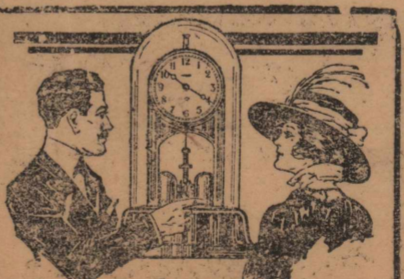

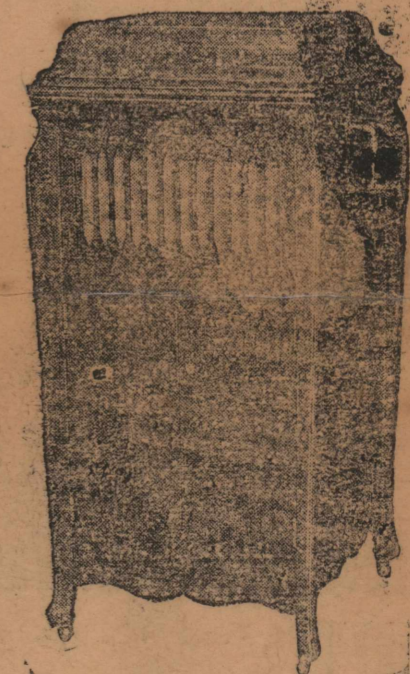

#### WHAT ARE THE CITIZENS RAILROAD COMMITTEES DOING?

The Receiver and Management of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway in Texas, has through their Attorney notified Judge James Cornell of the Sonora Citizens Committee that the corporation is ready to turn over to the Committees of Tom Green, Schleicher and Sutton counties, the right of way, grade, bridge, etc., between San Angelo and Sonora, as per their agreement of some months ago. Judge Cornell is unavoidably absent from the State, but the Committee of Sutton county, through its Chairman, W. L. Aldwell, has a proposition from persons ready and willing to enter into contract to build the railroad to Sonora, and it appears to the News that it would be advisable under the circumstances, for the committees of the three counties to meet and formulate plans for the proper recovery of the rightaway, grade etc., and to consider the proposal of the bidders and take such other action looking to the early commencement of the work of building the road.

Other projects are on foot that contemplate building a line of railroad through part of the territory that would be supplied by this Sonora extension and while the grade is a most valuable asset to us other communities might see the benefit to them of taking action while we wait.

### TAX VALUATIONS.

The tax rolls of Sutton county as approved by the Commissioners Court, for the year 1920 shows the total value to be \$4,781,330 and the total tax \$78,234.86. The said value are given as 11,214 acres valued at \$1,742,400; personal property \$2,064,600; banks, telephones \$132,470.

The taxes are divided as follows: State \$29,650.32, State poll \$510.00. Of this \$30,169.32 paid to the State the County receives in return \$5756.50 for school purposes.

The County tax is \$35,822.50. Independent school \$11,553.53. School district 5 \$743.41. County poll \$85.09.

In another column is a summary of the number of cattle, sheep, goats and horses and the values therefor reported for taxes for the years 1916 to 1920 inclusive. We have compiled this data in what we consider is a form easy to read and understand. There is meat and eating in it for the economist.

#### TWO AND A HALF MILLION COME TO HOLDERS OF THIRD LOAN BONDS NEXT MONTH

Dallas, Texas.—Owners of Liberty Bonds of the third issue, bearing 4 1/2% interest, according to Director W. Hume, Federal Director of Savings, number 719,210 in this district. The total value of Liberty Bonds bought in the district was \$116,210,052. The interest thereon at 4 1/2% will be due and payable at any bank on September 15; it will amount to \$2,459,462.50 for this, the eleventh reserve district, according to Mr. Hume. A like amount of interest on the same bonds will be paid in six months later, on March 15, 1921. Bankers are frequently finding bonds issued in 1917 and 1918 from which no interest coupons have been clipped.

Sheep men, it is claimed, are getting very substantial advances on their wool. This is permitting them to hold over last spring's clip as well as the clip now approaching and will do a great deal toward steadying the market. Texas ranchmen are not worrying a great deal about the Australian wool. One veteran West Texas ranchman stated recently in San Antonio that during the war the Australian sheep men, unable to market the wool from their fine Merino sheep crossed them with mutton type of rams and he asserts it will take them 15 years at the very least to get back to the Merino type of fine wool sheep. Wool from the sheep now in Australia, he asserts, will make carpets, hats and numerous other coarse articles but there will be no fine wools from Australia for a decade at least. It was this fine wool that was the greatest competitor against the sheep men of the United States.—Express.

#### RANCH AND RANGE ECONOMIC SURVEY.

The News is pleased to present herewith a statement by B. Youngblood, Director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, head office at College Station, who has been on a visit to the Sonora Substation No. 14, accompanied by Dr. A. B. Cox, Economist, as to the character and object of the Economic Survey being made of Sutton County.

Because of the Ranch Experiment Station is located in Sutton county, and because accurate studies have nowhere been made of the many serious economic problems which confront the ranchmen in the range country, the Experiment Station has undertaken an Economic Survey of this County. This study was begun about two weeks ago by the writer and Dr. A. B. Scott, Farm and Ranch Economist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station system.

Dr. Cox is a native of Erath county, Texas, 37 years of age and a graduate in economics of the University of Texas, who took his Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Wisconsin last June.

Dr. Cox will personally visit every ranchman in Sutton county between this and the end of the year. He will ask for facts, figures and opinions covering the main economic problems of the section, including range management, carrying capacity of the ranges, the marketing of sheep, goats and cattle, wool and mohair ranch credit facilities and needs, the tonnage of freight in and out of the country, ranch life problems, etc.

The data when assembled should be of the greatest value to the section in its relations with the markets, the State and Federal Governments, and to students of animal husbandry throughout the range country.

This study is simply a part of the Station's program of rendering needful service to the Agriculture of the entire State. It will prove highly valuable to the local Station in the matter of its operation and development along practical lines. It will give the Station men a greater familiarity with the problems of all ranches of the section and will enable them to go about the solution of these problems in the most intelligent manner possible.

It is the aim of the writer to make the scientific work of the Station practical and the practical work of the ranches scientific. He and all the Staff appreciate the hearty co-operation of the ranchmen heretofore accorded them and will be duly grateful for a continuation of their good will and support in the future.

Sutton county and the entire Live Oak Belt is an area of wonderful possibilities as yet unattained by even the best of ranchmen. The Station will help realize these possibilities as time moves on.
