AUSTIN, Texas, May 12-There is likely to be slightly less vacationing by Texas adults this year than in 1947.

A statewide survey by The Texas Poll indicates 34 per cent are planning vacations this year. A similar survey in 1947 found 42 per cent making plans for that

The new ide of rotating te crop to be planted on a certain piece of land was also introduced. Fields that had been planted in cotton year after

year were changed to alfalfa or field peas. The war-torn countries of Europe as well as the United States are now being fed with the products of American soil. These countries had not preserved their soil nor planned for future years. In the United States the government supplies experts who advise farmers, in turn, receives pay for his conservation practices. All of this shows how vitally interested

our government is in protecting the soil of the United States.
