Exchange Student of Iran Visits Spur Experiment Station

"I find the kindness, tolerance and ideas of Spur citizens very impressive," were the sentiments expressed by Esmail Diba, Point 4 trainee exchange student from Tebran, Iran, who has been studying brush control, water conservation and cotton production at the Spur Experiment Station this last week.

Diba, who is a technical agricultural engineer and inspector for the Department of Inspection in Tebran, came upon invitation from the government to the United States on November 12, 1951.

Two months were spent in Washington, D. C. for orientation and then Diba was sent to Texas A & M College for a semester's work. Since that time he has observed experiment stations for study and will continue to do so until his return to Iran, November 12, 1952.

Since his arrival in the United States, Diba has covered some 15 states and finds the agricultural progress of this country "most impressive". On May 23, 1952, Diba attended the American Cotton Congress in Houston. Diba expressed the opinion that of all his travels, Iran in the Middle East is the quickest nation to grasp new ideas and put them into practice.

During a personal interview, Diba said, "I would like very much to thank Charles Taylor, Charles Fisher, and others of the experiment station who have been so kind and helpful and who are doing such a good job, especially in brush control."

Upon his departure from Spur, Diba will go to Vernon where he will visit the experiment station there.

He was accompanied to the United States by his wife who is visiting friends in New York. They have three children who are in Iran with their grandparents. This was the Diba's first trip to America.

Marion Reports On Rotary Convention

A report on the Rotary International Convention held in Mexico City in May was given by Paul Marion at the regular noon meeting of the Spur Rotary club, Thursday, July 10.

Preceding the program, the invocation was given by F. W. Jennings and one stanza of "America" was sung by the group.

In his report of the convention, Marion gave the attendance of the convention as 7,200 delegates and alternates, with 3,000 Rotary Clubs represented.

Marion stated that the majority of addresses given by Rotary leaders from all parts of the world, stressed community, international and vocational service that can and should be rendered by Rotary International. The purpose of Rotary, as Marion expressed it, is "advancement of understanding and peace."
