





INSTRUCTION IN **RED CROSS FIRST AID SAFETY FACTOR**

Its Industrial and Educational Service Spreads Throughout the United States.

Signs that the United States is awake to the menace of its increasing accident toll are apparent in the growing interest in first aid instruction as offered by experts of the American Red Cross.

Approximately 20.000 juniors and seniors completed the First Aid course during the fiscal year, passed rigid examinations and received Red Cross First Aid certificates. This represents an increase of 2,500 over the preceding year, and this gain is attributed to the emphasis on health education by various public bodies including not alone the American Red Cross and Government agencies, but life and accident insurance companies, and athletic and recreational groups.

In Dallas, Texas, playground supervisors are required to hold First Aid certificates. In many high schools the subject is included in the regular curriculum. In order to assist in training instructors for this phase of the work, special courses have been conducted in the summer schools of such leading institutions as the University of Maryland and the University of Virginia. Ethics Had No Place in Indians' Religion

The religion of the Fox Indians of Iowa, as revealed in their rituals, had little to do with ethics, according to Dr. Truman Michelson of the Smithsonian institution's bureau of American ethnology. Doctor Michelson has returned from Tama, Iowa, where he has been recording these rituals.

Unlike Christianity and other religions, the old Fox religion did not concern itself with rules of conduct. Its ceremonials were supposed to have been ordered by supernatural spirits in the long ago, and each of them has a distinct purpose in view, such as the avoidance of disease, prevention of anyone speaking ill against the chief's village, or the insurance of success in war and similar ventures.

Doctor Michelson found varigeneral pattern. In some cases songs recur and the speaking parts are repeated word for word. Some of the rituals are still practiced by living members of the tribe, but they have in large measure lost their religious significance and become mere occasions for social gather-

In 1911, says Doctor Michelson, a majority of the tribe lived in bark houses or wigwams of rush. Now nearly every one has a modern frame house.

ed for and removed. Beside the possibility of polsoning from focal infections, old persons are also especially liable to polsoning from accumulation in the bowels. By the use of castor oil, mineral oil and other cathartics as well as irrigation, the bowels can be kept free from any accumulations.

Above all, old persons should be kept busy and occupied, interested in things outside themselves. The idea that the old should "rest" is kind but outside things has added years to the busiest live the longest. (@. 1924, Wastern Newspaper Union.)

CROSS CAMPAIGN FOR HEALTH Public Health Nursing, Nutrition and Home Hygiene Work Cover the Country.

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Important contributions to public health were made by the American Red Cross through its Public Health Nursing Service, Nutrition Service, and in instruction in Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick. In every State and Alaska, with the exception of Delaware and Nevada, instruction was given by the Red Cross, also in the Philippines, Hawaii, Porto Rico, and Virgin Islands. A total of 57,370 women and girls learned to make a


The United States Public Health health nursing service would cost \$22.900 A00 annually, but would save a billion dollars in value of human life, earning power, and economic conservation. The American Red Cross, through its Public Health Nurses, of whom there were nearly 800 on duty the past year, is doing its part in meeting this requirement.

The Red Cross, through its nutrition Service, taught thousands what to eat for health. In this country, 24 Btates were served with from one to ten Red Cross Chapter nutrition programs in each State. In 38 States, nutrition instruction was given either through the regular nutrition instructors or through volunteer distitians. During the school year an average of 15,413 individuals a month, including parents, teachers, pre-school, and school children, were assisted to a better knowledge of food in its relation to health, and how to apply it to their daily lives. Reports describing icebergs sighted by ships plying the North Atlantic commonly go into detail as to whether the iceberg was "very high in the water" or "very low in the water," evidently under the impression that an iceberg, like a banana steamer, has a Plimsoll mark and rides high or low depending on the amount of cargo carried. This is all wrong. Icebergs, so far as we know, do not carry cargo, even though the refrigeration facilities are excellent. Furthermore, all icebergs ride alike, the part above water being 82-1000 of the

mass and the part below water 918-1000. Some bergs, naturally, are higher above water than others, but this is simply because some bergs

are bigger than others. The ratio between the part in the air and the part in the sea always remains the same. To see an iceberg in miniature and get an idea how the thing works, one has only to drop a lump of ice into a glass of water. This makes a small iceberg, and it behaves in exactly the same way as the biggest berg that ever came from Greenland.

Ludovico Dalferno, an engineer in Italy, is said to have discovered two new minerals containing silver, gold and platinum in a colloidal state. He named them dalfernite and aurrogummite. The minerals, he says, are abundant in Italy, and he can produce from them at a reasonable cost between 1 and 2 per cent of gold, 25 per cent silver and a considerable amount of platinum.
