### Ceremony Mexicans Revised To Dist.

The U.S. Department of Labor today announced that the minimum acceptable standards for housing Mexican agricultural workers employed in this country under the Migrant Labor Agreement with Mexico have been amended and re-issued, effective immediately. They replace those issued

Charles E. Johnson, Field Representative for the Labor Department's Bureau of Employment Se curity here, said the changes were made on the basis of (1) operating experience in the field and (2) consultations with the two committees which advise the Labor Department on farm labor policies and programs. These com mittees are the Special Farm Labor Committee, composed of agricultural representatives from each state, and the Labor Advisory Committee on Farm Labor made up of representatives of

"The changes in the minimum standards include the addition of appeals procedures for employers and spell out in more detail than sanitary facilities that must be provided by employers for the Mexican workers they contract and employ under the terms of the Migrant Agreement", Mr. Johnson said.

"The amended standards cover adequacy of shelter, adequacy of space per worker, water supply, cleanliness, sanitation, ventilalation, heating, and facilities for eating and laundry".

Regional Director Ed McDon ald of the Bureau of Employment Security in Dallas is mailing a copy of the amended standards to all approved employers and associations of employers of Mexican National workers. Copies are available at the field office here or at the regional office in Dal-







Centennial Cream Cake 2 cups sifted cake flour 1 cup sugar 3 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

COCONUT CREAM CHEESE FROSTING: Let an 8-ounce package of cream cheese stand at room temperature until softened. Beat cheese until creamy. Add (7½-ounce) jar of marshmallow fluff and one teaspoon of almond extract; beat until smooth and well blended. Place coconut in glass pie plate and sprinkle with a few drops of pure food coloring. Lightly toss with fork until coconut is tinted desired shade. Frost cake. Sprinkle with coconut.
