



The problem, quite involved, affects the nation's economic welfare and national safety. It is estimated 1,000,000 barrels

of foreign oil land in U. S. daily.
During 1952, 128,000,000 barrels
of residual fuel oil were imported. This residual fuel oil is upsetting U. S. economy. Residual fuel oil is a by-priduct of oil refining. In U. S. refineries this by-product amount to only 18 to 19% of total crude refined. But in the Caribbean and

The result has been that foreign oil undersells domestic coal for industrial users of fuel.

Last year, 30 million tons of coal were replaced by cheap foreign by-product fuel oil. This was a loss of \$150 million to the domestic coal industry, includ-ing \$90 million in wages. Also, independent U. S. oil pro-
