This ancient organization, which is said to be the oldest of its kind in existence, has its home on the Delaware river, near Cornwall station, on the New York division of the Pennsylvania railroad. William Warner, because of his gift of the use of the club's land at a nominal rental and the right to build upon it, was dubbed by his fellow-members of the colony "Baron" Warner, which, it must be admitted was a highsounding title for a modest Quaker. Those who were privileged to witness the ceremony of paying the rental on May 1 never forgot the picturesque sight. Wearing broad-brimmed hats with white braids, headed, by the governor, the members of the colony marched to the "baronial" mansion and there formally delivered the rentthree sun perch laid crosswise on a pewter platter. Now, however, the citizens of Pennsylvania, in Schuylkill, own their own lands, which fact has, of course, done away with the ceremony of the sun perch. Not the least interesting feature of the rent paying was the fact that the men who carried the plebeian sun fish were usually millionaires.

The San Angelo Standard, San Dallas News for sale at the Horn Conclusive Proof That the Koreans Were the First to Perceive Value of Movable Type.

Fifty pieces of movable type bearing the Chinese characters, being part of the first font of movable type ever made, were shown in the last week in the Museum of Natural History, in New York. England has the other half Korea, in 1403, some years before the discoveries of Forster, Gutenberg and the other early typemakers in Europe. longs the distinction of having inventcharacters in metal.

Each type is cylindrically concave on the under side, in order to make it gling more firmly to the bed of beeswax which constituted the "form." When the type had been firmly and evenly embedded in the wax the printer, sitting cross-legged before the form, covered the type with ink applied with a soft brush. Then the paper was laid lightly on the form and a piece of felt was brushed gently over the paper with one hand, after which the other removed the printed page. It was possible to strike off as many as 1,500 impressions a day in this way.

Thrown aside as useless, the font lay as rubbish on the floor of the government printing office at Seoul during the Japanese invasion of 1592-97, and carried off into Japan. Later, however, the types were collected and the font again made up and used for


