Under the agreement, NO crop may be harvested from the Acreage Reserve in 1868. No crop may be planted on it No crop may be planted on it except certain crops as a cover crop, and these if approved by the County Committee—and if these approved cover crops tend to produce seed in 1966 they must be mowed or gone over with a stalk cutter. BUT, small grains such as eats, barley, rye or wheat can be seeded on the Acreage Reserve land this fall as these crops would not mature in 1966.



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

In France bread is cold and hard, meat was raw and you can't get ANY WATER, the cheese was fer-mented and the only thing good was candy and sweets! (I forgot to tell you I was air sick coming over for about 5 minutes until I got rid of the "French dinner" we had been

When we landed in Paris it was raining and cold. It took us two hours to get to our hotel down town. We simply left our bags and went sight seeing. The oddest sight was seeing every other Frenchman walking down the street with a 2 foot, long thin loaf of bread-unwrapped - carrying it as if it were an umbrella or

We learned by the end of the day just how dirty the French people were! Our ho-tel was clean but simple and old (which I liked) but the people looked sad, old and degrad

I must tell you about the Eiffel Tower! (It was built in 1889 for the Paris exhibition by a Mr. Eiffel. It is one of the 7 wonders of the world and was at one time the tallest structure on earth, 984 feet high). You can never imagine how massive it is when one is standing at the bottom looking up. We all (27 of us) went up on an elevator—a little tall for walking—but 6 of us defar a paper plane would go.
So we made one. We had a real
"charge" watching it go and
go and go about 7 blocks and hit the ground. It seems silly, I know, to do such a childish thing, but it is one of those nts you can't describe

but will never forget.

The other highlight of Paris was the ride on the METRO or ubway. Americans don't know what rushing is! We traveled from one side of Paris to the other on the Metro, trying to squeeze a group of 27 people on an already crowded car be cause "the Americans will have to stay together or they will get lost"—and then every time one got off or on a door slammed. We were all hurting with laughter when we finally got back to the hotel. Every American in France is like a 'cherry in a bunch of lemons'—they stick out—and we found our-selves being watched, but al-ways admiringly. The French seemed to like us and were very nice, but they are quiet and never laugh in public. and never laugh in public. Well, we managed to get up

a few grins and one or two hearty laughs. We flew from Paris to Lon-don and a chartered bus was waiting for us, so we lost no time. We ate the first good food we had had "European Style"—the fork is in the left hand, turned over backward and the knife in the right. The


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
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
