County Cancer Society To Sponsor Free Film

Open and free showing of a life saving film, "Breast, Self Examination," arranged by the Dickens County Unit of the American Cancer Society, will serve as health and life insurance for numberless women in this community.

The motion picture, which has played a vital role in the never-ceasing nation-wide public education program of the

American Cancer Society, demonstrates a simple method of detecting early signs of breast cancer.

It will be shown at the Palace Theater in Spur, Nov. 12 at 10 a. m. A physician will be present to answer questions about the showing.

"Many women have unwarranted fear of cancer, because of unverified hearsay about it," a medical advisor of the ACS said. "Seeing the Breast Self - Examination film and learning the easy technique it portrays, have set countless minds at ease. Specifically that technique is designed to detect possible lumps which may or may not spell the beginning of cancer."

Early detection of cancer is saving more lives each year. It is delay that causes tragedy. This film is notable not only for its educational value, but for dignity and good taste.

It was produced jointly by the American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute of the U.S. Public Health Service.

Every woman and high school girl in the county is urged to see it.

WHEREAS, this is a film which already has helped to save thousands of lives and can contribute to the health and happiness of wives, mothers and other loved ones of this community,

County School Board Issues Statement Concerning Taxes

With the mailing of local tax statements recently, the County School Board has issued the following notice to tax payers concerning their taxes and the Dickens and Spur School Districts. (Taxes are due January 31st).

The statement was issued by the county board and is signed by O. J. Barron Jr., president.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Dickens County School Board takes this means of calling attention to the problem confronting property owners as to property located within the Dickens Independent School District.

Since there is litigation pending in the courts as to the present status of this school district, there is a possibility that tax payers who make payment to either the Dickens Independent School District or the Spur Independent School District might find themselves liable to make payment again if the other district was declared to be the correct district within which such property is located.

If your property is located within the Dickens Independent School District, we suggest that you consult your attorney before making payment of your taxes to either district.

Also, we call your attention to the fact that all persons or firms having claims for any debt against the Dickens Independent School District, should present such claims to the Dickens County School Board without delay, as Article 2767b of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas sets a time

limitation on the period within which such claims will be honored.

Second to identify the farm was Raymond Powell. Reynolds will receive a year's subscription to the Texas Spur and Powell will receive two free passes to the Palace Theatre by coming by the Texas Spur office.

The Erath farm consists of 173 acres. They have been on the farm about 20 years, it was formerly a part of the Randall estate. It was one of the first farms to be put in cultivation in Dickens County, 1890.

Mr. and Mrs. Erath were married in 1938. They have two children, Linda Nell Jackson, Lubbock, and Jessie Erath. Erath has 73 acres in cotton and 65 in wheat. He also raises mixed bred cattle. He is a member of the Farm Bureau and Duck Creek Soil Conservation District.

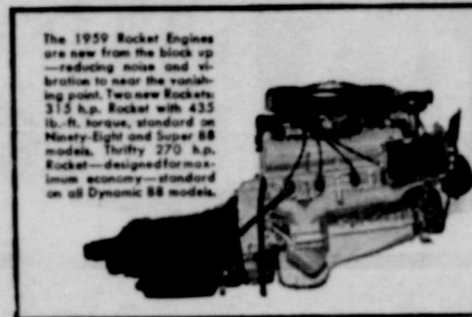

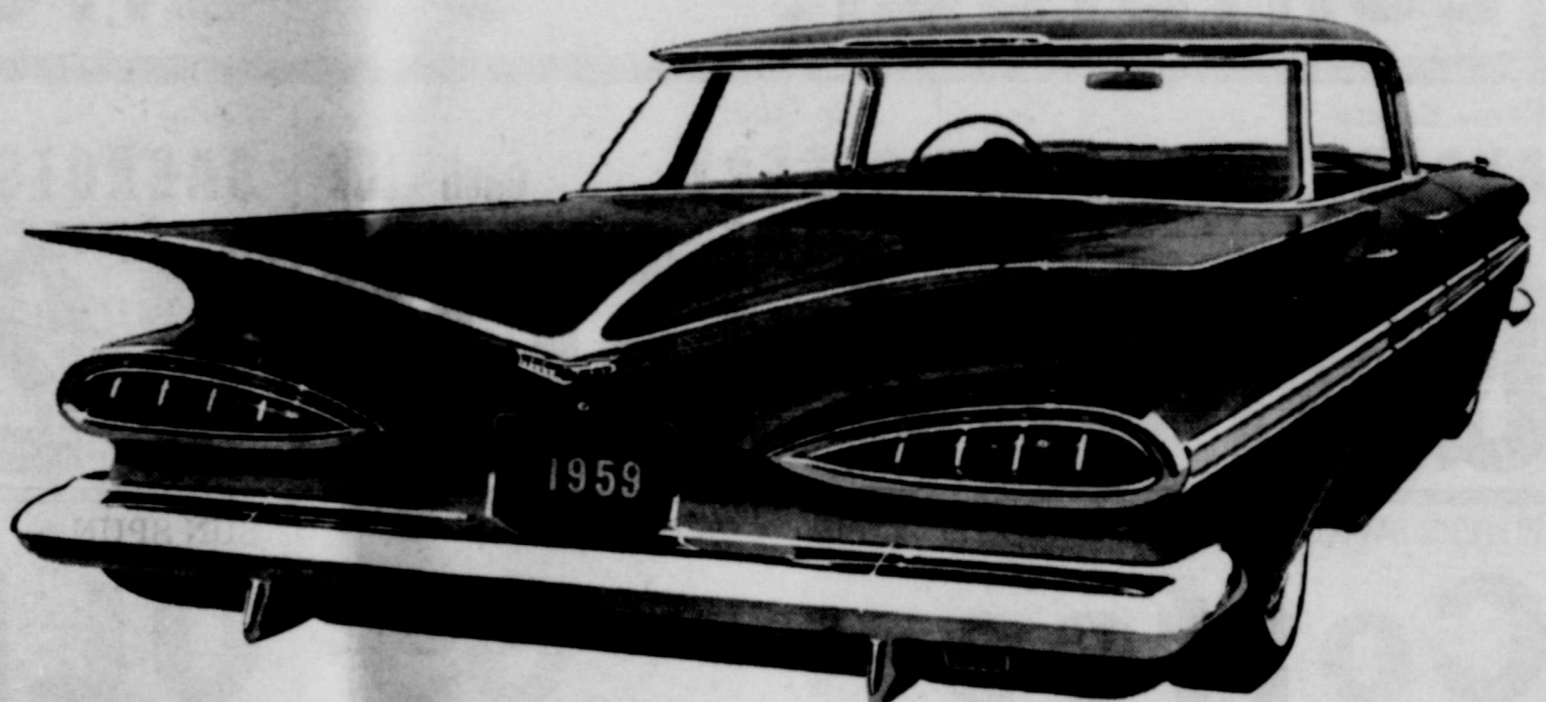
