Ward, Offield, Finch, Arrington Win Election

SUPT., PRE. 3 COMMISSIONER RACES SET FOR AUGUST 28 RUN-OFF

Approximately 2,000 Dickens county voters joined in the balloting last Saturday and placed one county-wide race and one precinct race on a run-off ticket along with Shivers and Yarborough.

For Dickens County school superintendent, the voters will choose on Aug. 28 between Robert Williams and Moyné Kelly. Here in precinct 3 the commissioner run-off will be between Arner Watson and Floyd Green. Fred Arrington retained his job as Dickens County - District Clerk in a 1136 - 691 race with R. H. (Rob) Simmons.

Incumbent Roy Ward defeated John P. Sharp for commissioner of precinct 1 by a 346 - 112 margin.

In precinct 2 E. J. Offield retained his commissioner's post with a 120 - 75 victory.

For constable of precinct 2, C. A. Finch defeated Roscoe P. McCombs 547 - 460.

The race for county school superintendent proved to be the closest one in the county with less than 200 votes difference between the top and the third runner, and only 35 difference between the top two. Incumbent Robert Williams received 472 votes, while Floyd Green ran second and enters the run-off with 209, or just 19.1% of the 1090 votes cast. Others in

Flames Destroy Spur Inn

Destruction of Historical Landmark Brings Back Many Fond Memories



Pictured above enveloped in flame, as hundreds of Spur residents, both old-timers and new-comers, viewed the famous landmark on Tuesday evening, is the Spur Inn. The Inn, known throughout West Texas for its comfort and hospitality since its construction following its construction in 1910.

Stucco walls, a handful of water-soaked and debris-laden furniture and a town-full of fond memories of days gone by are all that remain of the historical Spur Inn that was all but totally destroyed by fire Tuesday night.

The flame of undetermined origin broke out in the three-story vacant landmark around 10:30 p. m. Tuesday and raged on until the early morning hours. The Spur Volunteer Fire Department pumped hundreds of gallons of water into the inferno that shot flames a hundred feet into the air, and brought the blaze into control before the building was totally destroyed. Remaining unburned but water-soaked and thoroughly smoked were most of the east side rooms and other parts of the main floor.

Actual damage in dollars was estimated around \$35,000 but is overshadowed by the historical and sentimental loss of one of West Texas' most famous landmarks.

The Inn was one of the very first permanent buildings in the pioneer town of Spur, having been built in 1910 by the Swensons. On March 11, 1924, fire struck the first time at the structure, leaving only the stucco and brick walls and partitions. It was soon thereafter reconstructed and had been in constant operation up until several months ago it was closed. Recently only the famous ball room had been used for dances and other celebrations.

According to Fire Chief John King, Jr., the flame started in the west part of the attic and quickly spread through the aged roof and ceilings. Because of the physical shape of the building and the location of the flame, they met difficulty in effectively combating the fire until the second story ceiling fell through.

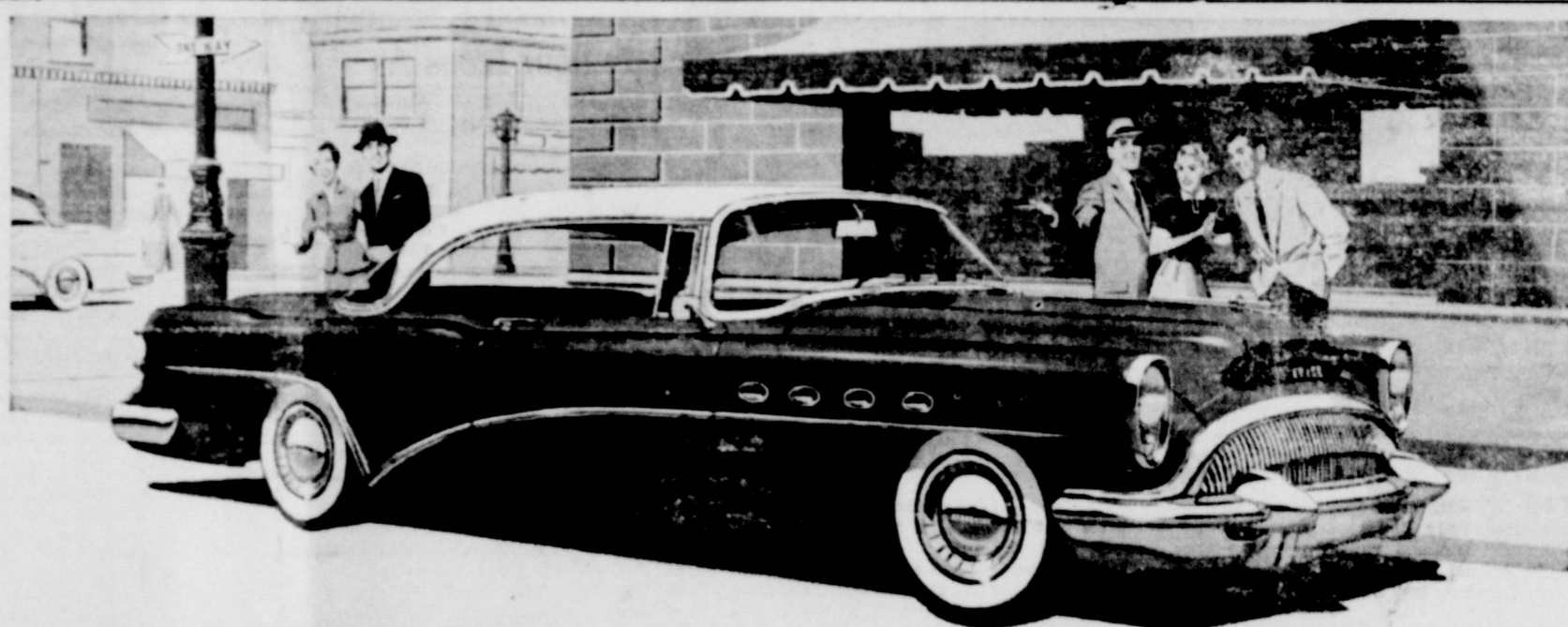

On his 553 stock farm, he had 136 acres of crop land terraced and on the contour. He had 25 acres of cover crops for residue management.

Under a rotation grazing program he had 400 acres of range land. He seeded 38 acres of pasture and had 33 acres in a rotation hay and pasture program.

He installed an irrigation system including 600 feet of pipe and bench-levveled 18 acres. He constructed one irrigation reservoir for flooding and constructed 12 spreader dams. He has two livestock dams stocked with fish.

Murchison was introduced by J. H. Taylor, SCS employee, who also told of the accomplishments of the Dickens County farmer.

Lions President Alfred Walker presented the plaque from the club. C. P. Witt, a director of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District, and Arner Watson, county commissioner, were also special guests of the club.

Following the presentation, Taylor showed slides of area conservation work.

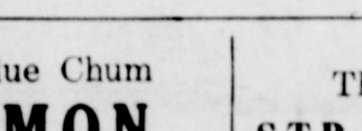
