A friendly reminder — Three signs put up as reminders to citizens on the 600 block of W. Ave. D were posted on a dumpster over the weekend by a "neighborhood friend." One proclaims that "Flies Cause Disease" and another makes a plea to the neighborhood to help keep the block clean and free of flies by containing all trash in bags or closed boxes to prevent cats from spreading trash. The sign also asks readers to "please close the (dumpster) lids to keep cats out and flies from laying eggs in the trash and contaminating our food in our homes and backyard parties." The third sign closely examines the common house fly. According to the sign, "The common house fly (Musca domestica) is a nuisance as well as being a carrier of disease to man and domestic animals. In just two weeks, one fly may lay more than 1000 eggs in animal excrement, garbage, kitchen refuge, piled lawn clippings or other decomposing plant and animal matter." The passage goes on to give some sanitation advice when dealing with the house fly, including washing trash cans thoroughly before trash bags are used and securing (tying) trash bags before disposing of in an outdoor container.

Tax free weekend

The law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.




