### Mayor Proclaims City Clean-Up Week

#### PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the City of Spur, its officials and its citizens, realize the definite benefits of a clean city, and have, through the Spur Chamber of Commerce, set the week beginning Sunday, May 16, 1954, as a general clean-up week; and

WHEREAS the safety of our citizens' lives and property is directly affected by the cleanliness of our city, being directly proportionate to the correction and elimination of both fire and accident hazards; and

WHEREAS the proper cleanliness of our city is regard to the sanitary storing, removing and disposing of garbage has a direct bearing on the health of our citizens by eliminating the breeding places of flies and mosquitoes; and

WHEREAS the beauty and attractiveness of our city is conducive to happier living for both our citizens and our visitors, be it therefore

PROCLAIMED that the week of May 16-22 be an official City Clean-Up Week for the City of Spur, with the entire citizenry requested, urged and instructed to take such measures as are necessary to clean up residences, vacant lots, alleys and business properties, with the full cooperation of the officials and employees of the City of Spur.

## MORE RAINS ADD TO PROSPECTS FOR BUMPER CROP IN COUNTY

Clearing skies and a warmup is due to take over in the Spur and South Plains area today following a cool spell which dumped from 2 1/2 to 4 inches of rain over the county area.

The Spur Experiment Station recorded a total of 2.89 inches Monday and Tuesday of this week. Unofficial gauges in other parts of the area caught upward to four inches during the same period.

The general rainfall further boosted area crop outlooks as farmers now claim enough moisture in the soil to insure at least a fair crop regardless of additional rainfall. A few well-placed showers during the growing season could boost prospects up to the mythical bale-to-the-acre height.

Several cotton farmers over the county planted cotton following the early April rains and in many cases had a good stand before this week's rain. However, there has been no regret indicated over the washed-out cotton as the farmers welcomed the additional moisture in spite of having to plant over. The cool spell had deterred the growth of the early cotton anyway, to the extent that it wouldn't have been very far ahead of that which will be planted as soon as fields are dry enough to work.

Farmers are expected to take to the fields en masse as they dry out, to plant the cotton crop that both farmers and businessmen alike have looked forward to for at least four years.

## FOUR-POINT PROGRAM OUTLINED; VOLUNTEERS TO CLEAN UP PARK

Spur will be a cleaner, safer, more attractive town come next Saturday. It is indicated by the enthusiasm behind the city-wide clean-up program being sponsored by the Spur Chamber of Commerce with the full cooperation of the City Hall.

The program is designed with a four-fold purpose, state's chamber manager Norton Barrett. He and the various committees and individuals backing the project have outlined it to cover (1) sanitation, (2) fire hazards, (3) accident hazards, and (4) city beautification.

Under the sanitation emphasis, citizens are urged to clean up and out all likely breeding places for flies and mosquitoes, and to obtain and use satisfactory covers for outdoor garbage containers.

Fire and accident hazards that the program aims to eliminate include untidy and dangerously located lumber and scrap piles, unusable and unsightly scrap lumber, iron, stone, etc., and numerous other conditions that invite disasters around the home or business.

The city beautification part of the program necessarily includes the other three divisions, but also includes the weed-cutting and grass-mowing on vacant lots and alleys. The main project under this division of the clean-up campaign is an all-out work period in the city park on Monday afternoon.

Dr. Joe Alexander, chairman of the civic improvement committee will direct the park clean-up, with the assistance of Barrett, the employees and the approximately 60 other volunteer workers who are expected to show up for duty at that time.

Dr. Joe states that plenty of ice-cold soft drinks will be available for those who will help in this effort to beautify Spur's favorite picnic and recreation area.

The city's garbage collection crew will be on continuous duty throughout the clean-up week to collect and dispose of the rubbish to be removed from the city. They will have two trucks at the park Monday to haul away the trash to be gathered there.

Barrett states that the success and ultimate results of the clean-up depends entirely on the individual's participation by doing his share in the over-all program and on his own premises.

## Women Over 70 Honored Here Tuesday By WSCS

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Perilous and humorous incidents of pioneer days in West Texas were vividly recalled Tuesday afternoon, May 11, at the annual Rosemary Party given by the women of the First Methodist Church for all women of the area 70 or over.

Forty-seven women braved the heavy showers and accepted the invitation to "put on your perkiest bonnet and come early." As they entered the receiving room, they were presented with a corsage of pastel organza bonnets tied with pink radiance roses.

Following a welcome address by Mrs. W. F. Gilbert, president of the W. S. of C. S., and a prayer of thanks by Mrs. Matt Howell, Mrs. C. A. McCully spoke on the meaning of rosemary, explaining it was for remembrance, in which younger women took the occasion to let mothers and grandmothers know that they are not forgotten.

Highlight of the program was the self-introduction of guests. After identifying themselves, they gave memorial experiences of their early residence in Spur and Dickens County.

### Came In Covered Wagon

There was Mrs. W. L. Hyatt, who accompanied her family to Dickens County on October 25, 1890, from Jack County. They came in a group of three covered wagons, bringing 300 head of cattle and 15 head of sheep. Mrs. Hyatt has the distinction of be-

ing the first bride in Dickens County and she merrily recalled her wedding, read in 1891 in a school house. She and her bridegroom had planned to go to Lubbock and enroute, stopped at the Matador Hotel. That night, cowboys, decorating for a Christmas ball, set the hotel afire. "My trousseau was burned," she recalled, "we lost everything in the fire, and there was nothing for us to do but to return to the ranch."

Mrs. Tol Merriman, who was born in a log house near Weatherford in 1878, described her early life at the Spur ranch, which began when she was 12 years old. Her parents were cooks at the ranch and it was there she met the man with whom she exchanged marriage vows in 1894. To this union five sons and a daughter were born.

There was Mrs. F. A. Manley, whose book, "The Doctor's Wyoming Children", was published late last year. Mrs. Kate Senning recounted humorous incidents when she served as an early day postmistress.

### First Shopping Trip

Mrs. Samantha Smith, who lived in Dickens County longer than any other resident, told of her exasperation at arriving home after her first shopping trip in Bryant-Link to discover that somewhere along the way her purchase of a corset had fallen from the wagon. This brought a smile from Mrs. Geo-

rge S. Link, who also was one of the honorees.

A singsong was led by Mrs. Jack Moore, love gifts were presented, a quartet made up of Dean Reagan, Jane Ann Albin, Sandra Watson and Gail Williams sang old-time songs and Mrs. John Green played accordian numbers, accompanied by Miss La Nelle Marcy.

Extending well wishes were the pastor and his wife, Rev. and Mrs. Cal C. Wright.

### Victorian Motif Used

Refreshments were served from a table laid in a Victorian pattern. Pink net caught at intervals with nosegays which ran over a pink damask cloth. At one end of the table an arrangement of roses and larkspur was placed and flanking the table were floor wicker baskets of larkspur.

DUCK CREEK SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS NOTES

W. R. Murchison, district co-operator, who lives in the Wichita Community, has been selected as the district's top conservation farmer of 1953, announced Charles P. Witt, board chairman. There are approximately 1900 cooperators in the district which comprises all of Kent and Garza Counties and most of Dickens County.

Murchison has been a co-operator since March 15, 1951. He has applied numerous conservation measures including contour farming, terracing, cover crops, residue management, proper range use, improved water applications, irrigation reservoirs, spreader dams and livestock water dams.

Native grass and Blue Panic grass planting has been the number one activity of cooperators during the last few weeks. Soil conservation service technician, John H. Taylor, estimates that approximately 4000 acres will be planted in the Spur and Dickens area this spring.

J. H. Gibson, near Glenn, has recently completed a terrace system on his farm lands. A diversion terrace was also constructed to supplement the terraces in taking care of his water.
