Texas' Longest, Wildest Session **Ended Wednesday**

Austin, July 7 - The longes wildest spending legislative ses-sion in Texas history ended Wednesday with a triffing \$110,000

left in the cash box. The 51st Legistature extended state services in dozens of ways, spent an accumulated surplus of \$100,000,000 and all the antici-

pated revenue for the next two years but the \$110,000.

The Legislature actually authorized spending of more than \$312,-000,000 directly or indirectly from general revenue and faced a deficit of \$17,000,000 until Governor

Jester's veto brought spending and income into balance. Doing this brought Texas a reorganized public school system a new prison system and many mies of rural roads. It increased state workers' pay, boosted funds for state departments and col-leges and added many new gov-

ernmental functions. The lawmakers resisted all ef-forts to pass a new tax bill but went home faced with a certain special or regular session within six months to raise new revenue

or retrench. The 177-day session actually ended at 1:09 p m., one hour and nine minutes late. That's when House Speaker Durwood Manford announced that the busi-ness of the lesislating was over. The Senate quit at 12:03 p. m.

Manford and Lt. Gov. Allen Shivers had to stick around through a long, hot afternoon to sign bills and otherwise dispose of mechanical details.

The House officially ended its work at 4:41 p. m. and the Senate
