

Mayfield Brings In First Bale; 420 lbs.

Farming 12 miles southwest of Spur in the Loss Lake community, J. H. Mayfield brought in the first bale of 1949 cotton to be ginned in Dickens county, stated Loyd Hindman, manager of the Farmers' Co-op Gin.

Grown on approximately 20 acres of the W. K. Williams place which Mayfield farms in Kent county, the cotton is part of 135 acres planted April 8, 1949.

Ginning of the bale began at 9 p.m., Thursday, Aug. 18, five days earlier than last year's first ginned on Aug. 23, remarked Hindman.

The 1850 pounds of seed cotton made a 420 pound bale. Farmers' Co-op Gin, Spur, ginned the cotton free and bought the cottonseed, weight around 800 pounds. In addition, Mayfield was presented a \$150.50 premium from Spur merchants.

The cotton sold at \$50 per ton for the seed and 28 cents per pound for lint to the Farmers' Gin, Hindman added.

Karr Urges Tests For TB Be Made

The mobile x-ray unit for the discovery of tuberculosis among unsuspecting citizens, perhaps in our own county, will be in Spur soon, County Chairman Guy Karr reminded today.

This unit is offering a free x-ray test to all persons 15 years of age or older. Citizens of Dickens County may obtain this service in Spur on September 16, 17, 19 and 20.

It is important that x-ray tests be made. Karr urged, for tuberculosis germs may be found in the lung with this aid long before a person feels sick. Early tuberculosis has no signs or symptoms of warning. Coughing, losing weight and spitting blood are danger signs of serious advancing disease. When these signs appear, you have had tuberculosis for some time.

Karr also announced that there will be a meeting of the committees of the local campaign next week. Each chairman will be notified personally, he stated.

The campaign is on to acquaint people of Dickens County with the importance of this service and each citizen may help by taking advantage of this opportunity and informing others of it. Participation of 100 percent of the adult citizenship of Dickens County is the goal.

Sheriff's Office Names 8 Arrests

Eight arrests and convictions were filed in the county over the past week, according to reports from the sheriff's office today.

Reports of five minor traffic violations were docketed at the Dickens Justice of Peace court. From records in the Spur Justice court are three cases, two of which are traffic violations and one permitting a minor to drive an automobile without an operator's license.

County Plans Loan For Cottonseed

Plans for a cottonseed loan program for Dickens county are not complete, but will be finished soon, according to Joe M. Rose, chairman of the County Committee.

The county has no cotton loan rate at this time, Rose said, but loans will be available through state and county ACA offices. They are expected to average \$49.50 per ton on cottonseed that can be safely stored, which is 90 per cent of the August 1 parity price.

Clean seed with moisture content of 10 per cent or less will be eligible if stored in prescribed structures on or off farms. In addition, producers will be given aid in acquiring or constructing farm storage facilities for their cottonseed through Commodity Credit Corporation loans which may cover up to 85 per cent of the construction costs, added Rose.

Commodity Credit Corporation loans through Aug. 1, 1949, for Dickens county are as follows: 68,970 bushels of wheat valued at \$145,894.21 may be stored in warehouses. 23,984 bushels of wheat may be stored on farms. No oats will be warehouse stored, through the corporation loans, and 965 bushels of oats valued at \$704.45 may be stored on farms.

Insurance Dividend Forms Ready Aug. 29

Monday, Aug. 29, 1949, will be the first day of distribution of application forms for the National Service Life Insurance special dividend to be paid veterans who carried their GI insurance for three months or more prior to January 1, 1948, announced Guy Karr, postmaster, on Tuesday of this week.

Application forms will be available at the local post office, stated Karr, and will be simplified blanks in the form of a three-fold card; the veteran will retain one third of the card, which contains instructions, and after filling in his name, service number, C-number, if any, and insurance number, he will place a one-cent stamp on the remaining two folds of the card and mail to VA, Washington, D. C.

Amount of the returned dividends will be based upon a percentage of the amount of money paid into the policy, said Karr.

Reserve Shortage Plagues Bulldogs; Scrimmages Set

A serious lack of reserves continues to be the main trouble of Coach Sam Hawks this week as the Spur Bulldogs wind up their second week of extensive and good football workouts.

"We'll be ready to field a pretty good team," Coach Hawks says, "But a serious injury at most any position would put us in trouble. We lack weight and experience both among our reserves at every position."

The Bulldogs have scheduled scrimmages with Post Thursday night, August 25, the Spur boys will run plays with the Post team there, and Tuesday, August 30, the Post eleven will be here for a scrimmage session.

These practice sessions will not be carried out as a regular game, the coach said. Both coaches will be on the field to correct errors and observe fundamentals. Each team will be given the ball on the offensive for a limited time with the other team remaining on defense.

Charles Byrd, a graduate from last year's strong "B" team, is due out for practice by the first of next week, Coach Hawks says, and is expected to fill the center position. Dean Watson has been running plays from this position, but will possibly compete with Joe Grimland for the fullback position if Byrd plays up to expectations.

Indications at present show Ronald Comer as a very likely prospect for the other end position, playing opposite veteran Joe King. Charles Lee is now understandinging Melvin Lindsey at the quarterback position, and will probably see much action from this position. Don Hindman is showing much promise, according to Coach Hawks and his assistant Bill Hahn, and will possibly be worked into a starting position before the season opens.

Jerry Calvert, hand-capped at the tackle position, and could possibly give Wayne Alexander competition for the starting position at left tackle. Calvert is also a prospective center reserve.

Coach Hawks states that tickets for the opening game against Haskell here September 9, will be on sale soon.

Spur Schools Inaugurate Gilmer-Aiken 'Proposals'

The Spur Public schools, along with all schools in Texas, will begin the 1949-50 school year under terms of the so-called Gilmer-Aiken bill, announced superintendent C. F. Cook today.

This new departure in Texas education, by which the state has assumed an intimate and detailed control of all school systems within the state, was greeted with pleasure by some educators, with misgivings by others.

For Spur, the newly-enacted law will have pronounced effects on the schools. As briefly outlined by Cook the immediate effects are these:

- Spur Independent school district will receive approximately \$15,000.00 more in state funds than last year. (Most of this raise in money will be absorbed by the salary raise to teachers that must be paid to take part in this program).
- Virtually every teacher in Spur School system will receive the minimum raise which is about \$400.00 per year.
- School administration will be faced with more paper work and reports, a result of more stringent state control of the local school system.
- The Spur School District will not raise school taxes as it has been paying its part of the school funds. (Many schools are having to raise their taxes as they have not been paying what the State thinks was their part).
- The Law provision will tend to cut down the number of students per teacher, giving each pupil more individual attention.
- The reduction of pupils per class room will, in turn, call for more rooms and more teachers.
- The Gilmer-Aiken law will give the Spur Schools two more teachers than they had last year.
- Standards of teaching will be raised as teachers are offered a salary incentive to obtain masters degrees.
- Teachers in the future will be employed on the average daily attendance. This will necessitate that all children in the Spur schools should attend school each day possible. (If your child misses school, that absence will be marked against our daily attendance record. Teachers funds will be paid to the school district on a monthly basis).

Over forty band students have reported for practice each day this week, Melvin King, band director of Spur Schools, stated today.

The Senior High School Band and Junior High School band have been working from 8 o'clock each morning until 3 o'clock each afternoon this week with marching and instrument class lessons. This intense drill is being made in preparation for the first football game which will be September 9. The practice will only continue this week.

"They are coming along fine" King stated, "and we are looking forward to a big year for the band."

Beginning classes in band will begin when school starts and will include students in the fourth grade and above.

Safety Group Report Tells Death Statistics

The United States may have the highest standard of living in the world, but it also has one of the world's highest accidental death rates.

The U. S. rate in 1948 was 67.1 deaths per 100,000 population, as compared to a world-wide postwar average death rate of 48.9, according to the 1949 edition of "Accident Facts," statistical yearbook of the National Safety Council.

Only three countries topped the accidental death rate of the United States—Iceland, Egypt and Australia. Those countries had rates of 71.5, 83.8 and 85.9 respectively in 1946.

Mauritius, a British island near Madagascar, had the lowest rate of 25.9 in 1947.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8
Proposing an amendment to Article II of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same be, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the adjacent property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people reading therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at a election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon or in suitable voting machines, the said machines shall provide the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark one of said ballots on the ballot, leaving the one marked, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

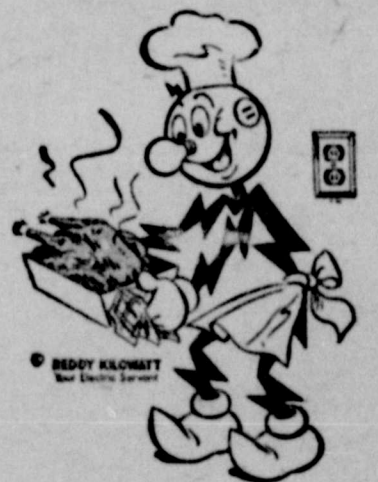

Texas Tech Slates Expansion Program

The Texas Technological college Board of Directors approved plans in a recent meeting at the college for a \$750,000 addition of two wings to the Administration building and voted to accept bids on the project until 3 p. m. Sept. 23.

A special meeting of the board was called by Chairman Charles C. Thompson of Colorado City to be held in San Antonio Sept. 24 at which time the board will consider the bids.

M. L. Pennington, newly appointed comptroller at the college, will receive bids until 3 p. m. the day before the special meeting which will be held in the St. Anthony hotel.

Plans for the new construction were drawn up by Wyatt C. Hedrick of Fort Worth, acting as college architect. They call for two wings, stipulating that each wing will be 60 feet wide and 130 feet long. They will be of the same type Spanish architecture as the rest of the building and will also be three stories high. The first floor of the east wing will be used for office space alone, and the first floor of the west wing will have both office and classroom space. The entire second floor of both wings will be used for classrooms, and the third floors will be for offices and classrooms.

Cottonseed Meal May Be Available At Bargain Prices

Cottonseed meal and hulls may be available to farmers and stock raisers at bargain prices as a result of an expected bumper cotton crop.

During the last five years the wholesale price of three pounds of cottonseed meal and four pounds of cottonseed hulls in Fort Worth, for instance, averaged 35 per cent of the wholesale price of a gallon of milk, according to Dr. A. B. Cox, University of Texas cotton marketing professor.

In some places three pounds of feed can now be bought wholesale as low as 23 per cent of the price of milk.

"Research has shown that three pounds of cottonseed meal plus four pounds of hulls fed to dairy cows on pasture will result in the production of one gallon of milk," Dr. Cox said.

State Market Reports Summer Month Low

Texas retail sales estimated at 401 million dollars in July were 1 per cent lower than in June and 4 per cent below July 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Jewelry sales dropped 12 per cent from June and 21 per cent from July 1948. Automotive stores' sales gained 3 per cent over June and 14 per cent over

July 1948, but other durable goods monthly declines included hardware store sales, 9 per cent; building material and lumber sales, 6 per cent; and furniture and household sales, 2 per cent. In the July-to-July durable goods comparison, building material and lumber sales slumped 20 per cent; hardware store sales, 11 per cent; and furniture and household sales, 9 per cent.

In the nondurable goods group, July sales dipped 2 per cent from June and 6 per cent from July 1948.

Food stores had a 7-per-cent monthly gain, drug stores and eating and drinking places had a 1-per-cent rise, and country general store sales were up fractionally, but all other nondurable goods stores showed July sales lagging behind June totals.

From a year earlier department store sales fell 13 per cent; apparel store sales sagged 10 per cent; women's specialty and shoe stores had 11-per-cent declines; family clothing stores, 10-per-cent decreases; and men's and boys' clothing stores, 6 per cent drops.

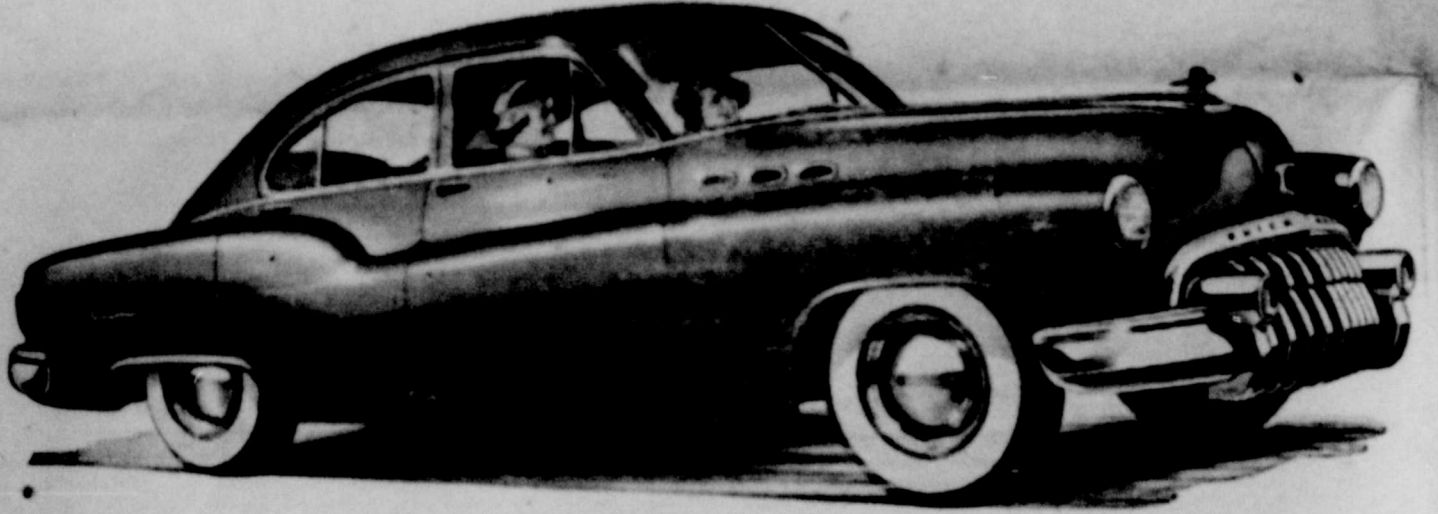

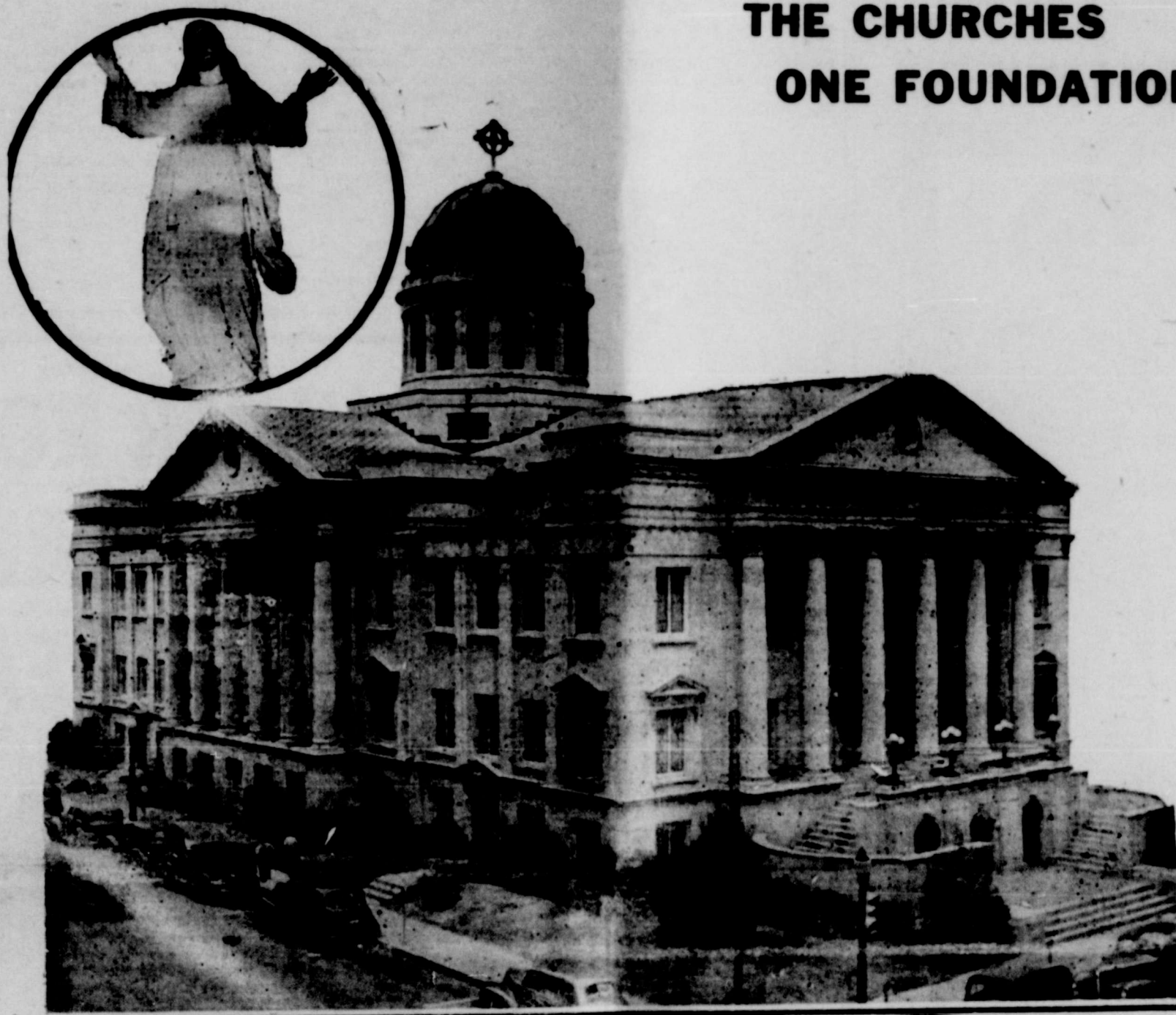

The pastor, C. Melvin Rathel will preach in a Youth Revival at Tahoka Sunday night and the week following.

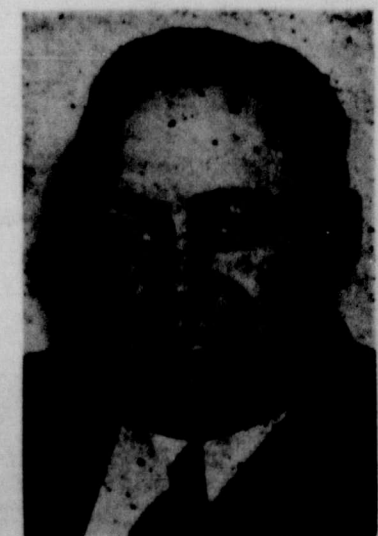

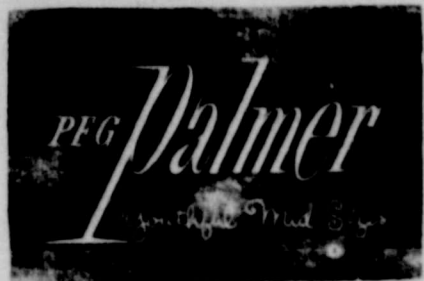

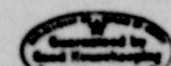
