LUEDERS ENCAMPMENT OPENS NEXT TUESDAY.

The Lueders Encampment of the Baptist Church, will open its third annual session next Tuesday, July 14. The course of study embraces Sunday School work, B. Y. P. U. work, Women's work, Evangelism, and all other church work.

Post Encampment Boosters Here Tuesday Afternoon

A band of booster from Post City visited our city Tuesday in behalf of the Baptist Encampment which opens there August 28th. All members of the company were not residents of Post City but were interested in the Encampment movement. Among these were Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Bowen of the Lubbock Baptist Church and Rev. Hardesty, pastor of Slaton Baptist Church.

The company arrived in our city about 12:30 and were escorted to the Baptist Church where the ladies had prepared a nice lunch for them. This was the one thing the visitors seemed to enjoy for the long drive over the rough roads and the late hour gave them a very keen appetite to relish a good lunch.

After lunch the band which accompanied the boosters gave a few selections of band music in the auditorium. There were a number of talks made by different members of the company. Among these were Rev. Bowen who spoke in behalf of the location and conveniences of the encampment. He told the people there would be tents and cots that visitors may lease at a very small price. Also, there are motor boats and canoes on the lake which will be at the disposal of the people. There is a very nice little lake, covering something like a section, which is stocked with fish. The people of Post are not holding the encampment, but have leased the lake to the encampment association for a period of ten years. They are constructing a \$5,000 building and piping city water to the grounds for the use of the encampment. Post people will have no more control over the program than any other people but are doing these things in the interest of the work.

W. R. Graeber, a business man in Post, and whom we know to be a member of the Methodist Church, made a talk emphasizing the fact that he came along to tell the people that all church denominations of Post and all civic organizations are boosting for the encampment. "We are for the good thing," Mr. Graeber said, "And we believe this encampment will be a great thing for the country, and we are behind it. It makes no difference about the denomination if good is accomplished. That is the belief of the Methodist Church," he continued.

After the program at the church the visitors went down town and made some announcements and distributed some advertisements. From here they went to Dickens where they also advertised the encampment.

Post is only forty-five miles west of Spur and many people can spend a few days there enjoying the encampment.

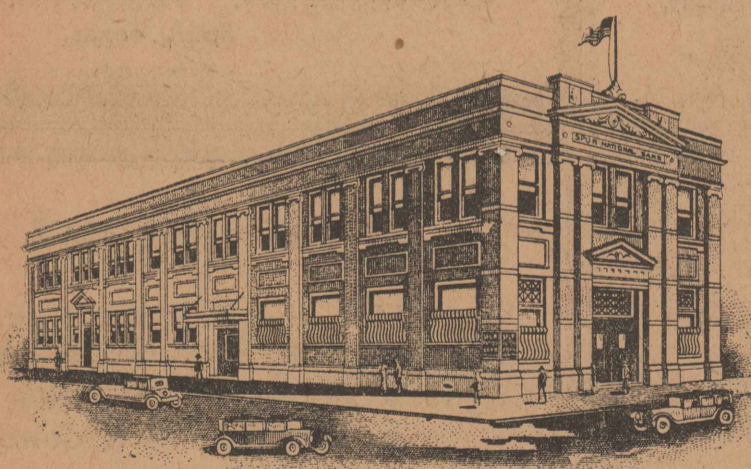

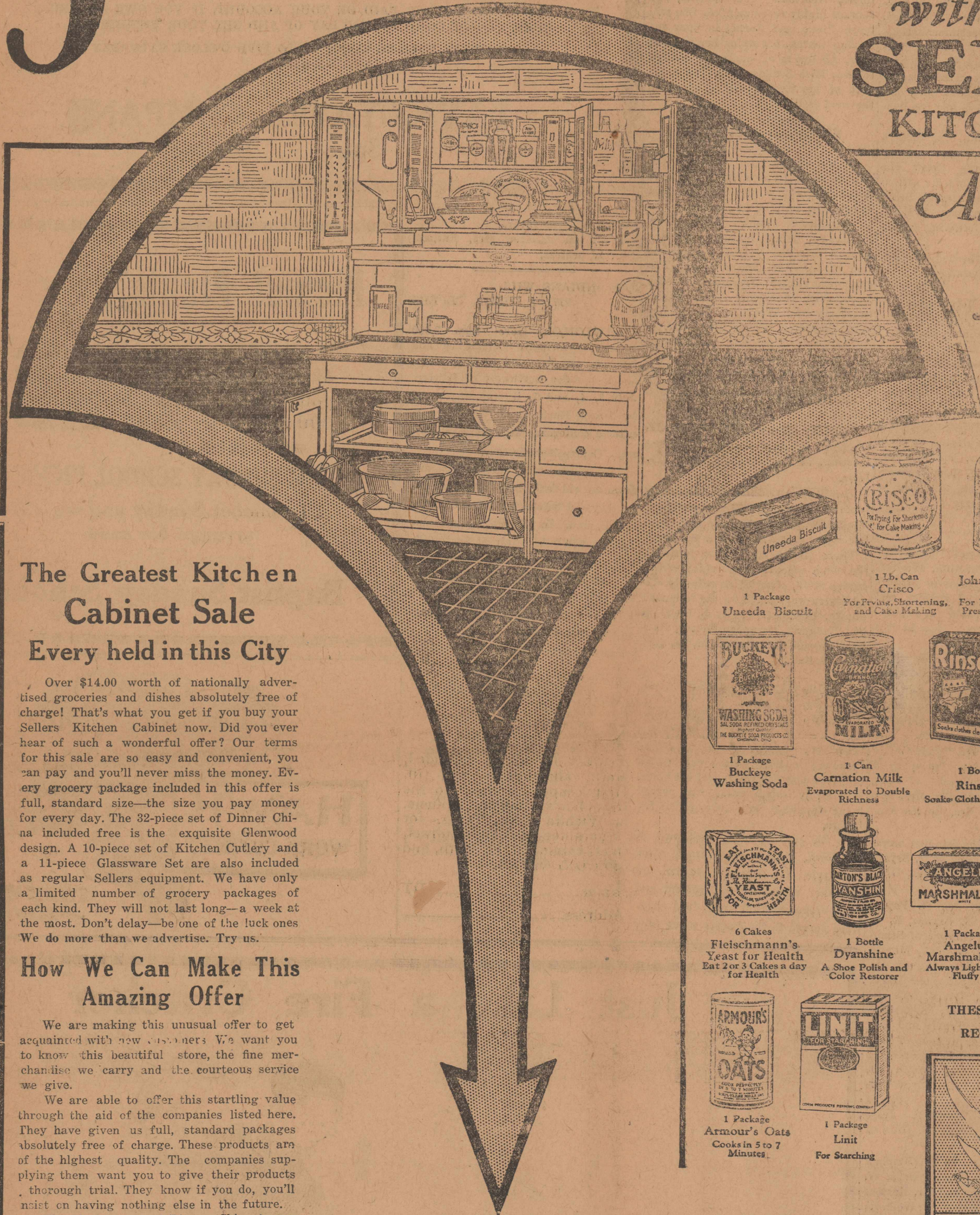

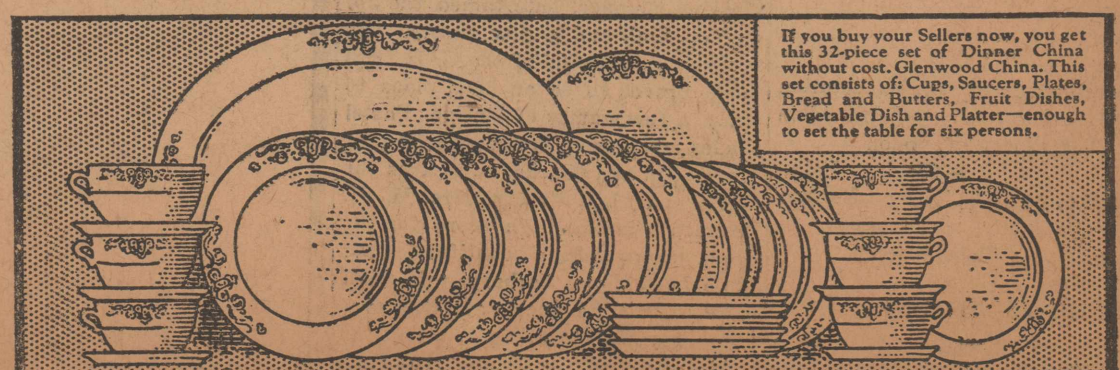
