It is pathetic how tense many people are. I went into the big bus terminal in New York, to take a bus to New Jersey. Cambodian Leaders Said Dead

By The Associated Press / Communist-led forces consolidated assault positions around Saigon and continued their sweep down the central coast, the Saigon military command reported_

Americans were lining up to leave the frightened South Vietnamese capital and three U.S. aircraft carriers put to sea in the Western Pacific.

City Under Attack Saigon command spokesmen said North Vietnamese tanks and infantrymen were attacking government defenders at Ham Tan City, 75 miles east of Saigon and the capital of Bihn Tuy province. Battle details were not available, but it was believed the North Vietnamese force was the same that overran Phan Thiet, another provincial capital 30 miles to the north, two days ago.

Meanwhile, Cambodian refugees said insurgent forces executed 43 former government soldiers after taking control of a provincial town, and Khmer Rouge radio claimed most of the men who led the fallen Phnom Penh government in its last agonizing days had been beheaded.

Dirt, Squirt & Quirt

FARM, DAIRY AND RANCH NEWS -By CHARLES W. GREEN Midland County Agent

The large amount of moisture received last fall has brought out a colorful display of wildflowers on area rangelands. This growth has used much of the moisture in the top foot or so of the soil and will affect warm season grass growth. Unless some good rain is received, grass production will be quite limited.

Some bad news for alfalfa producers has been noted in the report of the first detection in the Trans-Pecos area of the alfalfa weevil, Hypera postica.

Charles Neeb, area extension entomologist, has also found the weevils in Midland, Glasscock and Martin counties. This pest was first detected in Texas in 1968 in southern and eastern areas of the state.

Weevil larvae can cause heavy damage to the first crop of alfalfa. They feed within the plant tips, on opening upper leaves and then on the lower foliage, skeletonizing the leaves.

A field damaged by the weevil first appears greenish-gray and later takes on a grayish to whitish east.

Alfalfa producers should maintain field inspection this month. Early detection of the pest would aid in the implementation of control programs to prevent the establishment of the weevil in this area.

For information to aid in identifying the weevil, producers may contact the county agent.

Another insect which has been quite active this spring is the aphid. Aphids have heavily infested ornamental and garden

They are small (seldom over 1/8 inch long), soft-bodied, pearshaped insects of various colors, such as green, black, gray or red.

Most aphids attack en masse, preferring young shoots, buds and leaves. Aphid damage can stunt growth, deform leaves and fruit and cause galls on leaves, stems and roots

Aphids have the highest reproductive potential of any insect, being capable of completing 50 generations a year under ideal conditions.

The use of insecticides is often the only means of controlling pest. However, in some cases cultural practices such as proper pruning, fertilizing and water play important roles in preventing or suppressing insect infestations

Beneficial insects also play an important role in aphid control. Aphids' natural enemies include lady beetles, syrphus fly larvae, aphid lions and small, wasp-like parasites known as braconids. Since the reproductive poten-

tial of the aphid is so great. damage can often result before natural enemies can bring the pest under control. Therefore, close and frequent inspections of trees and plants are important in preventing damage

Insecticides suggested for chemical control are diazinon, dimethoate or malathion Mix and apply the material exactly as directed on the label, observing all precautions.



For many that college name still rings with oh-so-smug sophistication, the snobbish superiority of bright, aggressive rich girls away from home.

"I thought women would come out of here saying Welless-lee," Barbara Sheridan sep-arated the syllables in a bored, aristocratic monotone between clenched teeth.

She grinned. "Maybe that happened before, but I don't think it does so much any-

"Before" was when Wellesley stood out as the social pinnacle in the academic mountains of the Seven Sister colleges. That was when good girls went to girls' schools. Mothers insisted. Fathers paid willingly.

Now, after a social revolution that insists men and women are the same, or at least equal, thing more. It is a college run by women for women.

That old notion is re-emerging as a good idea. For most all-female schools, it comes in the nick of time.

In 1968 there were 308 women's colleges in the United States. Now there are 145. The rest have folded, merged or in the case of 119, gone coed. But only seven of them have disappeared since 1972.

In the past couple of years, the women's liberation movement has reached into high chools, and the idea that maybe women are the best people to prepare girls for a male-dominated world caught

Indeed, 70 women's colleges have formed the Women's Col-

was an 18 per cent increase over 1973's 2,000 applicants. The low point in recent years was 1971, when 1,852 students applied. The peak in the 1960s

was 1965, when 2,322 applied. At Mt. Holyoke in South Hadley, Mass., there were 1,833 applicants in 1968, 1,682 in 1971 and 1,937 this year. "When I decided to come

here, it was because of Wellesley's academic reputation" said Miss Sheridan, 20, a junior from Deerfield, Ill., "I don't think I gave any thought to the fact that it was a women's school, and if I did, I'm not sure I would have come. For Women Only: come.

"Now I'm really glad. It's made me look for the first time at broadening women's role. It's forced me to think about the type of career I will have. I know the need to push myself into a position of responsibility. he head with this constantly." The ability to make women

competitive is emerging as the dominating spirit of women's colleges, whether they are such academic bulwarks as Wellesley or other liberal arts schools with bright new career

"Women's colleges are the schools that perform," said Barbara Newell, president of Wellesley. "Part of the reason is that students are taken more seriously in women's colleges. There is less sex typing of career possibilities."

Laura Murphy, 19, of Baltimore, said she decided on Wellesley when she found the interviewer friendlier and the surroundings prettier than at Brown or Radcliffe, where she also was accepted.

Arbitrators May Have To Learn To Throw Curves

NEW YORK (AP) - According to the head of the major league baseball players association, future impartial arbitrators in salary hearings may have to know how to hit the curve ball. Or at least, they'll have to know what it is.

Marvin Miller, executive director of the ballplayers' un-ion—the most effective and unified labor force in modern sports history—says knowledge about the game may become a qualification for impartial arbitrators who want to rule on future salary disputes between the players and owners. "I'm beginning to think we

need arbitrators who have baseball, backgrounds," Miller

said in a recent interview. An integral part of the three-year contract between the players and owners, which expires this Dec. 31, was salary arbitration. The provision allowed players who couldn't reach salary agreement with their owners to take the owner to an arbitration hearing in which the player submits one figure and

management tosses in another. The arbitrator, chosen jointly by the players association and the player relations committee, then selects one of the two figworked to the players' benefit, citing a 12 per cent increase in across-the-board salaries following 1974-the first year of arbitration-after salary- increases in the previous five years had never exceeded eight per cent.

But he says it could work even better if all the arbitrators knew a baseball from a golf ball, and that a qualification of baseball background for arbitrators may become an issue when the players associ-ation and the owners begin negotiating a new basic agreeent. Miller expects to start

facing the owners across a negotiating table in June.

"The arbitrator must have some understanding about what baseball is all about," Miller said. "He must know what the statistics mean and what the statistics don't mean, what goes into performance that you don't see in statistics and what the history of the salary structure of baseball is."

One of Miller's major complaints is the emphasis on what certain arbitrators call falling performance. "Using their thinking," Miller says, "Babe Ruth should have been cut from his \$80,000 salary after his

In 1975, 16 players were given their salaries by impartial arbitrators. Ten received the owner's lower estimate; six were given the figure they requested. Miller said of the 10 decisions 'awarding the owners' figure, some were close judgment calls but in others "it is clear from what the arbitrators said that didn't understand base-

Miller then cited John Hogan in the Ken Holtzman case, William Simkin in the Reggie Jackson case and Jacob Seiden-berg in the Sal Bando case.

In the Jackson case, the 1973 American League Most Valuable Player asked for a \$33,500 increase but the arbitrator op-ted for Oakland A's owner Charles O. Finley's offer of a \$5,000 raise.

Dick Moss, counsel for the players association who monitored the 1975 arbitration cases on the West Coast, said Bando wasn't offered a raise by Finlev but he still finished third in the most valuable player ballot-

"Reggie Jackson finished fourth in the MVP balloting," Moss added "but the arbitrator says he's only entitled to a \$5,-000 raise. And the decision in the Holtzman case displays the same faulty reasoning. The arbitrator said he only won 19 games when the year before he won 21. Two proposed amendments to the state constitution will be before nents concerning the measures. the voters-if any.

This "if any" business should be of concern to all residents of the Lone Star State. And there is considerable doubt if anywhere near a representative vote will be polled. Nevertheless, the election will cost about \$1.5 million.

The first proposal pertains to state and local retirement systems and provides for an increase in the ceiling on state contributions to the teacher and state employe systems from six per cent to 10 per cent of salary. It also provides benefit increases to retired teachers and state employes. Legislation appropriating \$119.8 million to fund these benefits is contingent upon approval of the amendment.

Amendment No. 2 increases the annual salary of members of the

These are matters of major importance to taxpayers, but very little information has been distributed by either sponsors or oppo-

U.S. Officials Sure Of Nothing Right Now

WASHINGTON - The Elysee Palace has passed the word that President Valery Giscard d'Estaing may break French policy of the last decade by attending a NATO summit meeting late in May, a surprising message indicating European alarm at the suddenly fallen fortunes of the U.S.

No French president has ever attended a North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) summit since the French pulled out of the alliance's military structure in 1966. The bare possibility that Giscard himself may indeed go to Brussels for the summit meeting that President Ford is now trying to put together was privately raised with the U.S. embassy in Paris.

If he does attend, it will signal no change in French policy toward NATO; nor will Giscard be a particularly eager participant. Rather, the decision to attend would display one thing: rising French concern, shared all over Western Europe, that the catastrophe of American policy in Southeast Asia coupled with Soviet advances requires a solid show of Western unity.

There is also reaction in Moscow. So shattering and sudden is the U.S. debacle in Vietnam and Cambodia that policymakers here detect minute though significant policy changes inside the Kremlin to protect the U.S.-Soviet detente. The first change: an order from the Kremlin to the Communist party of Portugal to "go slow" in seizing total power in Lisbon.

That directive was given to the seond ranking Portuguese Communist party official on his recent visit to Moscow to discuss the rapid and astonishing success of the party in its grasp for control of the Western anchor of NATO.

U.S. officials desperately trying to grasp the full impact of the worst foreign policy defeat in this nation's history are sure of nothing at this early stage, but a consensus is beginning to develop along these lines:

The Kremlin was probably shocked as much as the Ford administration by the wholly unexpected withdrawal and subsequent collapse of the South Vietnamese army. With thousands of Americans still in Saigon and Phnom Penh as potential victims of Asian fury, Moscow is fearful that mass killings could arouse violent reactions in the U.S. - "arouse the slumbering beast," in the words of one policymaker and result in angry anti-Soviet sentiment. That could shatter detente, which the Kremlin definitely does not want to hap-

Having poured arms and munitions into Hanoi, the Soviet Union has forfeited control over the pace of events in Vietnam. But it is not without important political and financial resources to slow down the Communist takeover in Portugal.

There is, moreover, another explanation for a Soviet go-slow order to its confederates in Portugal. Moscow desperately wants an all-European summit meeting later this year that would formally recognize Soviet hegemony over its European empire. If Portugal slips inside the Communist orbit, the Kremlin can forget all about any such summit

These first political developments from the debacle of Vietnam - a French concession to President Ford's call for a Western summit and Moscow's effort to restrain the Portuguese Communists - underscore a key phrase in Mr. Ford's distended speech to Congress: "As long as I'm President," he said,

we will not permit detente to become a license to fish in troubled waters.'

Those words reflect both the hardline policy of Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and the specific recommendation, made directly to the Oval Office on several occasions the past 10 days, of Secretary of Defense James Schlesinger. The warning, however, did not have to be made by the President for Soviet leaders to get the point.

Even in the Middle East, Moscow playing a "cool and quiet" game, according to one presidential adviser. The Soviets are working closely with radical Palestinians to avoid border attacks against Israel that might set off another Arab-Israeli war - and a superpower confrontation.

These covert Soviet moves point in only one direction: detente as a Soviet policy is serving Soviet interests far too well to risk anything approaching direct face-down with the U.S. President Ford's toughest job now is to find ways for the U.S. to escape further defeats within the same detente framework a problem of statesmanship harder than any President has faced since World

The world was startled when the multimillionaire shipping tycoon in 1968 married the widow of the martyred President John F. Kennedy. Onassis was a swarthy, gnome-like

man, two inches shorter and 24 years older than the beautiful Jackie. For the Kennedy legions, who had looked upon her as the keeper of Camelot, it was the end of a glorious era.

She had been afraid, her friends said, that she might tarnish Kennedy's to a divorce. memory if she became Mrs. Anybody Else. But she had succumbed, they suggested, to Ari's submerged irresistibility.

Our sources swear, on the contrary, it was Jackie who pursued Ari. As they recall the circumstances, Onassis got into a hot argument with his paramour, the tempestuous soprano Maria Callas, during a Caribbean cruise in the summer of 1968. She flew off in a fury to New York City.

About the same time, according to intimates, Jackie caught a commercial flight to the Virgin Islands and arranged an invitation to join Onassis on his yacht. A couple months later, he signed a premarital contract which, our sources say, awarded her \$3 million in tax-free bonds. They were married on Oct. 20, 1968, on his private Aegean island of

WASHINGTON-The American bourgeoisie, which H.L. Mencken loved to label the "boobocracy," is urged to put South Vietnam out of mind like a bad dream. About 1 million Catholics fled North-Vietnam, when the Communists took over years ago, and now there are more than 2 million Catholics living in South Vietnam. Many thousands of these Catholics, because of their opposition to communism, are on the North Vietnamese "blood debt" lists.

The Communists reportedly have also set up a tripartite commission in Da Nang for announced purposes of "conciliation." If this Communist regime

holds true to form, the commission will serve as a filter center to find out who is "reliable" and those who aren't will soon be shot in the head.

Under Ho Chi Minh and his successors, the North Vietnamese have murdered several hundred thousand, and these are not military casualties; they are old-fashioned executions. One most Americans are familiar with is the Hue massacre during the 1968 Tet offensive.

When the Communists were finally forced out of Hue, some 5,700 of the city's residents were missing. One year later mass graves were discovered, and

It's Late To Bed, Early To Rise ...

AUSTIN - It was five minutes after five the other day when the House of Representatives adjourned.

People who had been waiting all afternoon for committee hearings scheduled for 2:30 learned after their wait that their committees would not meet until this week, so they turned sadly away, heading for home and wondering about all this democracy.

This week, they'll come back, and hope that this time they will get to be heard. Or, if it's a bill they don't want passed, they will be duly grateful for the delay, knowing that the closer adjournment day - June 2 - draws, the less chance there is of the bill to become law.

The day before, the House stayed in session until 4:09 p.m., and the committee meetings on marijuana and church-sponsored day care centers got started about 4:30. They quit for a time, and then ran into night sessions, but wound up hearing only about half of

And, of course, when those committees ran overtime, there was a proolem getting quorums for the regular night metings scheduled for 7:30 that night. Some committees operated with far less than a quorum and finally mustered their majorities late in the evening to vote on bills they had never neard a word about.

One state executive tells this sad tale about the new House appropriations in the Finance Committee, working on

process which Speaker Billy Clayton invented, to "get more input into the appropriations process." "I came up there three times before

I got into a committee meeting," he said sadly. "By the time I got to explain my budget request, only four of the members were there. They seemed to understand our problems. But the next week, when they got around to voting on it, the seven absentees were the ones there and they just tore it

This executive was among many you'll find, roaming the corridors of the Capitol instead of tending to their jobs, trying to find legislators to explain what they need in their budgets that the "substantive committees" left out.

The House problem is, of course, that it spends so much time in bill-killing and passing that its committees simply have little time to consider the flood of bills the members have introduced.

Senators, who introduced only half as many bills, just a few over 1,000, have their problems on a smaller scale. But Senate committees can be frustrating, too, to those who come to have their say.

Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas conducted a hearing the other morning of his Education Committee with just one or two of his fellow committee members there most of the time. Sens. A. M. Aikin Jr., of Paris, Tati Santiesteban of El Paso, Pete Snelson of Midland and Kent Hance of Lubbock were all

is unhampered by the semi-binding recommendations of the "substantive committees.

Mauzy worked the committee's way through several bills and finally it was 10:15, just about time for the Senate to meet at 10:30 a.m. He announced sadly that there just would not be time to hear from witnesses on the other bills, most of them parts of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's program for giving the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, more power over the programs and boards of regents of the state universities.

Frank Erwin Jr., former regent, now unpaid lobbyist for the University of Texas System, and the other college lobbyists who had struggled up there at 9 a.m. after sitting up until nearly midnight the night before with the House Higher Education Committee, straggled

off to get another cup of coffee.

Just then, Aikin, Snelson and Santiesteban arrived, making a quorum, and six bills were given favorable reports. Lobbyists, reporting to their clients that "nothing happened — they didn't have a quorum" were surprised half an hour later when the reports were read to the Senate of committee approval of

It all goes to show that you have to get up real early and stay up real late to catch the quorums which develop at the tail end of a meeting and take the actions on whether bills become law or languish in committee forever.

tional array of scientists believes the discoverers of the American continents may have been ancient Spanish sailors, probably from Cadiz.

Recently, professor Thomas Lee of Quebec's Laval University announced that three stone carvings found near Montreal earlier this century indicate the Spanish explorers were in the area before 150 B.C.

H. Barraclough Harvard University sees the theory as supporting his report earlier this year that Libyan sailors reached the western coast of South America and eventually settled in Polynesia. Fell believes the Canadian theory involves explorers from the same civilization who sailed west from the Spanish coast instead of east out of Libya.

Fell said dating of the stone carvings indicates the Spanish visited between 475 and 150 B.C. "The visitors were from Spain, from the general area of Cadiz. They write that name using the old spelling, saying, 'We are voyagers from Cadiz.' Hundreds of similar carvings have been found in Spain. So far as we have evidence, the Spaniards were the first voyagers to North and South America. They're the earliest we know of so far.'
