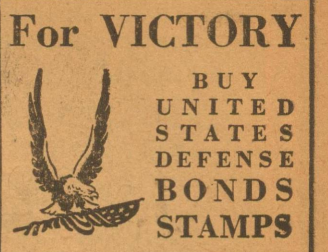

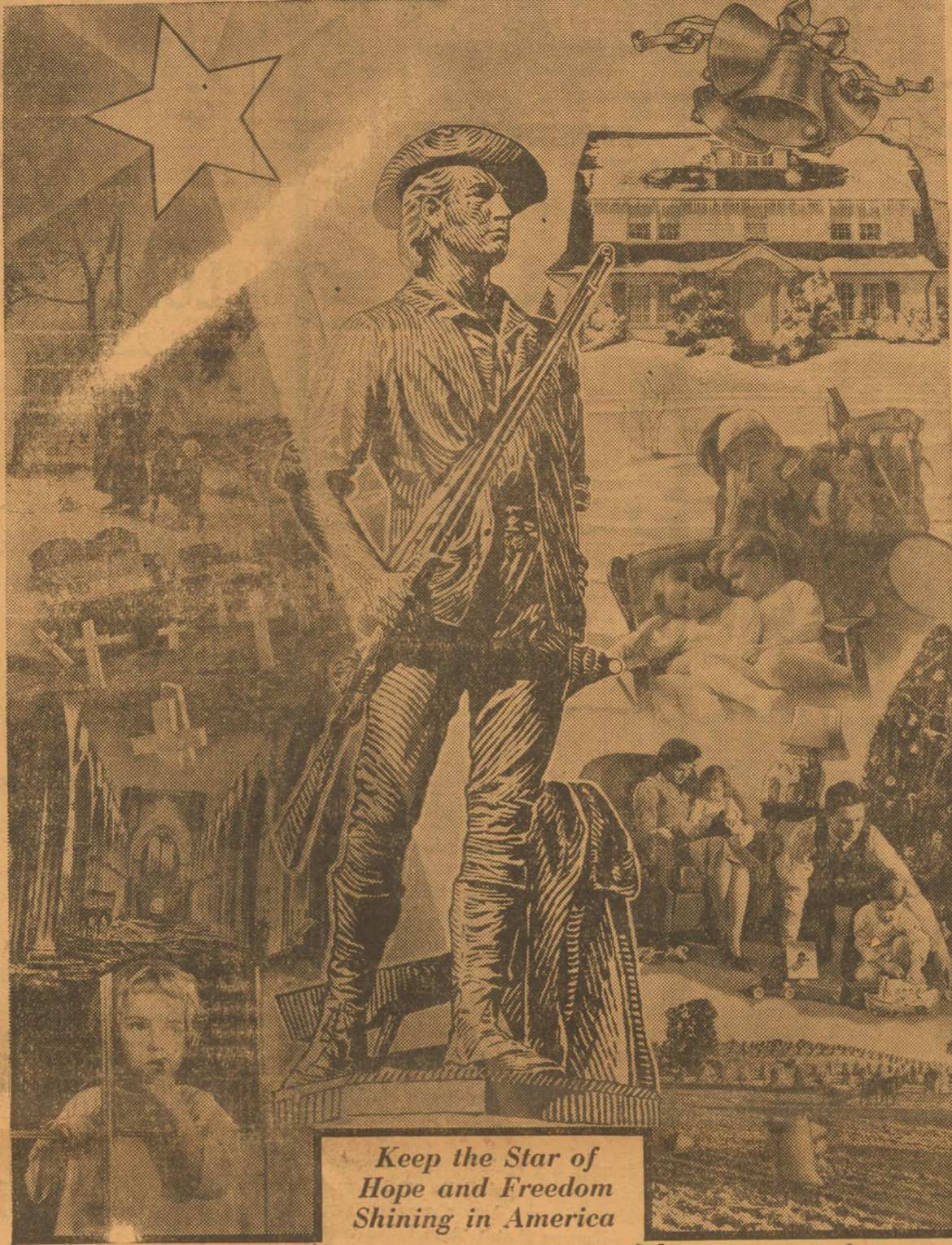
To complete the new work for the above merit badges required six hours of training every day they were in camp.

County Democratic Committee Met Monday

The County Executive Committee of the Democratic Party held their regular meeting at the Court House to receive filings for office by candidates in the county and different precincts. Hull of Precinct 10, Charlie McLaughlin of Precinct 11, and Bud Smiley of Precinct 12, J. E. Sparks of Precinct 13, and T. E. Milam of Precinct 16.

A vacancy on the Committee for Midway was filled by the Committee, Ernest Nolan being appointed. H. C. Edwards was appointed on the Committee for Croton to fill a vacancy, and Bud Smiley was appointed on the Committee for Duncan Flat.

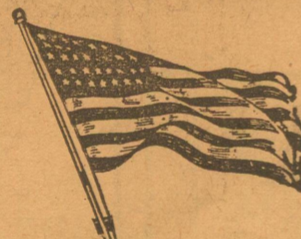

TAKE IT TO YOUR LOCAL SCRAP DEALER OR FILLING STATION

As has been announced next Saturday, June 20, has been designated as "Junk Iron Day" in Dickens County. This is a request for people to cooperate in furnishing the old iron at a reasonable price and get it back to the mills where it can be used in making war materials. Bring in your junk iron and tin and aluminum Saturday if possible. The Committee on Scrap Iron has made suitable arrangements and people can get a little something out of the scrap iron and old tin.

The Spur Iron and Junk Yard, operated by Mr. Sexton, is paying from \$7.00 to \$12.00 per ton for your scrap iron in Spur. He is paying from \$7.00 to \$10.00 per ton for it at Croton and Afton. At Croton the iron is being weighed in over the Dempsey Gin Scales and at Afton it is being weighed in over the Farmers Cooperative Gin scales.

Mr. Anderson at McAdoo is buying scrap iron and tin there is a buyer at Dickens who will take care of your scrap iron there. The scrap iron is worthless on the farm, and it will be of much value in wining the war.

The Scrap Iron Committee has worked diligently on the project, and they hope the people will respond at this time and get all of this scrap iron and tin back to the factories where it can be used to protect our liberties. If possible, bring it in Saturday and make this project go over with a bang and use the scrap iron to bang the Japs.

American At Bataan Pray for Airplanes To Fight The Japs

United Press dispatch stated that American soldiers prayed in their foxholes on Bataan for airplanes to drive off the Japanese according to a report made by Col George Sheppard Clarke, who escaped shortly before American resistance collapsed.

"They'd say: 'God, please get us off; let's go to the air again. We'd give our seats in hell just to get up in a plane,'" Clarke said.

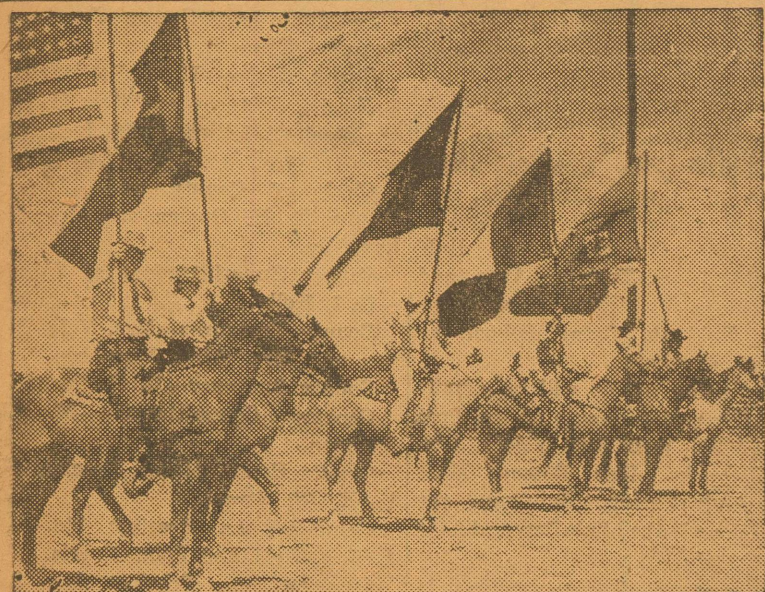

Political Pot Boilings

Texas' political spotlight, dimmed in recent weeks by the war, burns brighter these days, viewing with the battle communiques for the front pages and commanding the interest of voters from East Texas' piney woods to West Texas' Plains country.

In the state capitol, interest in things political were spurred by the recent resignation of snuff-dipping Jerry Sadler as Railroad Commissioner and "inside-track" filing by bushy-browed James E. Kilday, a "look-a-like," incidentally, for John L. Lewis if there ever was one.

But that was last week and this week new developments swung the attention of capital observers to a familiar topic W Lee O'Daniel.

Real heat, first from two veteran campaigners, was injected into the tri-cornered race for the U. S. Senate and no man could tell for certain who would get their fingers—or what have you—burned most.

These were the developments: 1. O'Daniel, who has been as silent in Washington as Lincoln's tomb even in the face of hard-hitting blows by his two opponents, made the announcement he would travel the Texas political highways and byways in the company of Hal Collins, candidate for governor. And, he opened his campaign with a broadcast from Waco.

2. Former Governor Dan Moody, a sturdy veteran of the campaign wars who upset the invincible Fergusons, swung hammer blows at O'Daniel in a series of announcements. Red-headed Dan declared O'Daniel was pulling a "Huey Long" stunt in trying to dictate the choice of Collins as governor. And, commented Moody, what justification can O'Daniel offer in asking for re-election when he has admitted he cannot get anything accomplished in the Senate?

3. Former Judge James V. Allred, hitting the West Texas campaign trails, bludgeoned O'Daniel with a declaration that he was a candidate because he "was tired of having fun poked at Texas because of our Junior Senator."

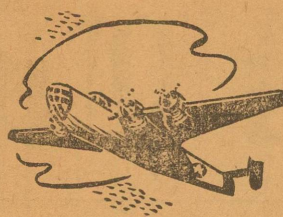
It was too early in the campaign to tell anything definite of the probable outcome, but observers generally agree that O'Daniel has been hard hit by his two formidable opponents. What the remaining weeks of the campaign will bring is a matter of intense conjecture with the O'Daniel backers declaring the Junior Senator's "magic radio voice" will bring his constituents back into the fold.

Capital comment was that Candidate Moody's repeated blasts were the most devastating. The fiery Austin attorney called attention to O'Daniel vote against the service of the men drafted when he addressed the Senate and declared: "I oppose extending the period 18 months, or six months or one day."

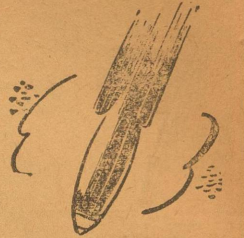
"The President, Secretary of War, the Army Chief of Staff," Moody declared, "had appealed to Congress to continue these men in training. The war was all about us. Our ships had been sunk; our soldiers were in thought it was a time to disband armed forces."

Whether O'Daniel would win again, whether fast-talkin Jimmy Allred would take his measure or whether silver-tongued Dan Moody, the political giant killer of yesteryear, would join Tom Connally in the Senate is the topic of the day.

And one thing is certain: this trio is likely to run the Japs back

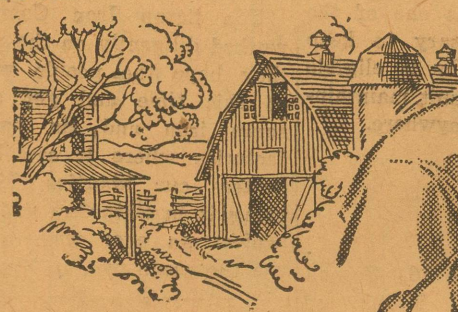

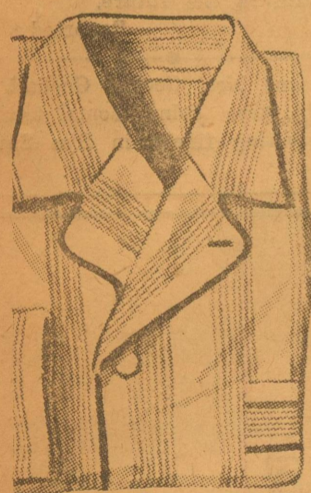

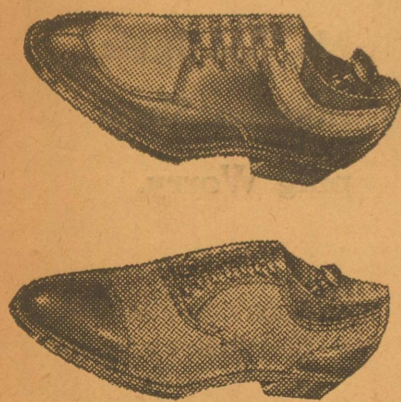

Government Wants Your Old Rubber

According to a statement sent out by President Roosevelt, people are asked to sell their old rubber at a reasonable price to assist in carrying on the war. It is understood that those who handle this old rubber are not to make a penny profit out of it.

The following is a copy of a telegram received by Chairman Elton Cook, who heads the County Committee on Scrap Iron and Scrap Rubber, which is self explanatory. We are reproducing this telegram as it was sent by the Texas Salvage Committee:

Telegram

Dallas, Texas, June 15, 5:11 P
Elton Cook,
Dickens, Texas

President Roosevelt has directed that an all out Nationwide salvage rubber campaign begin at 12:01, a. m., Monday June 15 and continue until midnight Thursday, June 30. The President asks every American Citizen who has reclaimable rubber to take it to the nearest gasoline filling station where it will be purchased at the uniform price of one penny per pound. The oil industry has agreed to make available all of its personnel and facilities including its filling stations and bulk plants which will be used as collection depots. Oil company trucks will pick up rubber from filling stations paying them at the same rate of one penny per pound. Will you and your committee please work in cooperation with the oil industries' local representatives in this drive? You and your Committee will want to do everything within your power to stimulate the flow of reclaimable rubber to the gasoline stations and oil and bulk plants. For your information the oil industry will sell the rubber collected to the Rubber Reserve Company, a subsidiary of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. The oil industry will turn over to the National Headquarters of USO, Army Relief, Navy Relief and the American Red Cross on an equal basis any receipts in excess of purchase price. There will be no profit to the oil industry. Reclaimable rubber which is acceptable will include all types of rubber except battery boxes and parts thereof and tire heads. Metal, wood and leather should be removed from such articles as leather shoes, baby buggy tires, etc. Governor Stevenson is requesting the mayors in all Texas cities to issue statements in form of proclamation supporting this campaign. Please use every possible means of publicity to get this campaign across, and please, be sure to supply this office with accurate information as to the amount of rubber collected during the drive which in turn will be sent to the Governor's Office and reported by him direct to the President of the United States.

Sixth Annual Rodeo at Snyder June 26-27

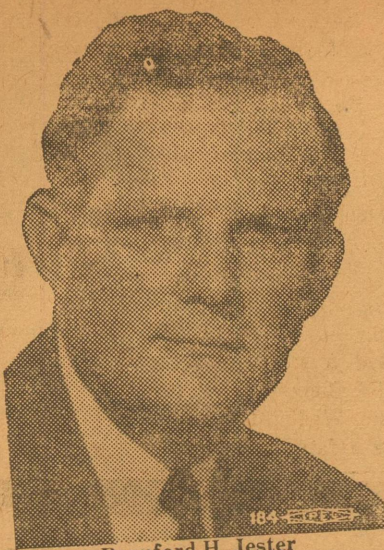

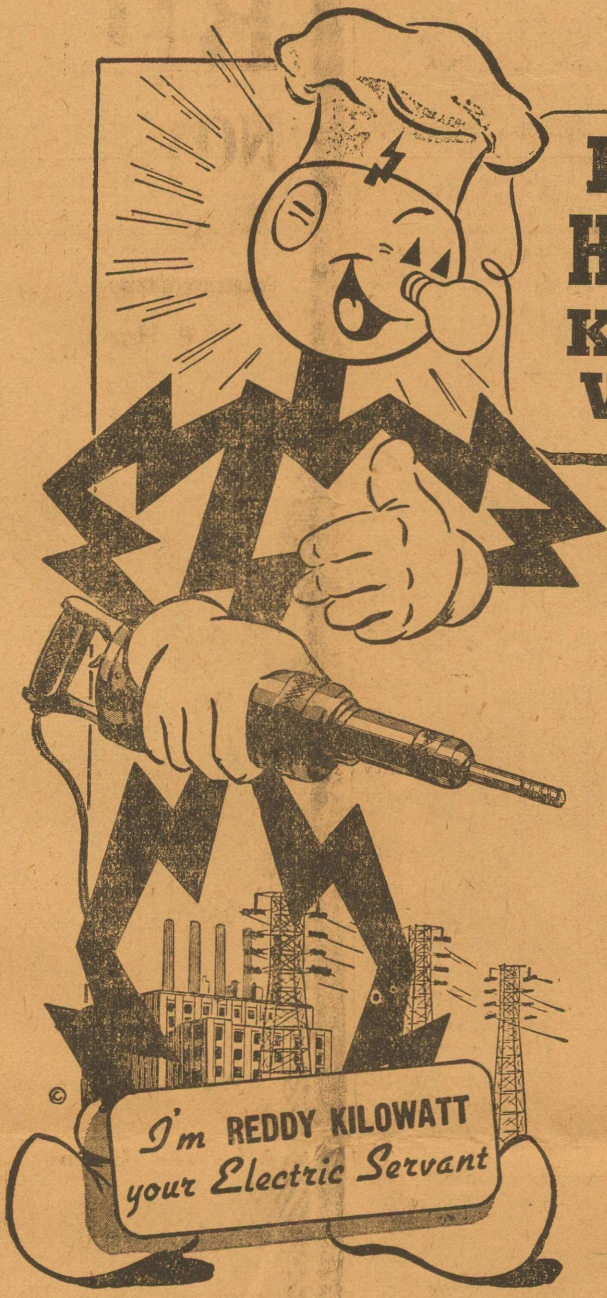

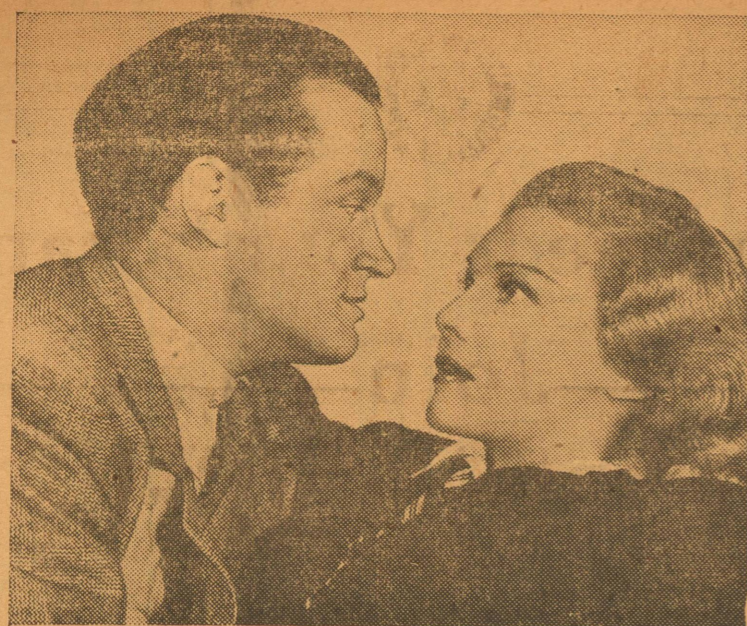

Texas To Register 220,000. Men On June 30

Plans are underway to register approximately 220,000 young Texans between the ages of eighteen and twenty, inclusive, on June 30, General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director announced.

All men who were born on or before January 1, 1922, and on or before June 30, 1924, must register between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. on Tuesday June 30, General Page warned, and they must be careful to give their correct address where official communications will reach them without delay. He said: "This Fifth Registration will complete the inventory of the Nation's potential manpower, although under current policy, men under twenty are not subject to induction for combat duty.

"Local boards will officially designate places of registration in their particular areas. While anyone who is unavoidably away from his home on June 30 may register at the registration place most convenient on that day, all registrants are urged to make every effort to register with their own local boards to avoid possible confusion in the future. Any person who must register away from home is warned to specify his home address so that his registration card may be forwarded promptly to his own local board.

"A registrant who has more than one place of residence may choose which one he wants recorded as his place of residence, and in making the choice he designates the local board which will always have jurisdiction over him."

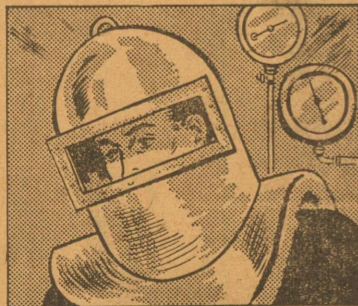

Hal H. Collins, of Mineral Wells, who is traveling with Senator O'Daniel, made the opening address in his campaign for Governor of Texas.

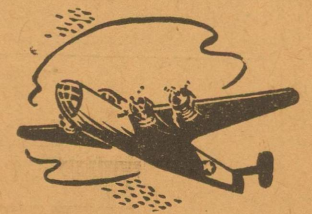

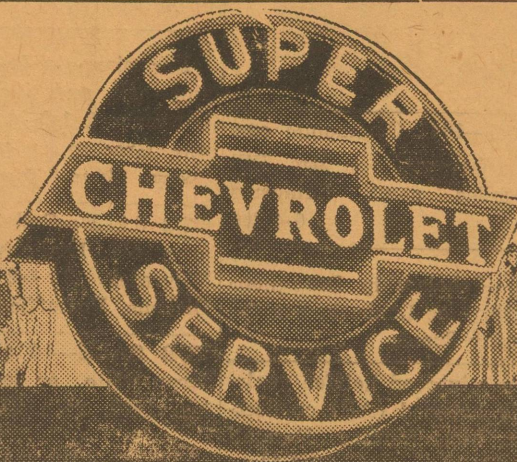
