





New Amendment To Be Introduced

Full support was promised to day by Governor Allan Shivers for an amendment to the Tixas Constitution which would give mentally ill persons admission state hospitals without a mandatory jury trial.

"I am glad that this matter has at last come before the people." said Governor Shivers. "Every other state has revised its laws permit jury trials to be waived in lunacy cases, and I think is high time we removed the antiquated statute from our owr books."

The amendment, passed large majorities of both house of the 51st Legislature, will be submitted to a statewide vote or November 8. It will permit the next Legislature to enact lawpermittiing a mentally ill perso to be hospitalized without a court room jury trial unless a jury

"It appears to me that the pro posed amendment has been well worded," stated Governor Shi vers. "Every reasonable safeguard of the citizen's right ha been retained. The amendmen directs the Legislature to mak sure that a mentally ill perso would have access to a jury trie

"As I understand it, this is measure primarily to protect the health of the patient. Our doctor courtroom scene now required ! and psychiatrists report that the Texas law often has a very detrimental effect on the patient who is necessarily treated like a defendent in a criminal trial From my own experience as lawyer, I can readily believe that the doctors have an importan

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

Voters Adults good idea

The fact that a majority of voters say the annual-session-andhigher-pay proposal sounds like a good idea does not necessarily mean it will win approval in the November election. Campaigning will probably have a decisive effect, because not many people now have strong opinions on

amendment. As a matter of fact, a statewide poll completed in early July showed less than one per cent of the voters could recall this as one of the amendments that had been submitted by the legislature.

Two other important factors should be considered:

1. In a special election, statewide turnout is usually very small. One or two counties, because of a well-directed local campaign for or against a proposal, may make their votes count way out of proportion to their potential in the total electorate For example, in the 1947 election on the college building amend ment, Lubbock County had more weight in the election than Travis, a county with more than three times as many qualified voters What happened was that the turnout in Lubbock was 53 per cent while in Travis it was only 11 per cent. Lubbock was strongly and actively — opposed to the amendment, while Travis was

trongly in favor. 2. Many persons vote blindly at least on some issues in an election, according to other surveys by The Texas Poll.

The official ballot in the November election does not explain the annual-sessions-and higherpay amendment, thus increasing the chances of blind voting. On the official ballot, the proposal is merely identified as "the constitutional amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members. Any voter may mark the ballot "for" or "against" the proposal even though he doesn't know its
