum cannot be achieved without the vigilance and efforts of those who are endan

NOW, THEREFORE, I, HARRY S. TRUMAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby call upon the Nation to observe the week commencing July 25, 1948, as National Farm Safety Week. I urgently request each member of every American farm family to accept responsibility for eliminating at least one possible source of accidents during that week. I also ask all organizations and persons interested in farm life and welfare to join in a con-

certed attack upon these menaces to the lives and happiness of A-mer an farmers and their families.

IN WITNESS WHEREOFF, I have hereunto set my hand and used the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed. DONE at the City of Washington this 16th day of April in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-eight, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and seventy-second.
