Extension Granted Soil Bank Signers

Cotton and wheat farmers have been granted a seven-day extension to enter the 1956 Soil Bank program and now have until Friday, July 27, to sign an agreement.

Time has also been extended to destroy cotton on Soil Bank cotton land, reports W. W. Gunn, county ASC office manager. Cotton on Soil Bank land must now be destroyed by August 3.

Gunn points out that the cotton that is currently being measured in the county is only for compliance with acreage allotments and has nothing to do with Soil Bank acreage. He states that Soil Bank acreage measurements will start after August 3.

Approved As Drouth Area

Notice was received by the local ASC office on Monday that Dickens County has been approved by the State Drouth Board as a drouth area county. Approval from Washington is expected any day, states Gunn. He adds that this could mean Dickens County farmers will get permission to graze Soil Bank lands before Jan. 1, 1957.

The request was submitted to the state committee on Friday, July 13.

Election Postponed

Due to the current rush in all ASC offices, the State ASC committee has ruled that the election of community and county ASC committeemen be postponed from August to September.

The Dickens County nominating committee had already been appointed and had met prior to this ruling, so its action will remain in force, changing only the date of the election.

The nominating committee met last Friday, July 20, and nominated 10 men from each community as candidates for community committeemen and chairmen.

Three members of the Spur chapter of Future Farmers of America will receive Lone Star Farmer degrees at the awards banquet tonight at the State FFA Convention in Dallas.

Candidates Winding Up Campaigns; Election Saturday

Three-Way Sheriff, Commissioners Races Add Local Spice; Precinct Conventions Sat.

Saturday, July 28, is Democratic Primary Election Day. Candidates are now winding up their campaigns, shaking hands and passing out cards hurriedly to get on to another prospective vote. Electioneering on the local scene has been reasonably quiet with candidates relying primarily on their own qualifications and merits without harping on their candidates faults.

The sheriff's race and two commissioners' races head the local action, with the constable's contest close behind.

Competing with the local and county races for coffee-talk and drug store comment is the race for district attorney. This contest pits H. A. C. Brummett against incumbent John Stapleton—both well-known in and around Dickens County.

Also of interest and concern of Dickens County voters is the candidacy of District Judge Alton B. Chapman against incumbent Herbert C. Martin for Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District.

Polls over Dickens County will open Saturday at 8 a. m. and will close at 7 p. m. Voting will take place in Spur at the City Hall for East Spur and at the Dickens County Electric Co-op. office for West Spur. The other precincts will vote at their regular places.

At 10 a. m. Saturday the precinct conventions will be held to start the chain of conventions leading up to the national convention. (See last week's paper for meeting places.)

Election judges in East Spur will be Miss Hazel Watson, judge; Robert Williams, assistant judge; and clerks Ann Blumberg, M. H. Brannen, Rena Noack, Virgie Dunwoody and Mamie Bachman.

In West Spur, Raymond Powell is judge with clerks Mrs. Jack Simmons, Mrs. Jesse Hindman, Mrs. Selbia Foreman and Mrs. Dorothy Wright.

Election judges throughout the county will call results in to No. 30, Spur, where they will be totaled and displayed.

FHA Backs National Farm Safety Week

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, has asked that all FHA employees do everything they can to help promote farm safety and encourage greater effort in helping to reduce the tragedies and losses caused by needless accidents, John E. Quattlebaum, County Supervisor, advised today.

The President has proclaimed this week as National Farm Safety Week. In urging full participation in this campaign, McKay stated that in one year farm accident toll was 14,500 killed and 1,250,000 injured. In addition, the money loss represented by farm accidents and also by fires probably runs around a billion dollars a year—the human misery can't even be measured, he adds.

"It is the policy of Farmers Home Administration to promote safety among its borrowers as part of its service to farm families," McKay states. "We don't think of safety as separate and part of our entire program. Our distinct but as an inseparable three safety aims are:

"First, to improve the health and welfare of families by eliminating safety hazards on farms and in homes; second, to reduce families' financial losses caused by accidents and fires; and third, to make farm production more efficient by reducing or minimizing accidental injuries and illnesses."

In summary, McKay advised that FHA is interested in every borrower making his farm a safe place to live and work, while he improves his family's economic condition. The two go together, and the lack of one can be the undoing of the other.

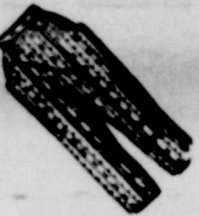

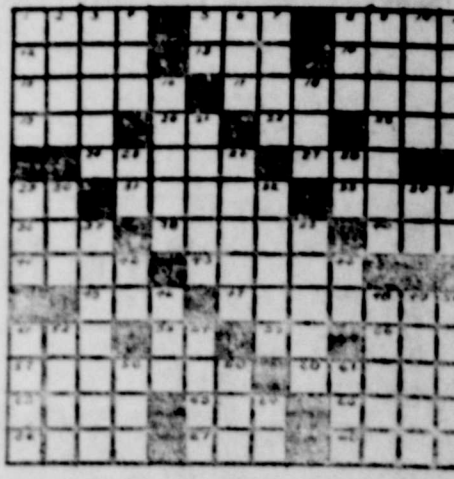

Extra Helpings

Small grapefruit coming now from Florida are better than the varieties available later on in the season, but they are juicy and excellent reamed for the morning fruit drink.

For guest-intriguing, cream cheese and clam appetizers are worthy of many repeats. This dip for crackers and potato chips is the better for its saucy touch of Tabasco. For 1 cup of Tabasco Clam Appetizer: blend 1/2 teaspoon Tabasco with a 3-ounce package of cream cheese and 1 can (10 ounces) drained, minced clams. Pile into serving dish and serve with crackers. The clam juice may be used in tomato or grapefruit juice cocktails.

Fall and winter months bring more pork to market than during other seasons. This year because of record supplies and lower prices, average pork use is expected to total over 66 pounds per person... 6 pounds more than last year.

The reason those little semi-sweet chocolate morsels used in cookies created by the Toll House Inn get soft but do not melt while baking is that they are a different kind of chocolate. Semi-sweet chocolate contains only 21 per cent cocoa butter, while ordinary baking chocolate contains 54 per cent.

Brazil nuts, which really do come from Brazil, travel about 1,000 miles from their home along the tributaries of the Amazon River to United States markets. They are probably the only in-shell nuts of foreign origin imported into the United States. To obtain these protective, non-melting nuts when using the substitute for holiday baking, hull the Brazil nuts through a colander in water for easy cracking.

The term "unsulfured" applied to molasses means the molasses comes from fully ripened, high quality sugar cane and has been produced without the use of sulfur. Being the whole juice of sugar cane, concentrated to a heavier consistency, it contains the sugar, all the minerals and vitamins originally in the cane. It is a flavorless sweetener and source of iron.

Workshop For Bible School Instructors Held At ACC

Abilene Christian College is holding its 2nd annual Instructional Materials Workshop for Bible School Teachers, July 25-27.

Mrs. O. L. Kelley will participate in this workshop, where she will present a demonstration of instructional materials to be used in the primary level (1, 2, 3rd grades) to teach the Bible to children in these grades.

Pupil participation by conversation, story telling, reading, dramatics, singing and playing about and with the materials help children to see the printed page in the Bible come up and live before them.

"A child learns by experience."

"A child learns by wiggling skills through his fingers and toes into himself, by soaking up habits and attitudes around him." him."

He learns through his sensory organs and by just being exposed. He can learn the Bible just as he learns geography, history, reading and all other subjects to be learned.

This workshop is sponsored by the Department of Education of Abilene Christian College. Dr. G. C. Morlan is head of the department and director of the workshop.

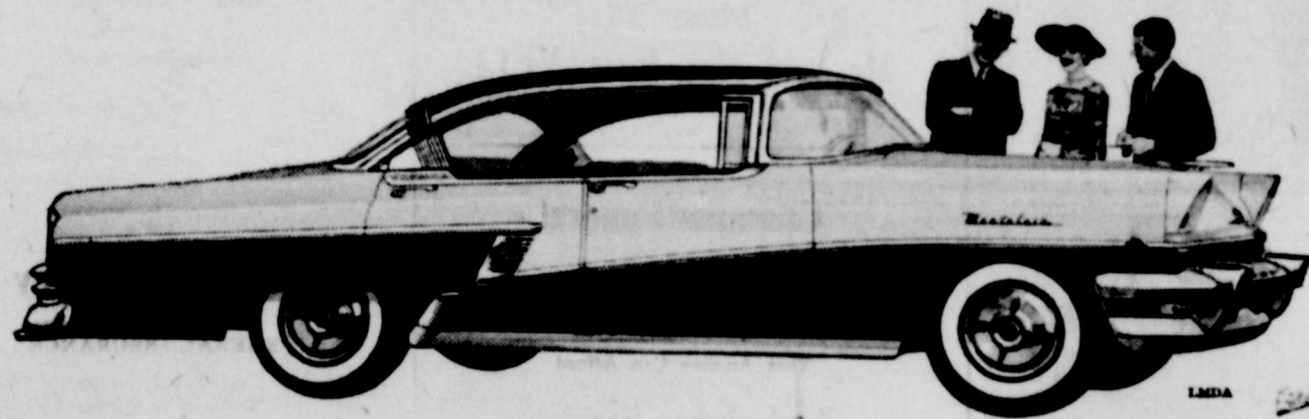

NO WILL? STATE LAWS WILL NAME YOUR HEIRS

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

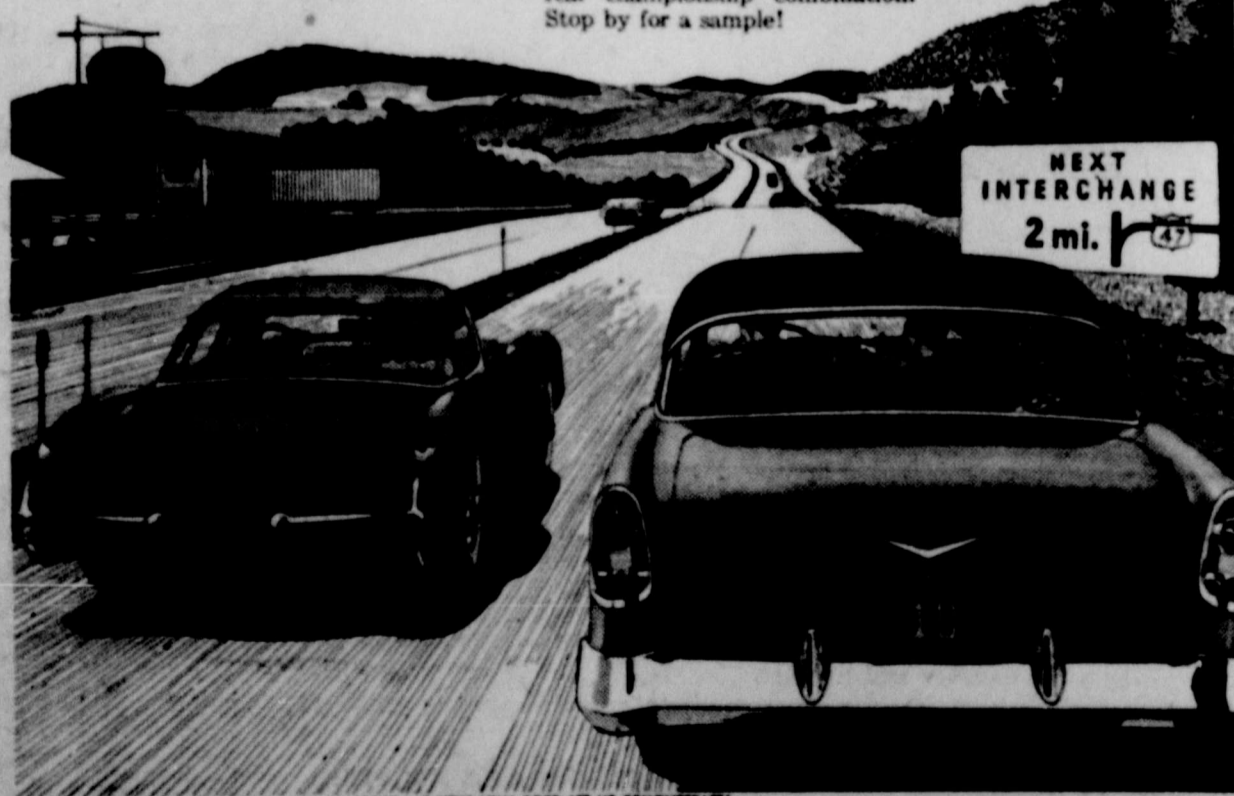

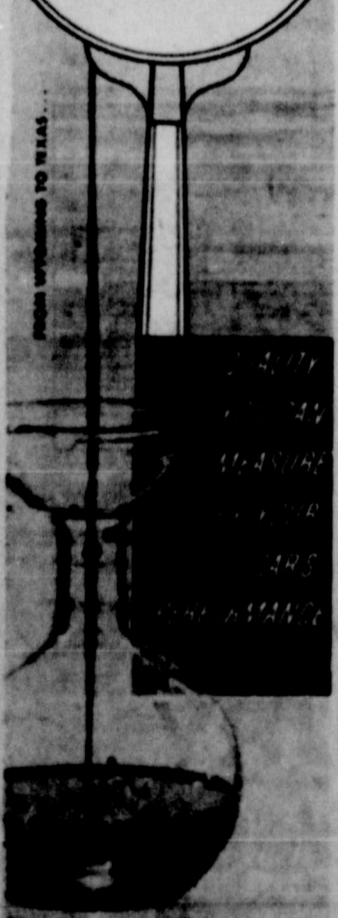

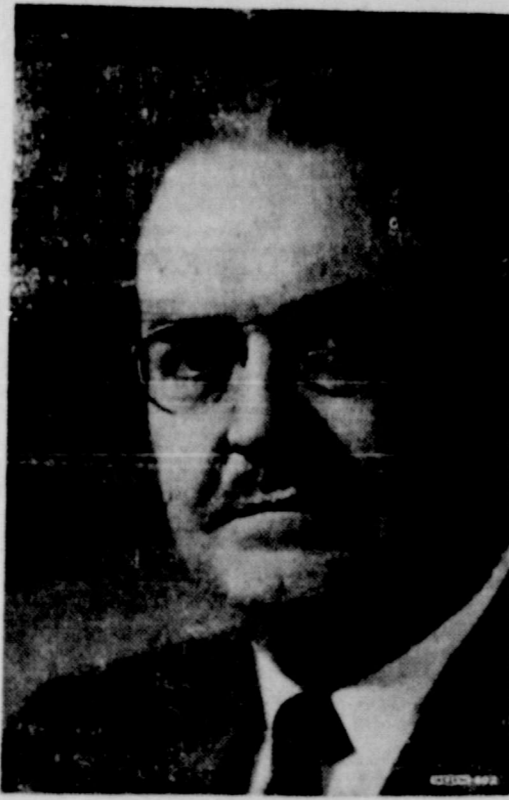
