

Farmers, Ranchers Urged To Buy Bonds; Plan Called "Powerful Aid" In Management

Dallas, Sept. 22. The value of financial reserves in farming and ranching operations will be emphasized in a special effort to sell U. S. Savings Bonds to farmers and ranchers of Texas this fall, Nathan Adams, state Savings Bonds chairman, announced today.

The program is now getting started with the cooperation of the major state and federal agricultural agencies, Adams said, and will extend into all of Texas' 254 counties. He said it would continue through October and possibly well into November.

Nearly all of the 385,000 farm and ranch families in the state will receive letters and printed literature about Savings Bonds, Adams said that the mailing lists of county agricultural agents and county representatives of the Production and Marketing Ad-

ministration (PMA), the Production-Credit Corporation (PCC), and the National Farm Loan Association (NFLA) are being utilized to achieve virtually 100 percent distribution in rural areas.

Adams said that other activities in the program will include distribution of 25,000 to 30,000 posters for display in banks, cotton gins, hardware and implement stores, and other places where farmers meet or transact business; distribution of special literature to vocational agriculture students; and supplemental projects to be undertaken by various agricultural and livestock associations.

"A financial reserve is a powerful aid for proper management of a business," Adams said, "and farmers and ranchers need such a reserve for their business just as much as do the merchant or

manufacturer. "We want the farmer and rancher to become as well acquainted as the city man with the value of savings Bonds as the means for acquiring financial security. Agriculture has always been a hazardous business, subject to sudden disasters such as flood, drought, epidemic in the livestock, or a sharp break in commodity prices. The farmer or stockman who builds a strong financial reserve for himself by investing in Savings Bonds during the good years protects himself against these emergencies.

"If emergencies fail to develop, his cash reserves are still available for buying more land, expanding production, replacing old buildings and equipment, home improvement, education of his children, or comfortable retirement in old age."

HEALTH NOTES

Austin, Texas, Sept. 28. Now is the time to have your baby protected from whooping cough, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Texas State Department of Health recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. There is many a child whose life could have saved if he had been immunized in infancy, said Dr. Cox.

"Whooping cough," said Dr. Cox, "first masquerades as an ordinary cold, with running nose and eyes, followed by a slight cough. These symptoms develop about 1 to 14 days after exposure. Then in about another week the cough develops into a series of continued attacks, in an effort to expel the troublesome mucous.

An attempt to breathe during the choking spell produces the characteristic whooping sound. In mild cases it may be absent. The whoop-

ing stage lasts 4 to 6 weeks and may then take another two or three weeks to decline gradually. Here are some facts about whooping cough:

1. The disease starts like a common cold, 1 to 14 days after exposure. In about another week the cough develops and the whooping usually begins.

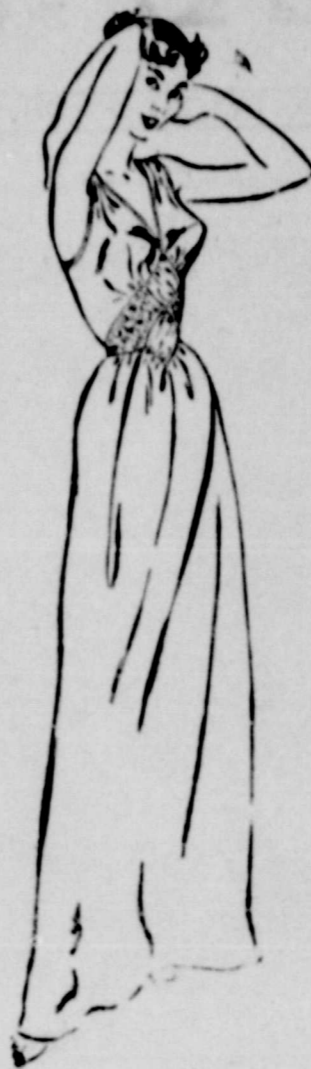
2. It is one of the communicable diseases children often catch at school. After a child has reached the age of five, fatalities occur less frequently. Children may carry this disease home to babies.

3. Most important of all is to see that infants are vaccinated against whooping cough, for most deaths occur among children less than one year of age.

4. Call your family physician at once if you suspect your child has whooping cough and follow his directions in detail."

Special studies show that more than 25 per cent of fatal home accidents occur in the bedroom. The yard and kitchen are the next most hazardous locations at home, causing about 12 and 10 per cent of the deaths respectively.

The cost of accidents continues to rise each year, according to the 1949 edition of "Accident Facts," statistical yearbook of the National Safety Council. The total costs of accidents in America in 1948 were about \$7,400,000,000 \$300,000,000 more than the year before and one billion dollars more than 1946.

Included in the 1948 accident costs are wage losses of about \$2,600,000,000; medical expenses of

\$450,000,000; \$1,250,000,000 in overhead costs of insurance; property damage in motor vehicle accidents amounting to \$1,100,000,000; fire losses of \$715,000,000 and a total of \$1,300,000,000 in miscellaneous costs of occupational accidents.

The average cost per injury in the United States last year was \$710. This is \$50 more than the average injury cost the year before and \$100 more than 1946.



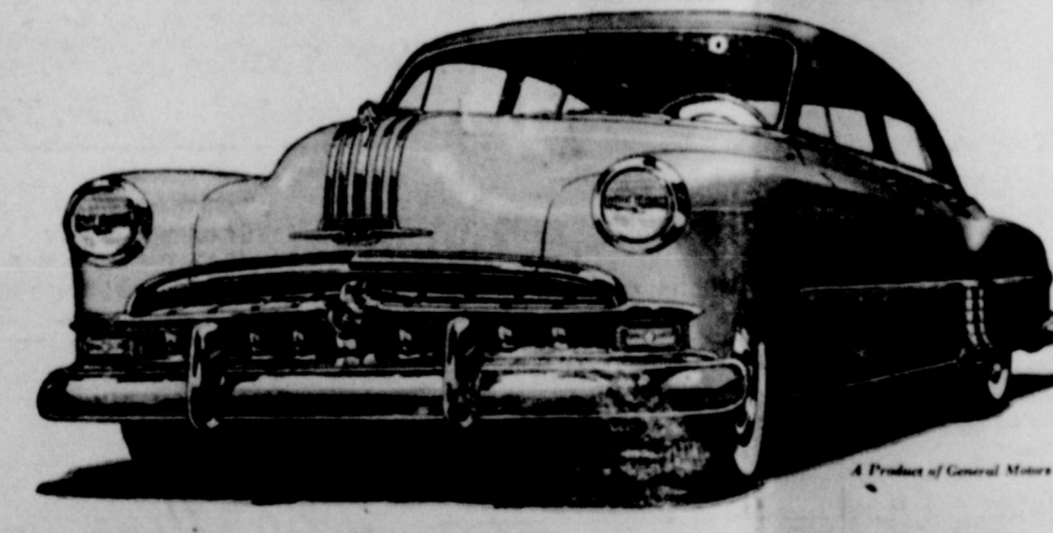

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Lubbock Rotarians Co-Sponsor Center For Childs Cerebral Palsy Treatment

A ground breaking ceremony for the new \$42,000 Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center was held Wednesday, September 21 at the time of the regularly scheduled meeting of the Lubbock Rotary Club, co-sponsors of the project.

The new building, to be located at 34th Street and Avenue M in Lubbock, will be a one story masonry construction providing facilities for physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy for the cerebral palsied.

The Treatment Center, at present located at 1317 Tenth Street in Lubbock, completed its first year of operation on August 22. During the year 202 cases of cerebral palsy were registered for treatment and 2997 treatments were given. Seven clinics were held with 289 examinations being made in clinic. Clinics were held at approximately two month intervals with two orthopedists specializing in the care of the cerebral palsied present to examine the patients in each clinic.

One fourth of the cases treated during the past year were two years of age or less when registered. The youngest child registered was five months of age.

Cases came to the Treatment Center from 80 towns and surrounding areas in Texas, New Mexico and Colorado, extending southeast 596 miles to Cuero, Texas and north about 325 miles to Dooly, Colorado.

Cases coming to the Center are referred by their local physicians or by orthopedic specialists. During the last year 102 physicians referred cases for care at the Center.

Facilities of the Treatment Center are available to all cases in
