Streets.

BUMP, BUMP, jumpity, chug. "Where are we at?" "Oh, keep quiet, we're out in the middle of the Lubbock square. In the midst of civilization and, like the Swiss across the water, the people here love mountain scenery. The bold youth and coy maid, are wont together to stroll beneath the overhanging cliff or in pretty, shady cove, where picturesque nature doth incite romantic

thought and they their lives do troth. The deep, dark abyss and the towering peak invite the poet the muse to woo, and cause one, even as prosaic as we, to break forth in lyric strain as follows:

O, ye mounts, so high and grand; you fill our hearts with awe; you shake us up to beat the band, as we bounce from draw to draw. And Buzzard bay is a daisy, too; she inspired our tender heart (as cross her breast the ripples flew) to wish she was off the chart.

The road overseer needs get to work with plow and hoe and spade and let not hands their duty shirk, till mounts are valleys made.

Then we'll fall no more in poetic strain, but pure old prose we'll write, and folks'll not cuss the streets again, cause they'll be fixed all right.

Some of that surplus road and bridge fund that is causing so much trouble could be used very appropriately on the roads and streets and nobody could say that it was illegally or unconstitutionally used.

Rabbit Drive.

For some time the question of having a rabbit drive has been talked of by our people. The rabbit is getting to be very destructive to gardens and orchards and war should be waged upon him. One of the most effective methods of fighting the rabbit is the "drive." In this, wings of woven wire are stretched out for a mile or two at a right angle to each other and at the corner is built a pen. The people then form a line several miles from these wings and all drive toward them, closing in as they go.

In portions of southwest Texas, by means of the drive, thousands of rabbits have been killed in one day.

Why not celebrate the Fourth of July by having a big Rabbit drive and at the conclusion a big barbecue. It would afford sport to old and young, big and little, man and woman and will not only be pleasurable but also profitable.

Primary Election.

Some of our citizens are advocating the idea of having a primary election on July 9th. They argue that our town and county need harmony and that a campaign of several months will result in discord; and that to have it all settled at a primary election would avert this discord and would be as fair for one as for the other. 1st. We believe that the Primary would not settle the matter, for these reasons: The local campaign is not run on party lines; there are many staunch Democrats who will not take the pledge required at primary elections, when it relates to county candidates; and those candidates who

felt that he will--of those who voted at the primary did not represent the voice of the people, would run on an independent ticket, knowing that there would be enough Republicans, Populists and Democrats, who will take no part in the primary to elect an independent candidate, so a primary would mean a warm prelude to a hot play, a lively skirmish to a fierce fight; and will only add other voices to the discordant medley; other fuel to the raging flames; and result in confusion worse confounded.

2nd. It would not be as fair for one as for another. For the situations of the various county candidates differ. Some may be tied down by business affairs and cannot make a canvass of the three counties (about 2700 square miles) while others might have nothing else to do, during the next thirty days, again, one of the candidates is now away and will be away until after the primary election, thus placing him at a great disadvantage and, surely, his opponent is too honorable to take such an advantage of him.

And there are some times tricks and schemes practiced by politicians, these, if allowed to run would show themselves but in thirty short days, that now intervene, tricks of chicanery could be very successfully perpetrated, which if allowed to run till November could be forestalled (now don't come around and threaten to take our scalps, for we haven't said anybody has been doing this) but we know that dishonorable men do do dishonorable things in politics.

We say all this because we believe that the discord that will be created in the primary election will grow with time until its discordant notes jar the very elements as they revolve from center to circumference of these counties.

The primary will open up the conflict sooner than it would otherwise start and the result will be a fierce fight long drawn out but without the primary, comparative quiet will reign for some time yet, there will be reconitering, marching and counter-marching, but no hard fighting.

The text above referred to, reads about as follows:

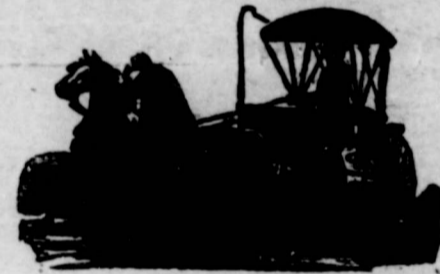

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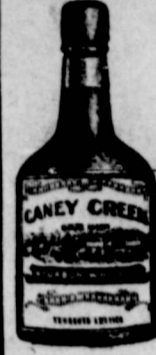
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
