Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. F. B. FITZWATER, D.D., Dean of the University of Chicago, (66, 1924) (Copyright, 1924, United States)

Lesson for April 22

JESUS AND THE HOME

LESSON TEXT.—Mark 10:1-16. GOLDEN TEXT.—Honor thy father and mother, which is the first commandment with promise. PRIMARY TOPIC.—Jesus Loves Little Children. JUNIOR TOPIC.—Jesus Wants Children to Honor Him. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC.—Being a Christian at Home. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC.—The Christian Family.

In this scripture we see Christ as a teacher.

1. Concerning Marriage (vv. 1-12). The question touching divorce, which the Pharisees temptingly put to Christ, brought forth teaching which exhibits marriage in its true light.

1. Marriage should not be degraded by divorce (vv. 1-5). Divorce was not instituted by God. God ordained the marriage relation and intended it to be indissoluble. Those who did not originate it or authorize it, but suffered, limited and regulated it. The reason Moses even suffered it was because of the hardness of the hearts of the people. The existence therefore and practice of divorce indicates the coarseness and perverseness of man. The real cause is sin. There is no more real evidence of the blighting effects of sin in the world than the increasing number of divorces.

2. Marriage God's primal law (vv. 6-8). The ideal law of life for the subjects of Christ's kingdom is marriage. This is proven by the fundamental fact of sex. "God made them male and female" (v. 6). The union of the male and female natures is physically and spiritually. In marriage the male and female natures are mutually complemented. "They twain shall be one flesh, so that they shall be one flesh," God's plan is that man should not be without the woman or the woman without the man (1 Cor. 11:11).

3. Marriage has God's sanction (v. 9). When God created Eve and brought her to Adam He performed the first marriage ceremony and declared that man should leave father and mother and cleave unto his wife. "What therefore God hath joined together, let no man put asunder."

4. Marriage of the divorced forbidden (v. 10-12).

The marriage relation should only be broken by death and sin. In response to the request of the disciples for further information He declared:

- (1) "Whoever shall put away his wife and marry another committeth adultery against me."
- (2) "If a woman shall put away her husband and marry another she committeth adultery."

11. Concerning Children (vv. 13-16) The union of the male and female natures, according to God's primal law of marriage, lays the foundation of family life. The normal issue of such a union is children. In connection with the divine law of marriage it is fitting that Jesus should set forth His estimate of children and show His interest in them. Christian men and women will regard children as the property of the Lord and will esteem it a high and holy privilege to train them for Him.

1. Children brought for the touch of Jesus (v. 13).

It is incumbent upon all parents to seek for the children personal contact with Jesus.

2. The parents rebuked by the disciples for bringing their children (v. 14).

They seemed to think that attention to children was beneath the dignity of Christ.

3. Jesus' reply (vv. 14, 15). He was displeased—really indignant at their words. He is displeased today over those who are hindering their children from coming to Him.

(1) "Suffer the little children to come unto Me and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of God" (v. 14). The kingdom belongs to the children.

(2) "Whoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child shall not enter therein" (v. 15). Those who count themselves morally helpless, and cast themselves upon Jesus Christ, the King, really enter the kingdom.

4. Jesus' action (v. 16). He took the children up in His arms, put His hands upon them and blessed them. Christ is the Savior of children. Where Christ's spirit rules, childhood is sacred and children have great care.

In many lovely patterns. For the center of the embroidered flowers you will need a few colorful beads, unless you prefer to fill in with French knots.

In covering the canvas in an over-and-over stitch be sure to embroider the leaves and flowers or conventional patterns, if so be it, first—filling in the background later.

After the needlework is completed a waxing process is necessary. This is done by brushing over with liquid transparent sealing wax. This gives not only a high finish, but it renders the articles water-proof.

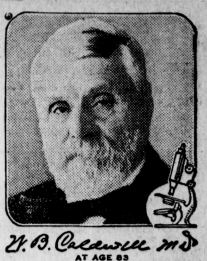

OUR SHALLOW WATER BELT

The development of the shallow water belt is receiving much consideration by our farmers and business men just now. The question of a more profitable plan of irrigation is the problem to be solved. It is a problem that will be solved within a few short years. The fact some of the irrigation which has been done so far was not as satisfactory as could have been is admitted to be due to lack of knowledge in the crops to be raised and when to put the water on the land.

We do not claim to know about irrigation. Especially in Bailey County. However, we do not believe that the increased production which irrigation might bring in crops such as sudan kaffir would justify the installation of an irrigating plant. We do believe that the man with thirty forty, sixty, or eighty acres, with a crop of alfalfa, a few good dairy cows, some poultry, and hogs for his meat will be the man that makes good in the irrigation business. It is being done here today by some, and can be done by others. We believe in irrigation. It is a good thing. Eventually it will be carried out in the Muleshoe shallow water belt but on the program of smaller farms, instead of one or two sections as some are advocating.

TEXAS AND TEXANS

Public Health Campaigns

Fully 150 Texas cities and towns conducted "health campaigns" of some kind during the first week in April, which was designated "Health Week". In some of these, the campaign was in the nature of a general cleanup of the unsightly and unhealthful accumulations of the past year—a sort of tidying up for spring after the fashion of the old-time annual house-cleaning—a united effort to make the place a bit more attractive looking. Some forty towns started movements for mosquito control. Others joined in the movement throughout the surrounding country for the extermination of rats and mice. In a large number of places the campaign was educational in character, taking the form of health plays, playground activities, better baby contests, lecturers, health sermons, poster contests and newspaper articles.

Perhaps we have yet to learn in Texas that intermittent health campaigns, while accomplishing some good are far from what they should be in getting results. Every city, every community, needs a permanent public health committee composed of people willing to work and having official authority to carry on health activities and to make and enforce health regulations—not for a week, but every week in the year.

More Cheese Factories

Round Rock has become the Mecca for Texas towns considering the building of cheese factories. When the factory was organized there last year cheese factories were almost unknown in Texas, and many people wagged their heads and predicted a failure for the enterprise. It started off slowly, and that caused more head-wagging. In less than three months it demonstrated that such an enterprise could be as successfully conducted in Texas as anywhere else. Now, other towns are wanting cheese factories, and almost every day there is a pilgrimage from some Texas town to Round Rock to learn just how cheese-making is done there. Rockdale and Bartlett are among the latest towns to study such an enterprise.

Town Planning

Mt Pleasant can hardly be called a city. It is a big town in East Texas, but not too small to emulate the plans of the larger "burgs". So, Mt. Pleasant has appointed a city plan commission, just like some of the large places have done, and that commission is working out a taxation plan, a street naming plan, free mail delivery, an advertising campaign, more paving a municipal band, fire prevention regulations, traffic laws, city beautification, and a lot of other things. If this work is kept up, Mt. Pleasant will be a successful city with all the airs of a city in a short time. A vision is an essential part of city growth as for individual growth.

Studying at College

Here is an idea from Taylor that would be worth something. Citizens of that town are organizing a caravan to go to the A. & M. College to spend a few studying poultry, livestock and agriculture. The town folks will ask their country neighbors to go with them. Country folks having cars will take along such as have no cars, and a road inspection and study will be made at the College of such things as

HAVE YOU A JEWEL BOX?

On a recent night a distressed debutante was heard complaining bitterly to a friend in a theatre lobby that she had made a ghastly error with her jewelry. In the unaccounted rush to make the first act of the play she had dizzily slipped on her black opals instead of the set of pink coral and pearls which had been specially designed for her mauve chiffon gown.

"I don't see how I could make such a silly mistake," she wailed. "These opals are expressly for my blue flowered tulle and my sily-green georgette. They don't go with this particular purplish dress at all."

Now that Paris has decreed a different set of ornaments for each change of costume, women of fashion are really having a hard time keeping track of their jewels. Life for them has become just one mish after another back and forth to the jewel box in the wall safe. And now all women are finding that a roomy jewel box is now a necessary adjunct to their dressing tables. Indeed, after at least half a century in which jewel boxes were regarded by most classes of women as funny antiques, the demand for them now is almost frenzied.

As a result, such boxes are being made in great abundance and variety, with elegant but practically velvet-lined interiors, equipped with two or three trays divided into several different compartments, each of which is large enough to contain a complete set of jewelry, including necklaces, several bracelets, earrings, brooches and rings. Fashioned of gold and silver, some ornamented with precious and semi-precious stones, others of wood and covered with ornamental leather, or of metal finished with ornate gold, inlaid with mother-of-pearl, in some cases or with colored enamels or painted landscapes on ivory in others, most of these modern jewel boxes are quite capable of holding their own beside the treasure chests of other ages.

The jewel box has played a major part in human affairs ever since the days when men first gathered around a tribal fire and agreed upon certain decorations which were to distinguish the tribal chief. The early chieftains and their wives did not happen to possess diadems and crowns studded with pearls and diamonds, but what ornaments they had were none the less dear to them and they were quite as intent upon putting them safely away where chance marauders would not see them. So the first jewel boxes were probably pouches made of skins.

Many centuries later—well, as late as the Middle Ages—jewelry set with precious stones (the stones that were then considered precious) was the chief form in which a man stored his wealth. With fighting the principal occupation and castles and lands changing hands with the outcome of

each battle, like chips at a poker party, it was very necessary to have some easily transportable form of wealth on hand to set the family up in another castle. Thus, the treasure chest of the Middle Ages was a stout wooden box with iron bands, but small enough and light enough to rest firmly on a loyal vassal's shoulder, and to be stored away behind a secret panel.

Only with the rise of commerce and banking facilities were really decorative treasure chests and cabinets introduced, designed for a more or less permanent place in a drawing room or boudoir. One of these which has passed into the collection of a European museum, bearing the date of 1630, is in walnut wood with ornamental panels carved with designs of fruit, flowers, birds and dolphins, and with inlays of stained green stag's horns and mother-of-pearl.

Marie Antoinette's jewel cabinet, which is now at Versailles and which bears the scars made by the swords and pikes of the mob that over-ran the Tuileries, is eight feet high and six feet wide of mahogany gilded, inlaid with mother of pearl and set with painted panels.
