Shellac In Chinese Works of Art. By softening shellac with heat it may be drawn out and twisted into almost white sticks and of a fine silky luster. Extreme beauty is given to Chinese works of art by the use of shellac. Some of them are very ancient and of great value. They are chiefly chowchow boxes, tea basins or other small objects made of wood or metal. They are covered with a coat of shellac, colored with vermilion, and while the layer of shellac is soft and-pliable it is molded and shaped into beautiful pat terns. Some of these works thus ornamented are so rare and beauti ful that even in China they cost fabulous sums.
