357 Acres State Land For Sale In **Dickens County**

State Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, states there is still public land for sale in Texas. However, not much of it, as Texans measure land. Less than one per cent of the once colossal public domain is available to high bidders as the unsold acreage has dwindled to a total of 1,025,875.70 acres. (The total acreage of the state is 172,678,-

The unsold land includes 357.20 acres in Dickens County.

Not all of the million acres can be purchased, Giles explains. The domain is administered by the School Land Board, of which Giles is chairman

"No school lands within five miles of oil or gas production can be sold," Giles points out.

When there is sufficient demand, the School Land Board authorkes the sale of specified tracts. A public sale is advertised and information about the tracts supplied by the General Land Office upon request. /

Sale is by sealed bids. The high bidder, if conforming with all regulations, is the new owner. Hairy vetch and Balboa rye added 5 of a mile of new terhave formed a thick, matted cover on 15 acres of sandy land on cooperator Wayne Beetle's farm in Lower 2nd Creek group. A vetch and rye combination is the cover crop that has been used by many of the district cooperators this year. The vetch, which many people passing by thought to be weeds in the rye, has already begun to bloom and many nodules containing the nitroger fixing bacteria can be found on the roots. Wayne planted this cover crop mainly to prevent washing and blowing of his soil but now also plans ot combine a

seed crop from it. Emmett Hagins in Sage Branch group is using Balboa rye seeded as a cover crop on a 26 acre field for the third consecutive year. The soil is a deep sand and become rather unproduc-

tive. After this year's rye crop Emmett feels that the soil will be able to produce a good row crop.
Edwin E. Denson, a new cooperator of the district, has built up 2.5 miles of old terraces and

races to a syrup pan system.
