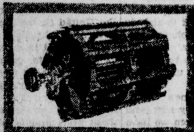

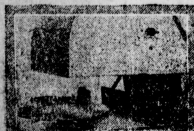

D. and F. W. Johnson's sub-division No. 2, in Farmer and Bailey Counties, Texas, and the tract of land herein sued for being wholly in Bailey County, Texas, and particularly described as: Beginning at an iron stake marked S. E. 40, same being the Southeast corner of said Section 40, Block Y, thence North with the East line of said Section 40, and the West line of Section 53, 508.85 feet, a wooden stake; thence North 54 degrees and 52' West 211.6 feet; thence South 35 degrees and 8' East 345 feet to a wooden stake on the North line of the Pecos & Santa Fe Railway right of way; thence with the North line of said right of way South 54 degrees and 52' East 248 feet to a railroad monument on the North line of Section 39 in said Block Y; thence East with the North line of said Section 39 and East line of said Section 40, 174.4 feet to a railroad monument on the North line of said railway right of way; thence with the North line of said railway right of way South 54 degrees and 52' East 170.3 feet to the East line of Section No. 39, of said Block Y; thence North with said East line of said Section 39, 60.5 feet to the place of beginning and containing 5.01 acres of land. Plaintiff alleging that he has title to said land under a judgment of the District Court of Bailey County, Texas, in Cause No. 61, entered December 29, 1924, against R. L. Brown, foreclosing a lien upon said land, as against the defendant R. L. Brown and the Continental Gin Co., and against the Farmers and Merchants National Bank of Farmersville, Texas, and a judgment rendered by said Court in cause No. 186 on the 9th day of June, 1926, in favor of the plaintiff against R. L. Brown establishing that the first mentioned judgment was a valid and subsisting and live judgment and the lien as foreclosed in said judgment was valid and subsisting— and ordering the Clerk to issue an Order of Sale; an Order of Sale issued on said judgment, the return of the Sheriff indorsed thereon showing that he sold said property to the plaintiff herein and deed made by H. A. Douglass, as Sheriff under authority of said judgment, and Order of Sale conveying said property to the plaintiff and under a judgment rendered in said District Court in cause No. 248 on the 31st day of December, 1927, in favor of the plaintiff, E. R. Hart, against defendant, R. L. Brown, and the title and possession of said land and plaintiff alleging that R. L. Brown is the common source of title and that plaintiff's title to said land is superior to any claim, title or lien the defendants or either of them, may have against, upon or to said land and the plaintiff by a second court in said petition setting up a further cause of action wherein it is alleged in substance that on the 29th day of December, 1924, he recovered a judgment in the District Court in Bailey County, Texas, in cause No. 61, on the docket of said Court against R. L. Brown for \$1730.00 with interest thereon from that date at the rate of 10 percent per annum and costs of suit and foreclosing a materialman's lien as it existed on the 26th day of July, 1923, and a deed of trust lien as it existed on the 19th day of July, 1923, against and upon the above described land in favor of the plaintiff and against the defendant, E. R. Hart, the Continental Gin Co., and also against the Farmers and Merchants National Bank of Farmersville, Texas; that the said liens were valid and subsisting liens on and after the days stated in said judgment; that on the 9th day of June, 1926, plaintiff recovered a judgment in said District Court in cause No. 186 against R. L. that there was no appeal being on the first mentioned judgment the sum of \$1289.58 and for costs of suit and that the costs of suit in said No. 61 and 186 aggregated the sum of \$124.57; that said amounts remain wholly unpaid and the defendant, R. Advocates Appropriation for Eleemosynary Institutions

The 41st Legislature will convene on April 22nd. It would be a fine thing if people all over Texas would go to the trouble to get in touch with the State Senators and Representatives before they leave home for the purpose of urging them to make sufficient appropriation for the next two years to take care of the eleemosynary institutions of the State and to enlarge them to such an extent as to do away with the customary long waiting lists for admittance into the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, the Feeble-minded Institution, the Epileptic Hospital, Orphan Homes, and State Hospitals for the Insane. It would not require very much additional money to do this. How members of the Legislature can find it in their hearts to deny the actual needs of the suffering unfortunate is more than I have ever been able to understand.

I don't believe the people of Texas want their representatives to out and slash the Board of Control's budget for the seventeen eleemosynary institutions, because, as prepared, it is entirely inadequate for actual needs. I wish to especially urge church organizations and the good women of Texas to become interested in these wards of the state. The business interests have plenty of influence to take care of them; whereas, the unfortunates must depend solely on the mercy of the citizens of Texas. As a rule, we don't like the word "lobby" but should be kept below the 35 cent maximum, then to do the necessary pro-rating in making appropriations for the schools, courts, departments, etc.

BRIEF BITS OF LATE NEWS

R. C. Turner, charged with robbing a bank at Brady, made bond and was married immediately afterward to Miss Pauline Smith, a teacher at Camp San Saba school, near Brady.

Clarence Lee Kelly, student in Tech College at Lubbock, was painfully injured when he attempted to jump from the fender of a moving automobile Wednesday.

Religious scruples of his parents against medical treatment caused an eight-year old boy in Austin to suffer agony for three days, when the grandfather of the child came from San Antonio for a visit and demanded medical aid for him.

Palmer C. McInnis, mayor of Brownwood, was recently sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for assault to murder Clyde Mayer. He claimed that Mayer had given liquor to his son. McInnis resigned as mayor after being sentenced.

The Coleman County grand jury has been called upon by Judge E. J. Miller of Brownwood to investigate liquor-liquor and bootlegging activities.

An offer to sell the Odd Fellows Orphan Home at Corsicana to the State was made recently by J. W. Chancellor of Bowie, representing the Grand Lodge of the fraternal organization.

Charged with printing and circulating obscene literature in the form of "The Blunderbus," distributed on the State University campus, Frank W. Cook, printing shop owner, was convicted and fined \$100. Three other cases are pending on the same charge.

John L. Robinson, cotton broker of Memphis, Tenn., was sentenced to four years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, charged with aiding in the misapplication of funds of a Memphis bank. He was allowed to pay his way and to go unescorted to the prison.

By a vote of 56 to 33 the Legislature of Wisconsin passed a bill to repeal the state prohibition enforcement law, in response to an overwhelming vote of the people in that state in favor of the repeal. The state Senate will have to act on the measure.

Levi D. Deering, pioneer ranchman of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, died at the Baptist Hospital at Clovis Tuesday.

A severe storm swept the Atlantic coast from Maine to Virginia Wednesday, which sank small craft, wrecked shore structures and did other damage. The wind reached a velocity of 36 miles along the Maine coast. In New York and other points the storm turned into a heavy snow.

Because of the scarcity of work in Mexico, it is announced, all immigrants of the working class are denied entrance into the country, effective May 1st.

The Sloan System Ranch, near San Saba, Texas, sold 200 head of White-faced Duroc yearlings at \$25 a head recently. This is said to be the highest price ever paid for this class of cattle in the San Saba district.

The head of a pet squirrel in Lubbock was sent to Faunus Institute for examination, after the squirrel had bitten four persons.

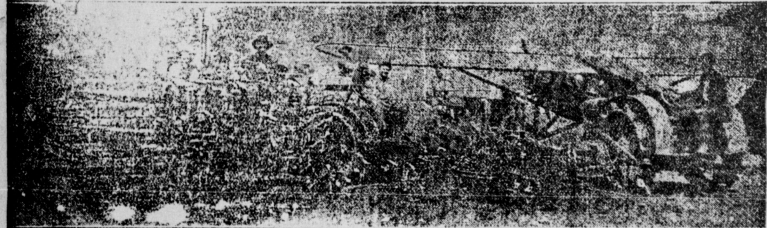

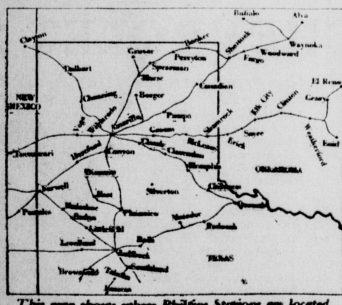

### Alfalfa Does Not Thrive With Too Much Water

There is an old tradition among farmers of experience to the effect that alfalfa will not grow well with wet feet. If the land has approximately level with the river it is probable that the water stands rather high in the soil at all times. There should be four or five feet between the surface and the ground water level if alfalfa is to make any kind of satisfactory growth.

Neither does alfalfa stand much overwatering. If water was to stand on an alfalfa field for several days to a week it probably would cause some damage. The land would be better suited to timothy, red top and alsike clover and to some of the filled crops than to a permanent stand of alfalfa. Should you think, however, that the water level is low in the land it may be that the alfalfa will grow satisfactorily.

### Many Varieties of Tree Fruits Must Have Bees

Bees may not have grown bigger and better but they have been given another task to perform in orchards and small fruit plantations, according to statements made by specialists in agriculture at Michigan State college. Studies made during the past few years have proved that many varieties of tree fruits will not produce a profitable crop unless insects have free access to the trees at blossoming time, and, in many cases, there are not enough insects under natural conditions to insure a full set of fruit. Tests made at the M. S. C. South Haven station show that a larger crop of raspberries was secured from plants to which bees had access than from plants over which cages were placed to exclude insects.

### Cause of Failure With Stand of Clover Crop

Not the least important factor in obtaining satisfactory stands of clover is the sowing of good seed. A farmer might use ground limestone to correct acidity of his soil and apply manure and phosphate to insure growth of clover, yet get a poor stand of clover due to poor seed.

One of 218 samples of red clover seed tested the past year at one experimental station, 79 samples showed an average of 27 per cent seed so hard that they will not grow. This means that if seed of this sort were sown at the usual rate only these fourths of a stand would result if all of it escaped the usual clover hazards.

It is pointed out, however, that in some cases, from the skins of wild or newly harvested seeds of clover, which might tell someone to remind you of something you're sure to remember it yourself.

## Around the Farm

Get the harness repaired for spring work.

It is cheaper to buy fertility in a rich soil than it is to buy fertilizers.

Fertilizer should be used in large enough amounts to grow a profitable crop.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Stamford is to have a new modern 24 room brick veneer hotel in the near future to take the place of the Biggins Hotel, an old landmark on East Reynolds Street. The building, according to M. Rogers Williams, Abilene owner of the property, will be leased when completed.

Anson's growing interest in aviation has been acted upon by the Lion's Club of that city which appointed a committee from its members to finance the clearing and marking of a field just east of the city limits. The name of the town will be painted in large letters on the top of some building.

Tulla's two mile caravan of cars filled with representatives to the Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show, headed by the Tulla Band, returned after the show with a large percent of the ribbons offered. Two championships were won by Tulla dairymen, and the coveted P. C. Bennet trophy was also won.

Iowa Park is already making plans for her fair next fall. A committee to look after spacious grounds and ample housing quarters has been appointed. Attention will be paid to educational features and exhibits, some of them being by school children.

Pecos, with the completion of a \$40,000 tourist camp to be known as Beacon Camp, will have one of the most modern and convenient camps in the country. It will have 20 suites and 20 rooms, equipped with garages, children's playgrounds, etc. It will be opened by May 1st.

Floydada's first First Monday drew a large crowd, and nearly \$4,000 worth of every kind of goods needed on the farm was sold at the auction which featured the afternoon's entertainment. Merchants of the town

financed the auction sale and spread advertising of the event over the county.

Levelland's latest scholastic census showed an increase of thirty-three percent over last year. This shows that 296 school children between the ages of 7 and 18 years are in the community. An increase in population in proportion would indicate that 12,600 people reside in that county.

It is hoped that the postponement of the dates will make it possible for President Hoover to attend and to participate in the convention, and in the Gadsden Purchase commemoration.

The Olney Enterprise, local weekly newspaper, has changed hands. Geo. T. Spears of Breckenridge becoming owner of the paper which Ralph Shuffler established twenty years ago and has been managing ever since. No change will be made in the personnel of the organization.

Breckenridge school children are taking part in the Clean-up program being observed in the town this week. The observation was started off with a parade in which every school was represented.

Stephenville will soon have its new Movie Talking Machine installed and vitaphone pictures will be shown. This necessitated the remodeling of the projection room. Several big features of the modern talkies have been booked.

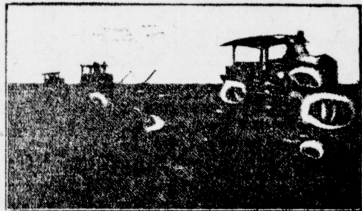

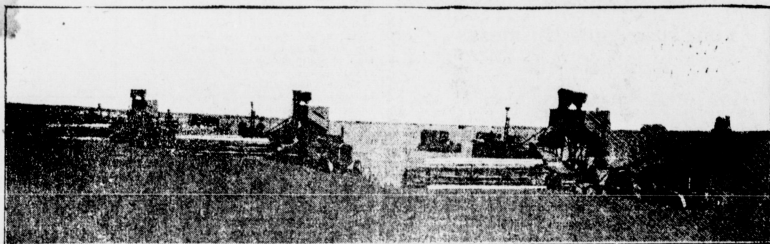

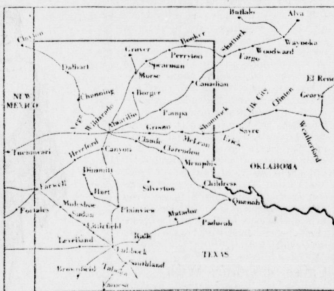

### Missionary Hallock Writes of China's New Year Festivities

We are in receipt of another very interesting letter from Rev. H. G. C. Hallock, who is a Missionary in China. Rev. Hallock, in this letter, gives an account of the Feast of the Chinese New Year.

C. P. O. No. 1234, Shanghai, China, February 15, 1929.

Dear Editor:

We are in the midst of the Chinese Big Feast—Chinese New Year. Every one's birthday comes on this day. Should a child be born in even the last hour of the last day of the old year it would be two years old on New Year. New Year came on Sunday, February 10th. Every store was closed. All work stopped. But it was not quiet. It was like many Fourth of July in one. On the five-crackers. At midnight I was awakened by a vast broodside of large and small firecrackers and they kept it up for days. In the morning the ground was covered as by red snow—the "confetti" of exploded fireworks. Firecrackers are but a part of the feast—the noisy part.

The last day of the year everybody is busy—the men at closing up their accounts. All bills must be collected and all debts paid. Wee be to the man who doesn't pay his debts. The women are very busy. The house must be made as clean as a pin, and decorated, and the brooms hidden—bad luck if they appear on New Year. Before the New Year sun rises, all kinds of food must be gotten ready! Guests—many—will come during this time and they must be feasted. Few people see slumber the last night of the old year. But when the sun rises, calm reigns over the household. As one walks out between 6 and 9 a. m., the whole town is asleep. Sunday indeed! But excitement arouses them and about ten o'clock you'll find the streets alive with people dressed in their best "bib and tucker" and you hear, "Kong Hui Fah-dai"—Congratulations and abounding wealth to you," shouted from one to another. The closed doors are plastered with

appropriate sayings written on blood-red strips of paper. Go to open spaces of the city and see crowds encircling puppet shows, acrobats, monkey performers, squirming dragons, entertainers of all kinds, and peddlers of sweets and children's toys—Vanity Fair! Go to the temples and you find thousands burning incense and candles before all the idols, praying for wealth, old age and bliss.

One interesting god connected with the New Year is the god-of-wealth, which is worshipped especially on the 8th—his birthday. The money spent on firecrackers in his honor would pay China's national debt. Few begin work again until he is properly worshipped. Another is the kitchen god. He is a paper god and sits over the stove in the kitchen where he spies on the doings of the family for a year. On the 23rd of the 12th month he is given a big feast. Sweet syrup is put on his mouth and he is put in a beautiful paper sedan chair and burned in glorious style, accompanied by fireworks—which is sending him to the Upper-god to report on their year's doings—all this fuss and sweetness is to bribe him to speak well of their family to his majesty. When he returns on the last night of the old year—a new idol is bought and placed with little ceremony, in the old niche. It will be next year before he reports again, why "taty" him now?

Next to idol-worship, gambling takes a big place in New Year celebrations—gambling everywhere! What they eat and drink, and the firecrackers, and gambling, all, in some way or other, symbolize or point to the sound "Kao-sen"—excess, in the sense of rising high in wealth and station—especially in wealth. It's indeed a wonderfully interesting time, and is indulged in even by beggars, for they receive a harvest of alms.

The Nationalist Government ordered that Chinese New Year should not be observed this year. It might as well have tried to turn back the greatest tidal wave in history. Nationalist commands stand the observance of Chinese New Year's customs? Only the conversion of these people to Christ will stop this idol worship and lead to worship of the true God. And to us the glad part of it is that each year more leave the false and adopt

the true as the Chinese one by one are born anew. We are not discouraged. Pray much for China. Kindest regards and best wishes. Yours in Christ's glad service, Rev. H. G. C. Hallock. P. S. Enclosed is a Chinese kitchen-god.

### SPRING SHOWING OF GENERAL MOTORS CARS FOR APRIL 20TH TO 27TH

### A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court—

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a Majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by Law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may

be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and printed in the same manner as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

Poster on Scabies Issued by Government

To aid in the suppression of the serious contagious diseases, variously known as scabies, scab, and mange, the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture, has issued a poster on the subject. Enlarged illustrations of scab mites show the various forms which attack sheep, swine and horses. The poster shows also a typical advanced case of a scabby sheep and likewise a calf affected with scabies. Urging stock owners to isolate and report suspected cases to the nearest veterinarian, the poster explains that the disease can be eradicated by dipping in lime sulphur or nicotine solution. At least two dippings, 10 to 12 days apart, of all infected and exposed animals are necessary for a cure. Though the interstate movement of live stock affected with scabies is prohibited by federal laws, there is still an opportunity for stock owners to co-operate with veterinary officials in suppressing local outbreaks promptly. Copies of the poster may be obtained upon request by persons interested in furthering the suppression of the disease. Write to the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington.

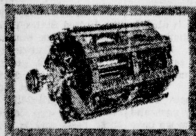




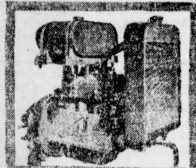

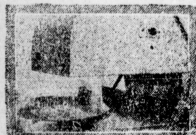

Advocates Appropriation for Eleemosynary Institutions

The 41st Legislature will convene on April 22nd. It would be a fine thing if people all over Texas would go to the trouble to get in touch with the State Senators and Representatives before they leave home for the purpose of urging them to make sufficient appropriation for the next two years to take care of the eleemosynary institutions of the State and to enlarge them to such an extent as to do away with the customary long waiting lists for admittance into the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, the Feebleminded Institution, the Epileptic Hospital, Orphan Homes, and State Hospitals for the Insane. It would not require very much additional money to do this. How members of the Legislature can find it in their hearts to deny the actual needs of the suffering unfortunate is more than I have ever been able to understand.

I don't believe the people of Texas want their representatives to cut and slash the Board of Control's budget for the seventeen eleemosynary institutions, because, as prepared, it is entirely inadequate for actual needs.

I wish to especially urge church organizations and the good women of Texas to become interested in these wards of the state. The business interests have plenty of influence to take care of them; whereas, the unfortunate must depend solely on the mercy of the citizens of Texas. As a rule, we don't like the word "lobby". However, lobbying of this character would result in relieving a great deal of suffering and privation. Say to your representative that if, in your judgment, the ad valorem tax rate should be kept below the 35 cent maximum, then to do the necessary prorating in making appropriations for the schools, courts, departments, etc.

**BRIEF BITS OF LATE NEWS**

R. C. Turner, charged with robbing a bank at Brady, made bond and was married immediately afterward to Miss Pauline Smith, a teacher at Camp San Saba school, near Brady.

Clarence Lee Kelly, student in Tech College at Lubbock, was painfully injured when he attempted to jump from the fender of a moving automobile Wednesday.

Religious scruples of his parents against medical treatment caused an eight year old boy in Austin to suffer agony for three days, when the grandfather of the child came from San Antonio for a visit and demanded medical aid for him.

Palmer C. McInnis, mayor of Brownwood, was recently sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for assault to murder Clyde Mayer. He claimed that Mayer had given liquor to his son. McInnis resigned as mayor after being sentenced.

The Coleman County grand jury has been called upon by Judge E. J. Miller of Brownwood to investigate lawlessness in the county, especially prescription liquor and bootlegging activities.

An offer to sell the Odd Fellows Orphan Home at Corsicana to the State was made recently by J. W. Chancellor of Bowie, representing the Grand Lodge of the fraternal organization.

Charged with printing and circulating obscene literature in the form of "The Bundles," distributed on the State University campus, Frank W. Cook, printing shop owner, was convicted and fined \$100. Three other cases are pending on the same charge.

John L. Robinson, cotton broker of Memphis, Tenn., was sentenced to four years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, charged with aiding in the misapplication of funds of a Memphis bank. He was allowed to pay his way and to go unescorted to the prison.

By a vote of 56 to 33 the Legislature of Wisconsin passed a bill to repeal the state prohibition enforcement law, in response to an overwhelming vote of the people in that state in favor of the repeal. The state Senate will have to act on the measure.

Levi D. Deering, pioneer ranchman of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, died at the Baptist Hospital at Clovis Tuesday.

A severe storm swept the Atlantic coast from Maine to Virginia Wednesday, which sank small craft, wrecked shore structures and did other damage. The wind reached a velocity of 50 miles along the Maine coast. In New York and other points the storm turned into a heavy snow.

Because of the scarcity of work in Mexico, it is announced, all immigrants of the working class are denied entrance into the country, effective May 1st.

The Sloss Sisters Ranch, near San Saba, Texas, sold 250 head of White-faced Dehorned yearlings at \$75 a head recently. This is said to be the highest price ever paid for this class of cattle in the San Saba district.

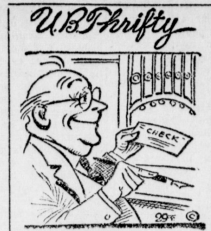

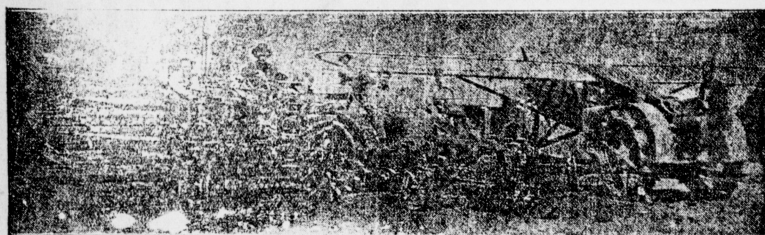

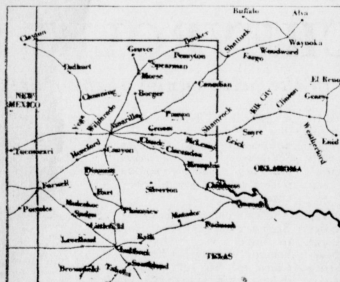

Alfalfa Does Not Thrive With Too Much Water

There is an old tradition among farmers of experience to the effect that alfalfa will not grow well with wet feet. If the land lies approximately level with the river it is probable that the water stands rather high in the soil at all times. There should be four or five feet between the surface and the ground water level if alfalfa is to make any kind of satisfactory growth.

Neither does alfalfa stand much overflooding. If water was to stand on an alfalfa field for several days to a week it probably would cause some damage. This land would be better suited to timothy, red top and alsike clover and to some of the filled crops than to a permanent stand of alfalfa. Should you find, however, that the water level is low in the land it may be that the alfalfa will grow satisfactorily.

Many Varieties of Tree Fruits Must Have Bees

Bees may not have grown bigger and better but they have been given another task to perform in orchards and small fruit plantations, according to statements made by specialists in agriculture at Michigan State college.

Studies made during the past few years have proved that many varieties of tree fruits will not produce a profitable crop unless insects have free access to the trees at blossoming time, and in many cases, there are not enough insects under natural conditions to insure a full set of fruit. Tests made at the M. S. C. South Haven station show that a larger crop of raspberries was secured from plants to which insects had access than from plants over which cages were placed to exclude insects.

Cause of Failure With Stand of Clover Crop

Not the least important factor in obtaining satisfactory stands of clover is the sowing of good seed. A farmer might use ground limestone to correct acidity of his soil and apply manure and phosphate to insure a growth of clover, yet get a poor stand of clover due to poor seed.

Out of 218 samples of red clover seed tested the past year at one experimental station, 70 samples showed an average of 27 per cent seed so hard that they will not grow. This means that if seed of this sort were sown at the usual rate only three-fourths of a stand would result if all of it escaped the usual clover hazards.

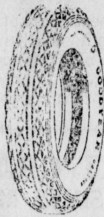

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

## What's Doing In West Texas

Stamford is to have a new modern 24 room brick veneer hotel in the near future to take the place of the Riggin Hotel, an old landmark on East Reynolds Street. The building, according to M. Rogers Williams, Abilene owner of the property, will be leased when completed.

Anson's growing interest in aviation has been acted upon by the Lion's Club of that city which appointed a committee from its members to finance the clearing and marking of a field just east of the city limits. The name of the town will be painted in large letters on the top of some building.

Tulia's two mile caravan of cars filled with representatives to the Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show, headed by the Tulia Band, returned after the show was a large percent of the ribbons offered. Two championships were won by Tulia dairymen, and the coveted P. C. Bennet trophy was also won.

Iowa Park is already making plans for her fair next fall. A committee to look after spacious grounds and ample housing quarters has been appointed. Attention will be paid to educational features and exhibits, some of them being by school children.

Fecos, with the completion of a \$40,000 tourist camp to be known as Beacon Camp, will have one of the most modern and convenient camps in the country. It will have 20 suites and 20 rooms, equipped with garages, children's playgrounds, etc. It will be opened by May 1st.

Flordada's first First Monday drew a large crowd, and nearly 40,000 worth of every kind of goods needed on the farm was sold at the auction which featured the afternoon's entertainment. Merchants of the town

finished the auction sale and spread advertising of the event over the county.

Leveland's latest scholastic census showed an increase of thirty-three percent over last year. This shows that 206 school children between the ages of 7 and 18 years are in the community. An increase in population in proportion would indicate that 12,600 people reside in that county.

El Paso will be the scene of the eleventh annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce late in the summer instead of in May. 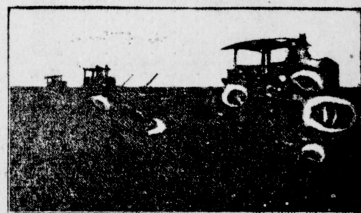

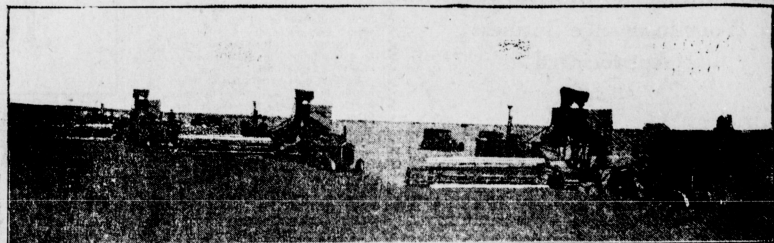

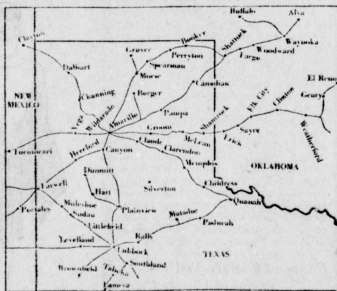

### Missionary Hallock Writes of China's New Year Festivities

We are in receipt of another very interesting letter from Rev. H. G. C. Hallock, who is a Missionary in China. Rev. Hallock, in this letter, gives an account of the Feast of the Chinese New Year.

C. P. O. No. 1234, Shanghai, China, February 13, 1929

Dear Editor:

We are in the midst of the Chinese Big Feast—Chinese New Year. Every one's birthday comes on this day. Should a child be born in even the last hour of the last day of the old year it would be two years old on New Year. New Year came on Sunday, February 10th. Every store was closed. All work stopped. But it was not quiet. It was like many Fourth of Julys in one. Oh! the fire-crackers! At midnight I was awakened by a vast cascade of large and small fire-crackers and they kept it up for days. In the morning the ground was covered as by red snow—the "confetti" of exploded fireworks. Firecrackers are but a part of the feast—the noisy part.

The last day of the year everybody is busy—the men at closing up their accounts. All bills must be collected and all debts paid. We be to the man who doesn't pay his debts. The women are very busy. The house must be made as clean as a pin, and decorated, and the brooms hidden—and luck if they appear on New Year. Before the New Year sun rises, all kinds of food must be gotten ready! Guests—many—will come during this time and they must be feasted. Few people see slumber the last night of the old year. But when the sun rises, calm reigns over the household. As one walks out between 6 and 9 a. m., the whole town is asleep. Sunday indeed! But excitement arouses them and about ten o'clock you'll find the streets alive with people dressed in their best "bills and tuckers" and you hear, "Kong Hyl Pah-dai"—Congratulations and abounding wealth to you," shouted from one to another. The closed doors are plastered with

appropriate sayings written on blood-red strips of paper. Go to open spaces of the city and see crowds encircling puppet shows, acrobats, monkey performers, squirming dragons, entertainers of all kinds, and peddlers of sweets and children's toys—Vanity Fair! Go to the temples and you find thousands burning incense and candles before all the idols, praying for wealth, old age and bliss.

One interesting god connected with the New Year is the god-of-wealth, which is worshipped especially on the 5th—his birthday. The money spent on firecrackers in his honor would pay China's national debt. Few begin work again until he is properly worshipped. Another is the kitchen god. He is a paper god and sits over the stove in the kitchen, where he spies on the doings of the family for a year. On the 23rd of the 12th month he is given a big feast. Sweet syrup is put on his mouth and he is put in a beautiful paper sedan chair and burned in glorious style, accompanied by fireworks—which is sending him to the Upper-god to report on their year's doings—all this fuss and sweetness is to bribe him to speak well of their family to his Majesty. When he returns at the last night of the old year, a new idol is bought and placed with little ceremony, in the old niche. It will be next year before he reports again, why "fairy" him now?

Next to idol-worship, gambling takes a big place in New Year celebrations—gambling everywhere! What they eat and drink, and the firecrackers, and gambling, all in some way or other, symbolize or point to the sound "Kao-son"—excitement, in the sense of rising high in wealth and station—especially in wealth. It's indeed a wonderfully interesting time, and is indulged in even by beggars, for they receive a harvest of alms.

The Nationalist Government ordered that Chinese New Year should not be observed this year. It might as well have tried to turn back the great tidal wave in history. Nationalist commands stop the observance of Chinese New Year's customs? Only the conversion of these people to Christ will stop this idol worship and lead to worship of the true God. And to us the glad part of it is that each year more leave the false and adopt

the true as the Chinese car by one are born anew. We are not discouraged. Pray much for China. Kindest regards and best wishes.

### SPRING SHOWING OF GENERAL MOTORS CARS FOR APRIL 20TH TO 27TH

A nationwide exhibition of all General Motors passenger cars, to take place during the week beginning April 20th and ending April 27th, was an innovation announced today by Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., President of General Motors. The exhibition is to be known as the General Motors Spring Showing, and from plans already outlined promises to be the largest and most comprehensive showing in the history of the automobile industry. Twenty-three thousand General Motors dealers are to participate in the event, each acting as an individual exhibitor of the line of cars he merchandises in his particular location. Allowing a minimum of five display cars for each dealer, this will mean that during the week more than 125,000 General Motors cars will be on view simultaneously. The event will be suitably announced by nationwide magazine, newspaper and outdoor advertising. The Corporation's motor car divisions—Cadillac, Buick, Oldsmobile, Oakland and Chevrolet are cooperating to make the spring showing a memorable event.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court—

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court, by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate.

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such regulations and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warrantum and mandamus in such cases as may

be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or a pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

**Poster on Scabies Is Issued by Government**

To aid in the suppression of the serious contagious diseases variously known as scabies, scab, and mange, the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture, has issued a poster on the subject. Enlarged illustrations of scab mites show the various forms which attack sheep, swine and horses. The poster shows also a typical advanced case of a scabby sheep and likewise a calf affected with scabies.

Urging stock owners to isolate and report suspected cases to the nearest veterinarian, the poster explains that the disease can be eradicated by dipping in lime sulphur or nicotine solution. At least two dippings, 10 to 12 days apart, of all infected and exposed animals are necessary for a cure. Though the interstate movement of live stock affected with scabies is prohibited by federal laws, there is still an opportunity for stock owners to cooperate with veterinary officials in suppressing local outbreaks promptly.
