





### YOU MEET SUCH INTERESTING PEOPLE by Robt. K. Christenberry

· When my friend Clyde Lewis was elected commanderin-chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Miami recently he set a precedent. Clyde's the first veteran of World War II ever to become head of a major veterans organization.

An unusual story goes with his election, because if it had not been for a strange quirk of war, the V.F.W. would be doing without Clyde's services, and the entire pattern of his life would be changed. It happened in 1945, when, after two years of overseas duty, he

returned from Europe. There he had been a B-17 pilot, Ffight Commander, Squadron Leader, and finally Wing Air Commander. He had



won, among other honors, the French Croix de Guerre, the Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, the Air Medal with four clusters, and the Distinguished Unit Citation with one cluster. Upon his return, he volunteered immediately for a tour of duty with the 8th Air Force in Okinawa, but regulations

would not permit approval, so rather than become a flight instructor, he was mustered out in 48 hours. After his honorable discharge, Clyde returned to his civilian job as member of the Plattsburg law firm of Feinberg and Jerry. He had graduated from Harvard Law School

Like many another veteran, Clyde had re-entered civilian life hady to forget the war, to forget that he was ever a soldier. He was aidy to put it all behind him, and to pretend that it had never happened. But here again chance stepped in, as it had when his Okinawa request was cordially set aside. He was lichy. His restlessness kept bim moving around, unsatisfied with a law firm. One afternoon I saw him and he seemed exuberant.

"What's happened?" I asked him. "Something great," he said. "I've had my eyes opened. I realize, for the first time since I was mustered out, that veterans are important, that we can't forget them, that veterans organizations need to be made stronger, so that the boys who fought the war won't have the memory of what they did wiped out."

What had happened was this. Clyde had met Col. Colin D. MacRae, deputy director of the executive department of the New York division of Veterans Affairs. Col. MacRae asked Clyde to become a State Veterans Counsellor. He accepted. And when he saw the plight of veterans he decided to jump in with both feet. Soon he was active in the V.F.W., and in 1948 was elevated to Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief, a job that found him averaging 25,000 miles a month to help veteransto study their problems and help them find solutions.







### PORT WORTH'S NEW SUPER THOROUGHFARE



Opening of this super thoroughfare in September marked the first step in the completion of Fort Worth's \$30,000,000 double expressway program which will criss-cross the city with two of the finest arterial trafficways in America. Aimed at relieving one of its severest growing pains, traffic congestion, the superhighways will extend east and west and north and south across the city, intersecting near the downtown business district. The opening unit, two miles in length, is at the south end of the north-south expressway. It underpasses the railway bridge above and three street crossings, one of which is visible in the background. Structural steel for the four bridges was supplied by U. S. Steel's Virginia Bridge Co. General contractors for the initial section were Austin Road Co., Dallas, and Worth Construction Co., Fort Worth. Sub-contractor for the steel structures was F. M. Reeves & Sons, Austin. A second 3.4-mile unit under construction on the western leg of the eastwest expressway is scheduled for opening early in 1951. Five major overpasses in this strip will be of steel, furnished by American Bridge Co., another U. S. Steel subsidiary. General contractors are Markham & Brown, Kearney-Crume & Co., Dallas; Austin Bridge Co., Dallas; Austin Road Co.; and F. M. Reeves & Sons. Reeves is handling construction of the five steel bridges.
