LIVE STOCK NEWS

BEWARE CHOLERA IN BUYING HOGS

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The number of hogs purchased and brought to farms as stockers and for feeding purposes has increased considerably from year to year, according to official records. These hogs are bought from various sources, some of them locally from farmers, other through local dealers, but most of them are shipped from the large stock yards. Last year 468,207 hogs changed hands at such places. No records are available to show the number purchased locally for this purpose but it is safe to say that from all sources more than half a million feeder hogs were distributed to farms.

Following the severe outbreak of hog cholera in the fall of 1926, they were moved from officially supervised stock yards to farms, for restocking purposes, 400,355 hogs in six months. Some losses have been experienced by farmers in the purchase of stock hogs. In animals shipped from such stock yards the losses from various swine diseases have ranged from 3 to 7 per cent. Hogs purchased at stock yards where federal inspection is maintained are treated against hog cholera before shipping and the losses from that disease consequently have been low.

The danger of losses from hog cholera is greater in the hogs purchased from local dealers and at public sales. The feed lots, stock pens and yards through which these hogs are handled locally are usually infected, and a large portion of the animals handled there have not been immunized against hog cholera. The possibility of hogs contracting the disease at these points must not be overlooked.

All buyers of feeder hogs bringing such animals on their premises should have absolute knowledge, no matter from what source they buy, that the hogs have been treated against cholera. In the absence of proof that they have been so treated hogs bought locally should be given the preventive serum treatment as soon as they reach destination. Under no circumstance should newly purchased hogs be placed with the original herd on the farm. They should be kept separate for at least 21 days, regardless of origin of the shipment.

LIVE STOCK

HOG MEN SLIGHT AVAILABLE FEEDS

Almost every good hog farm grows legumes and either oats or barley, in addition to corn, and yet but very little attention is given to the proper utilization of these legumes and small-grain crops, as compared to the amount that is given to corn. R. A. Smith of the swine husbandry division, college of agriculture, University of Illinois, says:

"Legumes and some small-grain crops are a distinct part of the rotation on the hog farm and therefore merit more consideration when it comes to figuring on more economical pork production. Corn, of course, is the mainstay of the rotation both from the profit-producing standpoint, as well as from the standpoint of furnished feed for live stock. The legume crop is grown to furnish incidental pasture, but more especially to keep up the fertility of the soil. The small grain crop, such as oats and barley, is not in the rotation because of the profits produced but because such a crop aids in spreading out the workload providing a medium through which the legume crop may be started."

"These last two crops—the legume and small-grain—can play an important part in economical and profitable pork production if they are properly utilized. During the summer, for instance, hogs should always be fed on a good legume pasture. If a full grain ration is fed an additional protein supplement, such as tankage, skim milk or a mixture of tankage and linseed oil meal, should be given. A new use of the legume crop that has developed in the last few years is that of furnishing the clean pasture in the swine sanitation system. Such biennial legumes as red and sweet clover take care of this requirement very nicely but each have certain other disadvantages that cannot be overlooked. The danger of failing to get a stand and winter-killing is rather high with red clover. In addition, this crop lacks the carrying capacity of some of our other legumes. Sweet clover is lacking somewhat in palatability and gets very dry and woody during late summer.

"Alfalfa combines palatability and carrying capacity and gives splendid results when precautions are taken to fulfill the sanitation requirement. With the permanent alfalfa field this may be accomplished by fencing off a section of the field to use each year. A more satisfactory method of handling the legume problem is to use both alfalfa and biennial legumes. The pigs may be started on red or sweet clover and transferred to the old alfalfa pasture when three or four months old, at which time they will be large enough to resist serious infestation from the round worm.

"Under certain conditions annual pasture crops such as soy beans, and cowpeas, may be used to good advantage. Rape, although not a legume ranks very high as a hog pasture."

Milk and Tankage Good Protein Feed for Pigs

The Michigan experiment station recommends either skim milk or buttermilk as a protein feed for pigs on pasture. They have found that when corn is worth \$1 and \$1.50 per cwt skim milk is worth 28 and 42 cents, respectively. Buttermilk is worth just about the same as skim milk. Whey has about half the feeding value of skim milk.

Tankage will replace from three and a half to five and a half times as much corn when fed to swine. With pigs of 50 pounds they recommend that 1 pound of tankage be fed with about 6 pounds of corn; as the pig takes on weight the corn should be gradually increased until a weight of around 200 pounds. One pound of tankage should be fed with about 10 pounds of corn.

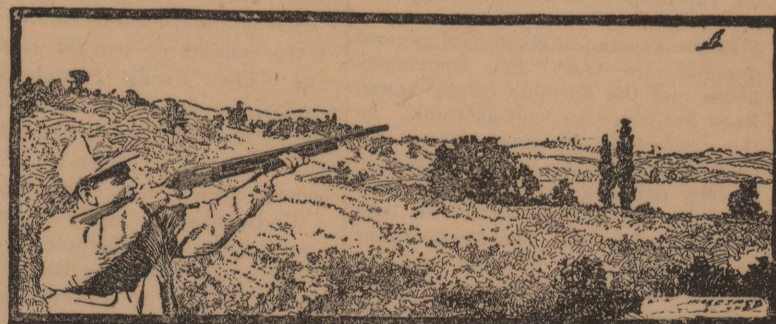

RAILWAYS SPEND \$1,600,000 ANNUALLY FOR MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES.

While to the public the railways generally appear only as an agency of transportation, information just compiled shows them a different light, as one of the largest customers of industry in the country, spending more than sixteen hundred million dollars annually for the materials and supplies used in their operation alone, in addition to their expenditures for new construction and new equipment. This total of more than \$1,600,000 annually covers every item required in the operation and maintenance of our transportation systems and represents purchased from practically every important line of industry in the United States.

Due both to lower price levels and to increasing efficiency and economy in railway operation, the total expenditures for operating materials and supplies have been materially reduced in recent years. In 1920, for example this total was in excess of two billion dollars, so the present annual rate of expenditure of around \$1,600,000 represents a reduction of approximately twenty per cent. Savings such as these are the only things which have made possible the general reductions in railway freight rates which have been made since 1920.

In 1920, thirty-three cents out of the carriers were spent for materials and supplies, while this figure has now been reduced to less than twenty-six cents.

TEXLINE—Approximately 140 tons of clay are shipped from Texline each week. The quality of the material is remarked upon wherever it is sent. Texline people are hoping to attract a clay products company here for manufacturing purposes.

PERRYTON — Perryton will serve as host to the first convention held by the newly formed "Trans-Canadian" district of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The district embraces a tier of ten counties in the north panhandle region of Texas. Fifty towns in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and New Mexico have been invited to send delegates, and at least 300 are expected.

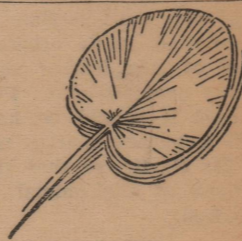

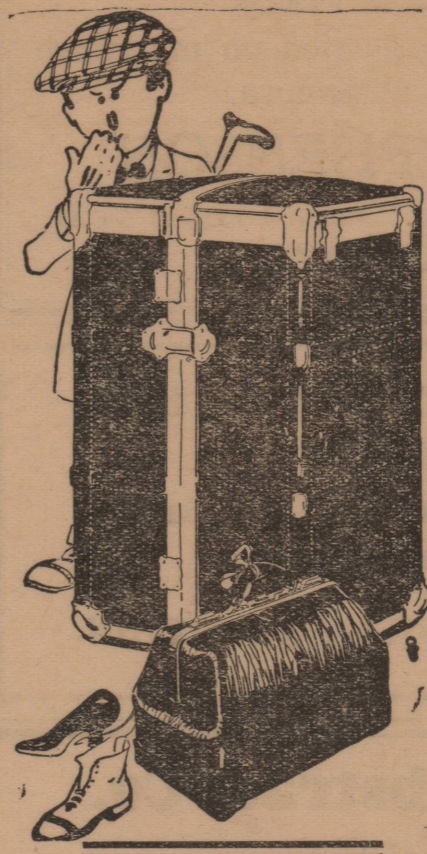

NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS,
CITY OF SONORA,
COUNTY OF SUTTON,

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Sonora, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED by the City Commission of the City of Sonora, Texas, that an election be held on the 15th day of October, 1927, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Commission of the City of Sonora, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Sonora, Texas, in the sum of Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00) payable serially within any given number of years not to exceed forty years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy taxes sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at maturity, said bonds being issued for the purpose of the construction of Sewers, within and for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925?"

The said election shall be held at Gilmore Hardware Co. Furniture Department in the City of Sonora, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to wit: Geo. J. Trainer, Sr., Mrs. R. A. Halbert, Mrs. Roy E. Aldwell, H. V. Stokes and Cecil Elliott, and the said Geo. J. Trainer, Sr. shall be presiding judge, and the said Mrs. R. A. Halbert and Mrs. Roy E. Aldwell shall be judges, and the said H. V. Stokes and Cecil Elliott shall be clerks at said election.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers shall be allowed to vote.

All voters desiring to support the proposition shall have written or printed upon their ballot the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER BONDS."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Sonora, and attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted at the Gilmore Hardware Co., Furniture Department, (the place designated for holding said election) and at two other public places in the City of Sonora all of said notices to be posted for at least thirty (30) full days prior to the date of election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in the Devil's River News, a newspaper of general circulation, published in said City, and which notice shall be published once each week for five consecutive weeks the date of the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) full days prior to the date of election.

Money saved in the first cost of a home is usually money spent later on in repairs, and frequently the initial savings are far less than the after costs for upkeep. The idea of a permanent construction appeals to far-seeing people because they realize that an investment of such importance and amount as that required to build a home should not be regarded lightly. They know the correct way to figure the cost of a home is over a span of years. On such a basis a concrete

home with tile roof, such as illustrated here, is a sound investment of money. Resale value is another factor that favors permanent construction. A run-down house is a slow seller and often can be transferred only at a great sacrifice. A well-built, fire-resistive and durable home is very apt to increase in value. It pays to build a home, but the largest dividends are enjoyed by those who build, not for present needs, but who build a home that is good at the end of the owner's lifetime.

Critical examination of this design reveals many pleasing features. The large front porch is desirable, and, being an open porch, it does not shut off light. Then there is a convenient side porch which permits ingress and egress without going way through the house. There is a generous provision of window openings, assuring light and ventilation to the last degree.

The interior room arrangement will satisfy the exacting. All the rooms on one floor is good practice because it means a saving of steps and time and added convenience for the entire household. The good-sized living room is given a cheerful touch with a fireplace. The dining room has five windows and is of ample size. Each of the two bedrooms adjoins the bath and the kitchen is nicely located in relation to the dining room. Having the icebox on the rear porch will be approved by most housekeepers.

Now, while this is a quality home built of quality materials, still it is not excessive in cost. Of course, any definite estimate on cost will have to be provided by the local dealer and builder. Prices vary in different sections of the country owing to freight rates and varying labor scales and the only practical way to approximate the cost of any building is by consulting the local source of supply, the dealer and builder. Or the builder may bid for the complete job, including labor and material.

It will be of material value in getting these figures to submit a working plan. Until the bidder has full, definite information before him he must do considerable guessing and to protect himself he is obliged to "guess" high, but with the working plan he can figure costs down to the smallest detail and make an absolute bid.

For permanency, beauty and reasonable cost this design stands forth as a most attractive and practical answer to the question, "How shall I build the new home?"

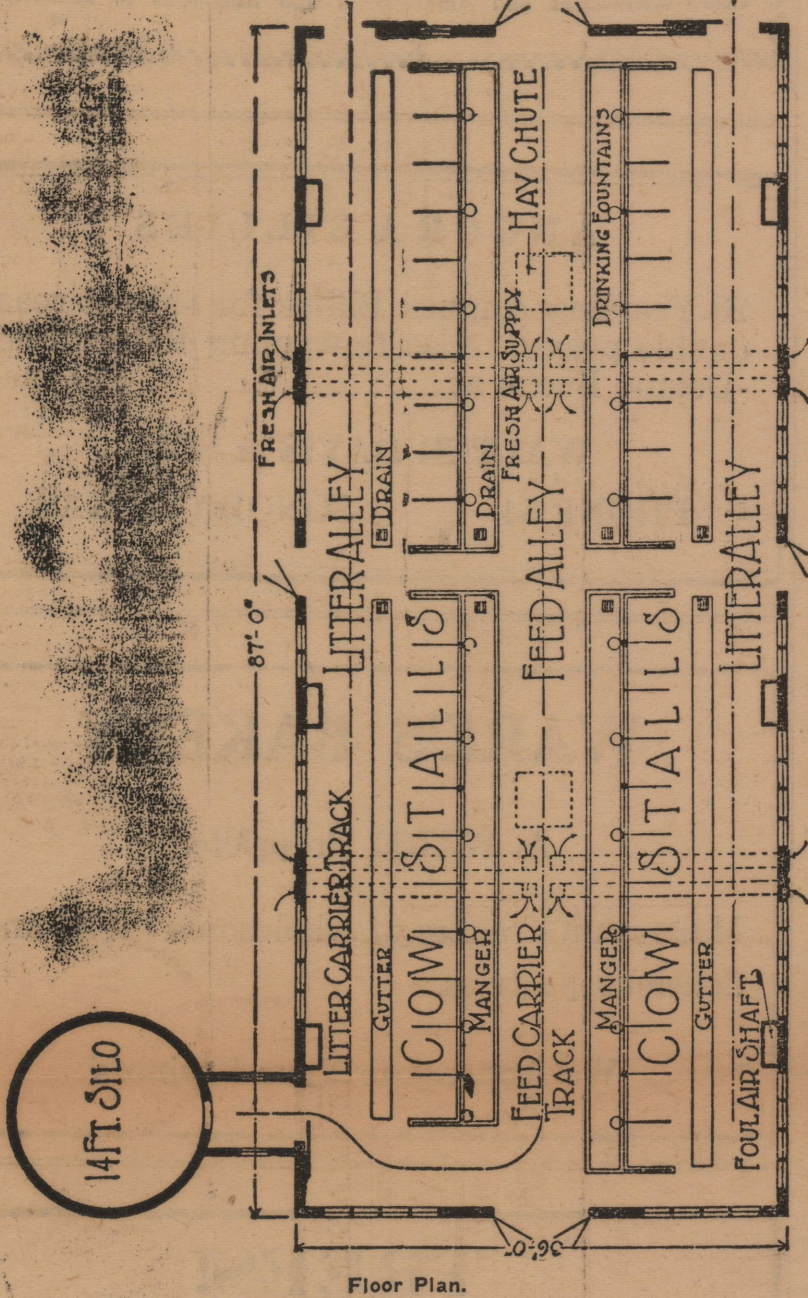
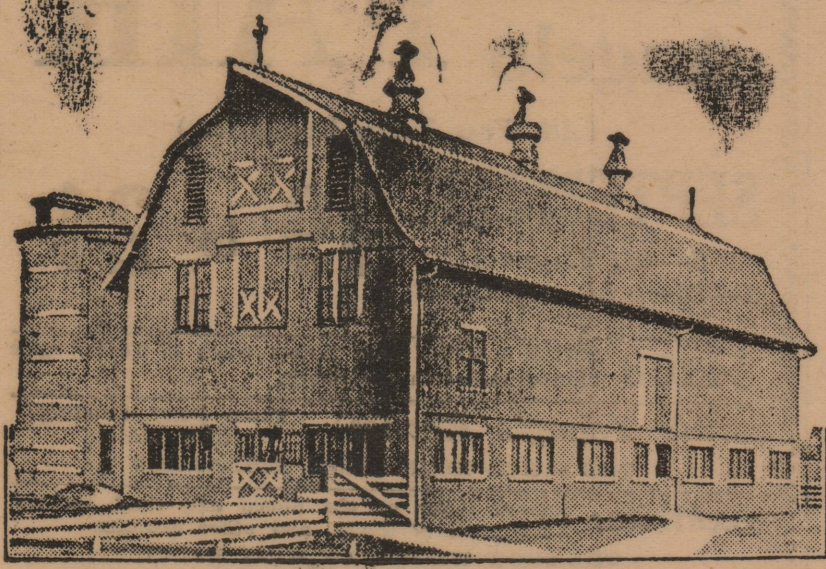

Cleanliness of Product and Health of Animals Provided for in Barn

So important is it that milk be produced in clean barns and by clean animals that several of the states have rather stringent laws on the subject. For instance, in Michigan no dairyman is allowed to house his cows and horses in the same building unless there is a tight wall between the two stables. The health departments of practically all municipalities inspect and exercise supervision over the sources of the milk that is supplied to the consumers.

Milk, undoubtedly, is the most easily contaminated of human foods. Milk, too, is the principal article of diet of children, whose delicate bodies and digestive apparatus are especially susceptible to disease germs. For these reasons, as well as for the protection of the community against germ diseases, city health departments pay particular attention to the quality of milk distributed within their limits.

Aside from care in handling milk after it is drawn from the cow—sterilization of containers, immediate cooling to take out the animal heat, and keeping the milk at a low temperature to prevent the ever present bacteria from multiplying—the stable in which the cow is maintained is an important consideration. The stable must be well ventilated; it must have as much sunshine within it as possible, and it must be kept clean, so that particles of dirt that may permeate the air will not get into the milk pail. This cannot be accomplished in a poorly constructed, ramshackle barn.

It is to secure cleanliness and health for the cows that the modern dairy barn has been designed. This type of barn was not made standard overnight—it is the result of study and experience. But now it is considered as near ideal as can be. A dairy barn of this design is shown in the accompanying illustration.

If the reader will closely study the illustration he will see that there are almost continuous rows of windows in the walls of the stable floor. These windows are of the proper height to admit sunshine during a greater part of the day to the litter alleys in the rear of the stalls. Sunshine is a germ killer; also it is a dispeller of moisture. The greater amount of sun-

shine that can be admitted the more sanitary will be the stable.

On the ridge of the roof of the barn are suction ventilators. These connect with foul-air shafts that lead from the stable. The action of the air in passing the ventilators creates a vacuum which draws the foul air out of the stable, at the same time drawing in fresh air. This continuous circulation keeps the air of the stable sweet and clean, which means healthy cows, and better milk.

The floor plans which accompany the exterior view of the building show how the interior of the barn is arranged. There are stalls for 43 cows, each cow having at the manger a bowl which is constantly filled with fresh water. Cows consume enormous quantities of water by taking small drinks frequently. A cow which is watered three or four times a day is not following her natural inclination; she wants a little at a time and that often.

The stable is so equipped that the work of caring for the cows may be done with the smallest possible amount of labor. Overhead both in the feeding alleys and the litter alleys there is a carrier track, on which either the feed truck or litter truck is run. This method of making it easy to remove the litter also promotes cleanliness as the work is less hard, which means it will be done more often.

The building itself is of frame construction, set on a concrete foundation. The building has excellent lines, which make it an attractive addition to the farm building group. Adjoining is a silo, wherein is stored the winter supply of chopped fresh corn and corn stalks, while above the stable is mow space for the roughage the animals will consume during the months they are confined indoors.

This is a barn that is weathertight, designed to house comfortably and keep healthy a good-sized herd of dairy cows. At the same time it will be noted that its dimensions are such that there is no waste space.
