

### GM Builds First U.S. Gas Turbine Car



The XP-21 Firebird, first gas turbine automobile in the United States, has been announced by General Motors. In the cockpit, beneath a plastic bubble, is Test Driver Mauri Rose who put the car through shaledown paces at GM's proving grounds near Milford, Mich., and Phoenix, Ariz. The car's aero is namic styling has an aircraft motif with a "needle" nose, swept-back delta wings and vertical tail fin.

Because the gas turbine uses large volumes of air, the Firebird has scoops on either side of the driver's cockpit and a large tail cone for exhaust gas. Its kerosene burning engine, mounted at the rear of the driver's seat, consists of two mechanically independent parts, a gasifier section and a power turbine. The power turbine delivers power to the car's rear wheels via a two-speed transmission.

The Firebird is an experiment to determine whether gas turbines will be feasible for ground vehicles.

Korea Aftermath-UNKRA at Work

Korean Reconstruction Agency was at work trying to heal the wounds caused by war. One of the key tasks facing UNKRA in its reconstruction work, is the rehabilitation of Korea's shipping. Shown above (right) is the "Chin Hae Man" dredge purchased by UNKRA in Honolulu and shipped to South Korea where it will be used to reopen that nation's western harbors to peacetime navigation. At left is the United States Navy dry dock, "USS Ft. Marion," which transported the dredge from Hawaii to Korea.







Jam Youdis Talk Safety



What would you do if you had only one day to make your farm safer? That's what newsmen asked a group of young safety experts at the recent National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. They were winners of awards presented by General Motors in the National 4-H Farm and Home Safety Program.

"I'd declare a 'safety day' and turn out the whole family to locate and mark all hazards on the farm," was the answer of Margie Sellers, 17, Whitesboro, Texas Margie was one of eight national winners awarded \$300 cellege scholarships by GM-which also presented expense-paid trips to the 4-H Congress to both national and state winners among the 425,000 4-H youths who took part in the safety program. All the youngsters agreed that although safety demands continuing, day-by-day attention, it might be good to set aside one day for eliminating hazards—and then go at the job as though there would be no more time for it.

"It would make you decide what safety improvements were most

"It would make you decide what safety improvements were most important, and then concentrate on them," said George N. Fleming, 13, Simms, Montana. "I would check the things that get most use, such as farm mechinery and home appliances, and make sure that they were in safe operating condition."

Gayle Givens, 17, Frederick, Oklahoma, observed that a "safety day" would be a hard blow against one of safety's most dangerous chemicaprocrastination. She and Erich Willen, 17, Westminster, Maryland, both national, winners—said that if they had only one day for safety they would concentrate on the home.

"That's where most accidents happen," Erich explained. "I would check things like stairs, rugs, and medicines."

Hope E. Caswell, 17, Canton, New York, said she would concentrate on eliminating fire hazards.

"They are often the least obvious," she said. "And a bad fire is just about the most serious disaster that can hit a farm."

Other suggestions included proper storage of tools; building sturdy pens for livestock, and checking electrical equipment.



### Four Farm Machines In One



Today, thanks to a revolutionary farm machine, the modern farmer-businessman can now harvest all his crops with a compact, easy to handle, self-propelled unit.

The entire machine, called the Uni-Farmor, consists of one basic power (tractor) unit on which can be mounted a combine, a 2-row husker, a picker-sheller, and a forage harvester. Other machines are being studied and tested as possible additions to the Uni-Farmor line by the manufacturer, Minneapolis-Moline.


