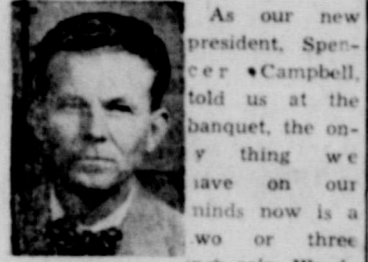

Some 18 members of the Dickens County Sheriff's Posse will leave Spur at 4 a. m. Sunday morning to represent Dickens county and the state of Texas at the Cow Pony Frolics at New Smyrna Beach, Florida.

The posse will play Palmetto Polo against two Florida teams as its part in the annual celebration there.

Mary Spur and Dickens citizens have donated cash to help pay the expenses for the team. The donations will be used largely to purchase movie and slide film to record the trip. The balance will be used for general expenses of the men and their horses.

The Texas team is due to arrive in Florida next Tuesday and will play Palmetto Polo on Friday and Sunday. The rest of the time will be spent as the official guests of the Frolics.

Reports from the hosts say that the entire celebration there will receive NBC television and radio coverage and also national newsreel attention.

Services will be held daily at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. Prayer meetings will be held for all ages at 7 p. m. each night.

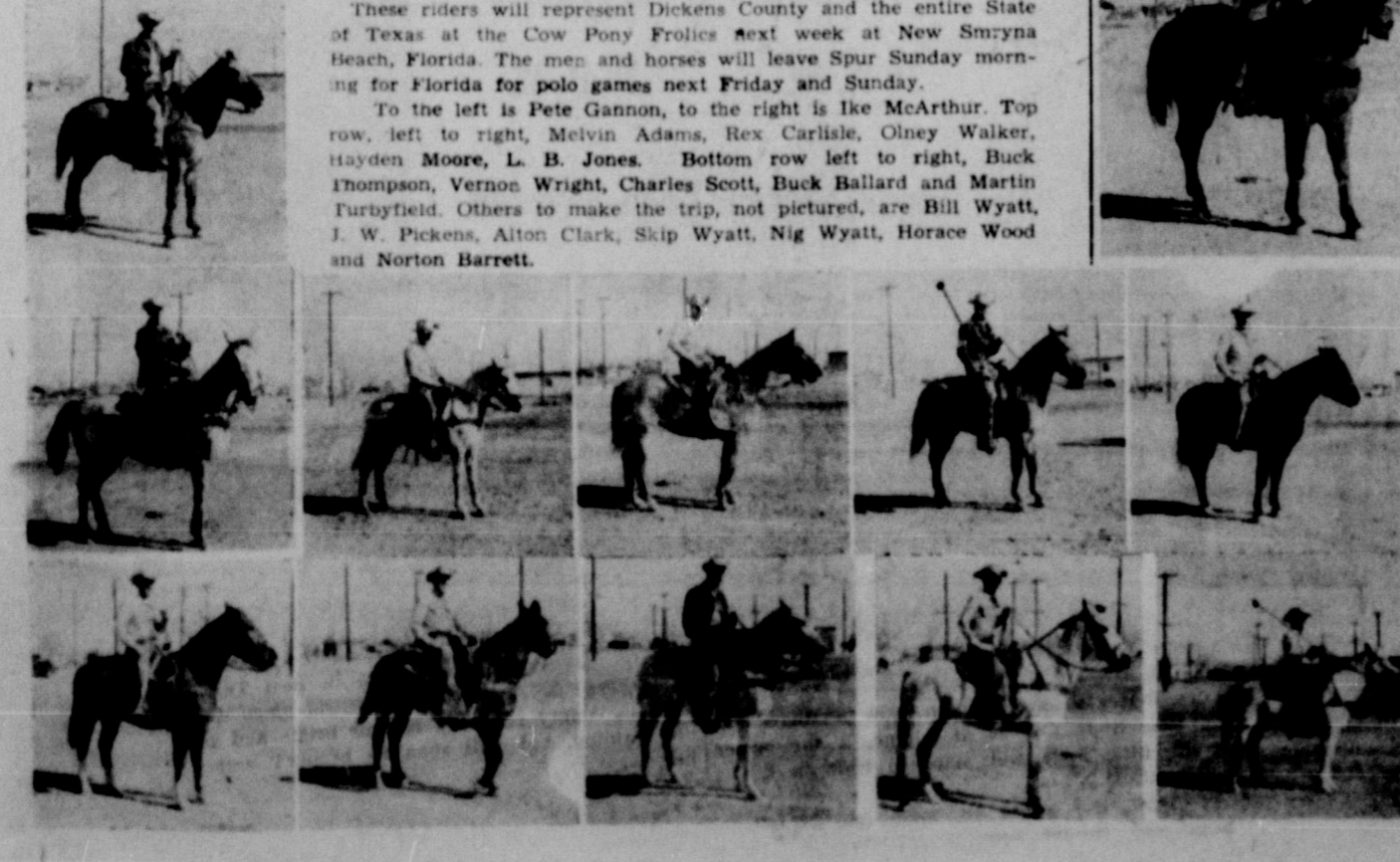
Mrs. Joe Trussell will accompany her husband to Spur and will conduct a pre-conference for intermediates at 7 p. m. each day.

Rare Mule Raised by Carlisle

Carlisle reports that the mule is the offspring of a 5-year-old Shetland pony and a 5-year-old Jenny. The cross is considered extremely rare, the only other one known about around here being a colt down at Post. The Post colt recently received publicity as the "only one in existence".

Dina is now a two-year-old and weighs approximately 400 pounds. She is coal black and has just recently been broken for riding. Carlisle states that his son, Kenneth, now a student at Sul Ross State College at Alpine, is the owner of the little mule and plans to train her as a trick animal.

"Stukie" the father of Dina, has frequently been seen around Spur in parades, at ropings,

and around the sheriff's posse's polo grounds. The mother died last year just two weeks before another such hybrid colt was due. She was five years old and was brought to the Carlisle farm southeast of Spur from the Big Bend country.

Carlisle has been raising and working mules in the county since he returned from the army in World War I. He states that the only time, prior to the Post colt and his own mule, that he had ever heard of a cross between a horse and a Jenny was "many years ago in East Texas."

Dina is now on the Billy Carlisle place down in Kent county receiving further bridle and saddle training, but will soon be brought back to her home on the Brink Carlisle place.

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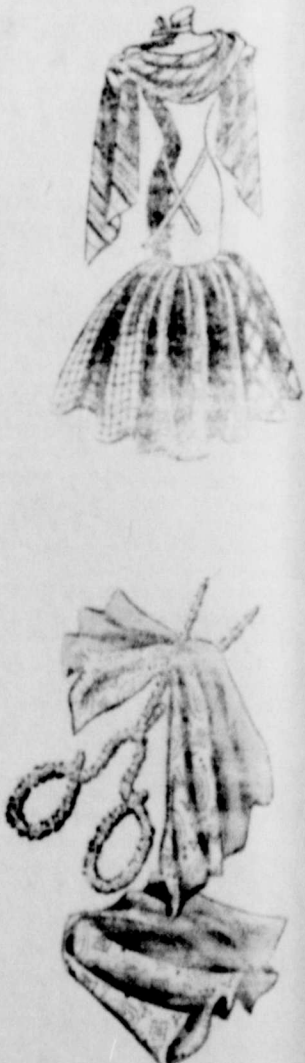

Farmers Asked To Report Unused Acres

Cotton farmers of Dickens county who do not intend to plant all or any part of their 1954 allotment should report such intentions to the county committee, states D. P. Smiley, Farm Bureau field agent. Smiley states that the farmer who releases his 1954 acreage will not affect his future allotment if he planted any cotton in 1952 or 1953. By releasing his unplanted acreage the other cotton farmers will receive larger allotment to make up the difference. If the unplanted acres are not reported and reallocated the entire county will be adversely affected in future years, Smiley explains. "Whether reallocated or not, the farmer who releases unplanted acres gets credit for them in future years and also helps other farmers who want to plant cotton this year, and also will help preserve the history acreage base of the county and state," says Smiley. "Check with the county committee for dates on when the acres must be released, then come by the Farm Bureau office and pay your dues. Looks like we farmers better hang together or we may be strung up separately," concludes Smiley.

Clifford Jones Gives Historical Records To Tech Library

A detailed account of the opening of the Mackenzie Trail which crossed Dickens county, and other historic accounts of the history of Dickens county make up the report recently presented to the Texas Tech library by Clifford B. Jones, president emeritus. The extensive record includes countless historical references by some thirty early settlers and soldiers who helped open this part of the state. The account also includes much of the history of Kent and Crosby counties. The complete report is available at the Tech library for the benefit of any research at any time which might be desired, according to a letter received this week by City Manager Homer Hindman.

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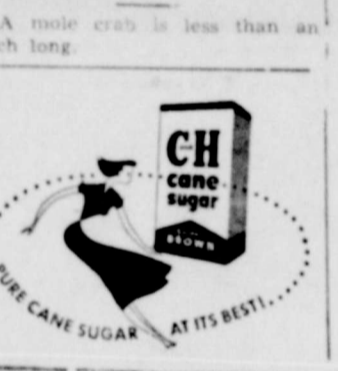

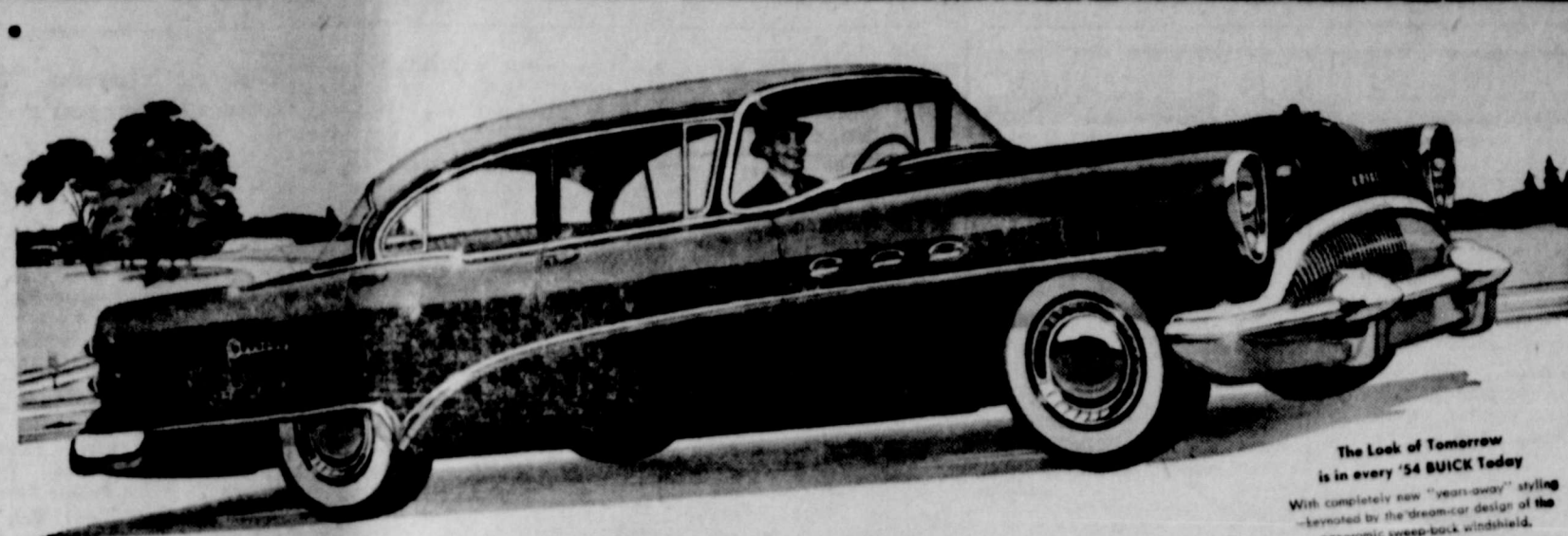

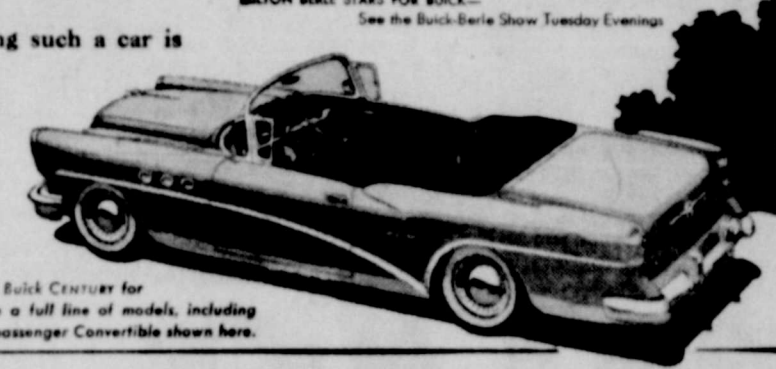

George Stevens' "Shane" Is Heralded As One Of Screen's All-Time Great Films

Ever since the first motion picture glorified the strong silent men who fought for law and order on the Western plains, producers have been improving on this ever popular theme. Alan Ladd, in what is reported to be the finest role of his career, is seen as Shane, the fast-shooting stranger who befriends the homesteaders; Van Heflin and Jean Arthur are a hearty, sweet-stained, but nevertheless handsome farm couple; their lovingly precocious son is Brandon De Wilde, a promising new arrival, reported to be the most winning moppet to appear on the screen in recent years; Jack Palance as the sinister gunman and Emile Meyer as the bearded ring leader of the ranchers, have won the plaudits of preview audiences.

From all advance reports it seems safe to say that "Shane" is a milestone in film production. It contains all the active ingredients of superlative film fare, plus deep penetration of character that reportedly make it a rare triumph.

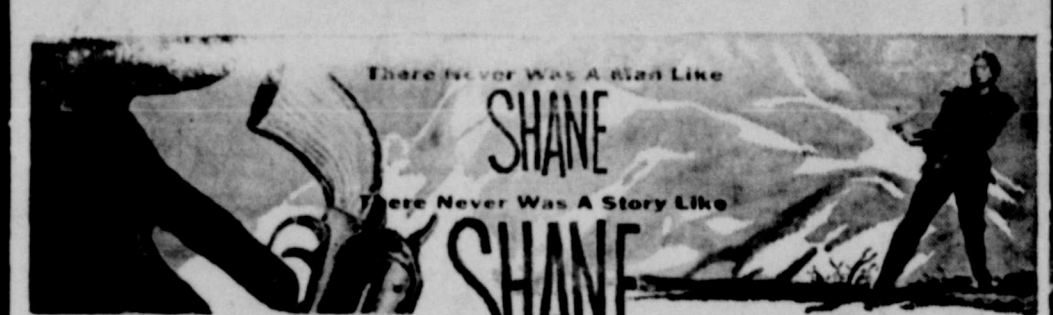
