Temperatures at the Weath er Station located at the Spur Experiment Station west of town rose to 106 degrees Sunday afternoon for a new high for July.

Temperatures have cracked the century mark for four days in a row beginning with Fri-day's 102; Saturday, 103; Sun-day, 106, and Monday, 105.

The station last recorded precipitation on July 6. Total rainfall for July is 1.13 inches. This compares to 1.78 for the July total rainfall in 1957. Only .55 was recorded in July 1956.
