Farmers' Co-op Gin. Grown on approximately 20 acres of the W. K. Williams place which Mayfield farms in Kent county, the cotton is part of 135 acres planted April 8, 1949.

Ginning of the bale began at 9 p.m., Thursday, Aug. 18, five days earlier than last year's first ginned on Aug. 23, remarked Hind-

The 1850 pounds of seed cotton made a 420 pound bale. Farmers' Co-op Gin, Spur, ginned the cot-

The cotton sold at \$50 per ton for the seed and 28 cents per pound for lint to the Farmers'

tendent C. F. Cook today. This new departure in Texas ducation, by which the state has control of all school systems within the state, was greeted with pleasure by some educators, with isgivings by others.

For Spur, the newly-enacted law will have pronounced effects on the schools. As briefly outlined by Cook the immediate ef-

1. Spur Independent school district will receive approximately \$15,000.00 more in state funds than last year. (Most of this raise in money will be absorbed by the salary raise to teachers that must be paid to take part in this

2. Virtually every teacher in Spur School system will receive the minimum raise which is about \$400.00 per

3. School administration will be faced with more paper work and reports, a result of more stringent state control of the local school system. 4. The Spur School District will not caise school taxes as it has been paying its part of

the school funds. (Many schools are having to raise their taxes as they have not been paying what the State thinks was their part). 5. The Laws provision will tend to cut down the number

of students per teacher, giving each pupil more individual attention. 6. The reduction of pupils per class room will, in turn,

call for more rooms and more teachers. 7. The Gilmer-Aikin laws will give the Spur Schools two more teachers than they

had last year. 8. Standards of teaching will be raised as teachers are offered a salary incentive to

obtain masters degrees. 9. Teachers in the future will be employed on the average daily attendance. This will necessitate that all children in the Spur schools should attend school each day possisible. (If your child misses school, that absence will be marked against our daily attendance record. Teachers funds will be paid to the school district on a monthly
