HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. a proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 18t to Article VIII to provide that in sounties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding consus of the United States, elections may be held to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes: providing for submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas: and providing the time, means and manner thereof.

IE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA.

TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorised county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the first flowed as a in provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in that State."

Sect. 2. The Foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified election in the State at the Ceneral Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tureday after the first flowing in November. 1954. at which election all heliots shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Considitional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes.
