City of Ralls Invited To Join White River Dam Project

GROUP APPROVES CORE DRILLING BID AT MEETING HERE SATURDAY

The City of Ralls was invited to join the White River Lake project along with Spur, Post and Crosbyton at a meeting of the project committee in Spur Saturday, March 17.

The invitation was to have been delivered by the Crosbyton delegation. It came as the result of the report of Col. Freeze of the Freeze and Nichols engineering firm of Fort Worth that the proposed lake will supply sufficient water for all four cities.

Ralls has been offered the opportunity to join the project on an equal basis with Spur, Post and Crosbyton. The committee asked that Ralls, express its desires before core drilling starts. To become a member city, Ralls will be required to submit to the treasurer of the committee its pro rata share of initial expense based on \$1.11 per water meter.

CORING CONTRACT APPROVED

The core drilling bid of Mason-Johnson Associates of Dallas was accepted by the committee at \$2872.50. Col. Freeze told the group in Spur Saturday that the core drilling on the proposed dam site will take approximately four weeks to complete. The report of the drilling will determine whether or not the selected dam site is suitable, based on the presence of absence of gypsum.

The engineer told the committee that if gypsum is found at the first site, approximately one mile north of the White River, two more sites up river will be explored. One is approximately two miles on up river and the third is still further north.

Mason Galloway, representing Henry, Seay and Black of Dallas, and Jack Morris, representing R. A. Underwood company of Dallas, both bond companies, met with the committee and explained the roles played by fiscal agencies, in setting up such a project. The committee received proposals from the two firms but did not act on them at the meeting.

Dr. M. H. Brannen of Spur, representing the city, said that before we get all confuddled and befused on the approaching school bond election, let's see if we can break it down into layman language and reach a reasonable conclusion.

First, may we assume that the school district is ready and willing to build a new high school an make other needed improvements and repairs.

Now, to do this, and do it now, ALL THREE PROPOSITIONS to be submitted to the voters on March 30 MUST CARRY.

The first one, pertaining to Senate Bill 116 simply authorizes a higher bonded indebtedness percentage-wise, in respect to the district's assessed value. This is necessary to make a \$500,000 bond issue legally possible.

The second proposition is merely for or against the bond issue.

The third proposition will provide the district maintenance funds to operate on. It is necessary because with our present tax rate maximum enough tax money could not be levied to retire the bonds and continue to operate the schools.

Briefly, we'll put it this way: No. 1 is the authority to go in debt. No. 2 is the debt itself. No. 3 is the money to stay in business while we are paying off the debt.

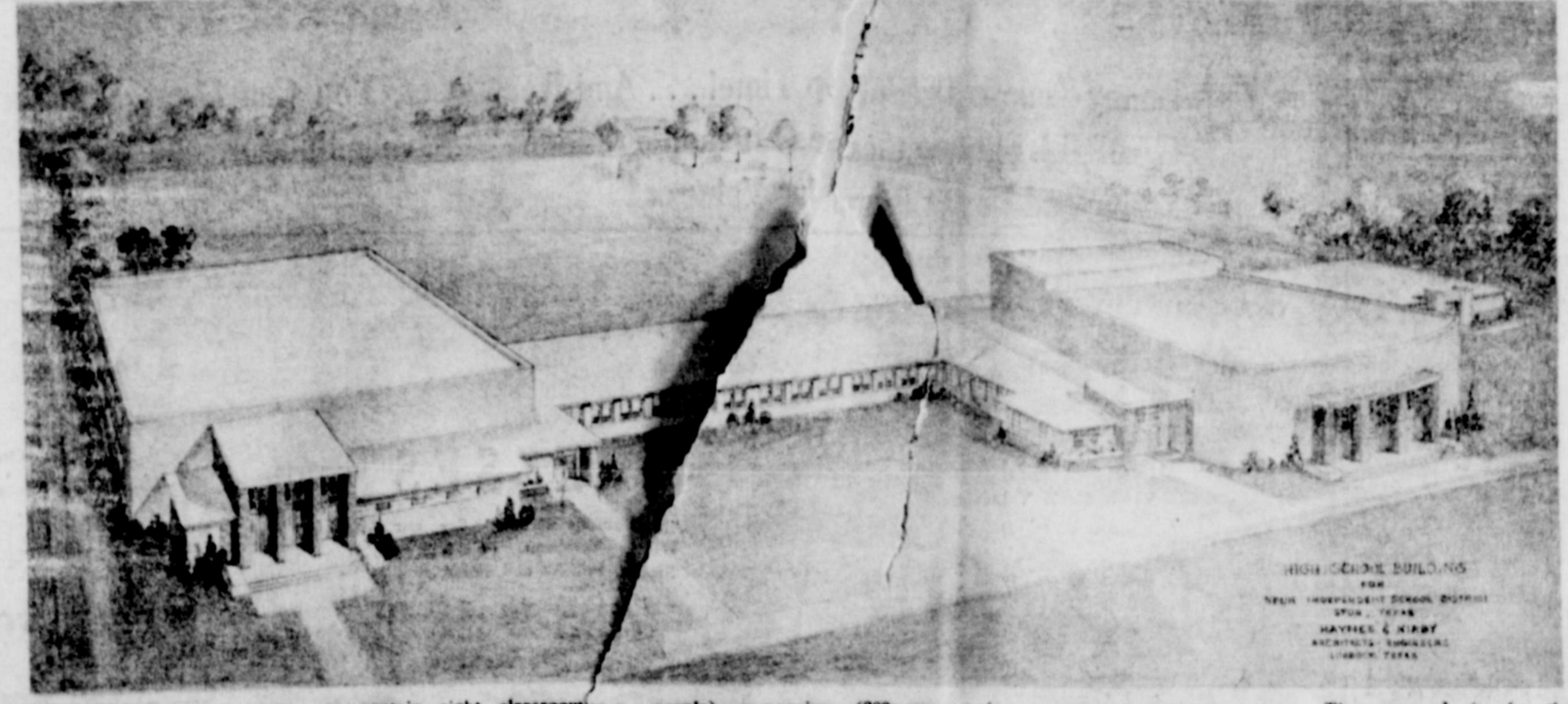
And what will all this amount to the tax payer? Briefly, and simply, it will double present school taxes. In round figures, it looks about like this to us: last year's tax collection amounted to \$68,000. If we approve all three propositions next Friday, next year approximately \$113,000 must be collected. (We'll add here, however, that approximately \$20,000 of this will be included in the operational budget to care for long-needed improvements in the yearly operation and maintenance of the entire system.)

We can have better school facilities only if we are willing to pay for them. Are we?

ent members of the Authority and investigate just what and how much assistance might be available for the White River project through that government agency.

The committee voted to meet next on April 21 in Crosbyton, or the Saturday following the completion of the core drilling. It was suggested however, that if Ralls wishes, to join the project, the committee would consider meeting there for their next meeting.

Attending the Saturday meeting in Spur were Tom Boucher, chairman, Rube Jennings, and Mr. Sampson, all of Post; Dr. Dale Rhodes, Perry Bell and Robert Works, all of Crosbyton; and L. D. Ratliff, Hobert Lewis and Lynn Burbee, all of Spur. In a preliminary meeting several area ranchmen and businessmen met with the committee.



Above is the architect's conception of the proposed new Spur High School building. The bonds to build this building will be voted on Friday, March 30. The new building is planned to contain eight classrooms, a commercial department, science laboratory, home-making department, study hall-library, cafeteria (adequate to seat 300 people), band hall, auditorium (for 1,000 people), gymnasium (800 city), administrative offices, and teachers lounge.

In the drawing above, the cafeteria is at the extreme right. Adjacent to it is the auditorium. At the extreme left is the gymnasium.

Not in the drawing, but a proposed part of the overall project is an agriculture building to contain two lecture rooms, office, library and shop, and also new dressing rooms at Jones stadium.

The proposed site for the above building is the block on which the present junior high building is. The new structure will extend almost the entire north and south length of that block.

Second Election To Be Held Here Mar. 30

Public Meeting Called For March 29 To Discuss Tri-Ballot Election

A \$500,000 school bond election has been called by the board of trustees of the Spur Independent School District for Friday, March 30.

Also to be voted on at the same time will be two other propositions relative to the system's tax set-up.

According to the election notice Proposition No. 1 calls for the adoption of and application to the Spur district Senate Bill No. 116. This bill authorizes a school district to assume bonded indebtedness up to 10 per cent of its assessed valuation. Under the present set-up, the Spur district may not exceed 7 per cent of its assessed value.

Proposition No. 2 calls for the approval of the \$500,000 bond issue and authority to assess, levy and collect such ad valorem taxes as are necessary to retire such bonds.

Proposition No. 3 calls for the authorization of a further ad valorem tax for local school maintenance.

It will be necessary, states Lloyd Hindman, school board president, for all three propositions to carry to build the new high school at this time.

The board has called for a public meeting next Thursday, March 29 in the East Ward auditorium.

States Hindman, "Due to the unusual way in which this issue is to be voted upon, we have asked for this meeting for the purpose of acquainting the patrons with the exact way in which their money will be spent, and also to inform them of the ways of casting ballots. There has been some confusion as to who can vote on this issue and it is hoped that a large number of interested people will attend to inform themselves of the issues involved."
