BIGGER TEAMS TO INCREASE POWER

In general, the more power a man uses or directs at a profit, the greater will be his income, A. L. Young of the farm mechanics department, college of agriculture University of Illinois, points out in showing the value of large teams in farm work.

"There are, of course, practical limits to the amount of power that can be used profitably, and this amount will vary a great deal with the kind of work as well as with the man.

"If a farmer uses horses as his source of power when doing field work, he must, if he wants to make his own time or that of his helpers count for as much as possible, use reasonably large teams and implements. Certainly the man who uses six horses and plows between five and six acres a day, is making better use of his time than another man who uses two horses and plows two acres

"On some implements, and particularly on plows, it becomes necessary when using the larger sizes of teams, to hitch the horses in tandem. This must be done to avoid the side draft that exists when the horses are hitched abreast. With four horses abreast on a plow with two 14-inch bottoms there is usually from 18 to 22 inches of side draft, which is enough to cause both plow and horses to work at a great disadvantage.

"As a rule one will not want to use less than four horses in tandem. If these are used, two in front and two behind, on a two-bottom plow, they will probably have to be kept pretty well separated (from 44 to 52 inches, center to center of horse) to keep the line of pull on or near the line of draft. Five horses, two in front and three behind, with a distance of about 32 inches from center to center of horse, will pull two 14-inch bottoms lorses (preferably hitched three and three rather than two and four) can be used on a two-bottom plow without excessive side draft. As many as seven horses (hitched three and four)

"In a few cases Illinois farmers are using eight horses on three-bottom plows. This seems to be about as large a team as is practicable unless the team is strung out until there are three or possibly four or five horses in tandem. These very large teams, of from 12 to 20 horses, are being used to considerable extent in sections of the country where farms and fields are large. In the corn belt section it is the use of more five to eight-horse teams that should be emphasized."

#### Better Sheep as Result

of New Grading Process Grading and selling co-operatively has helped materially to improve the

live stock of Allegheny county, Virginia, according to information re ceived by the United States Depart ment of Agriculture from County Agent S. B. Surber. Referring to the grading and sale of sheep, Mr. Surber contrasts the old method with the new. "In the old way," he says, "it was the same price to everybody, but under the grading plan the best lambs bring the most money. Our farmers soon learned that if a neighbor had better lambs he received a higher check. This induced them to take notice of what neighbors were doing. It was not long before those with inferior breeding stock obtained better bucks and also gave their sheep the stomach-worm treatment. Briefly, grading has done a great deal toward increasing the use of better bucks and toward the better care of lambs."

The local association has been shipping about 4,000 lambs each year with satisfactory returns to owners.



Following the severe outbreak of hog cholera in the fall of 1926, ther were moved from officially supervise stock yards to farms, for restocking purposes, 400,355 hogs in six months Some losses have been experience by farmers in the purchase of stocke hogs. In animals shipped from such stock yards the losses from variou swine diseases have ranged from 3 t 7 per cent. Hogs purchased at stock yards where federal inspection i maintained are treated against ho cholera before shipping and the losse from that disease consequently have been low.

The danger of losses from hog chol era is greater in the hogs purchase from local dealers and at public sales The feed lots, stock pens and yard through which these hogs are handled locally are usually infected, and large portion of the animals handled there have not been immunized against hog cholera. The possibility of hogs contracting the disease s

IN BUYING HOGS

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The number of hogs purchased and brought to farms as stockers and for feeding purposes has increased consid erably from year to year, according to official records. These hogs are bought from various sources, some of them locally from farmers, others through local dealers, but most of them are shipped from the large stock yards. Last year 468,207 hogs changed hands at such places. No records are available to show the num

HOG MEN SLIGHT AVAILABLE FEEDS

Almost every good hog farm grows legumes and either oats or barley, ir addition to corn, and yet but very little attention is given to the proper utilization of these legumes and smallgrain crops, as compared to the amount that is given to corn, R. A. Smith of the swine husbandry divi sion, college of agriculture, University of Illinois, says.

"Leguines and some small-grain crops are a distinct part of the rota tion on the hog farm and therefore merit more consideration when it comes to figuring on more economical ork production. Corn, of course, b the mainstay of the rotation both from the profit-producing standpoint, as well as from the standpoint of fur aished feed for live stock. The legume crop is grown to furnish incidenta pasture, but more especially to keep ip the fertility of the soil. The small rain crop, such as oats and barley s not in the rotation because of the profits produced but because such a rop aids in spreading out the worl and providing a medium through which the legume crop may be started

"These last two crops-the legume end small-grain—can play an impor ant part in economical and profitable ork production if they are properly tilized. During the summer, for intance, hogs should always be fed on good legume pasture. If a full grain ation is fed an additional protein suplement, such as tankage, skim mill: or a mixture of tankage and linseed il meal, should be given. A new use of the legume crop that has developed n the last few years is that of furishing the clean pasture in the swine anitation system. Such biennial egumes as red and sweet clover take are of this requirement very nicely ut each have certain other disadvanages that cannot be overlooked. The langer of failing to get a stand and winter-killing is rather high with red clover. In addition, this crop lacks the carrying capacity of some of our other legumes. Sweet clover is lacking somewhat in palatability and gets very dry and woody during late sum-

"Alfalfa combines palatability and rying capacity and gives splendid results when precautions are taken to fulfill the sanitation requirement. With the permanent alfalfa field this may be accomplished by fencing off a section of the field to use each year. A more satisfactory method of handling the legume problem is to use both alfalfa and biennial legumes. The pigs may be started on red or sweet clover and transferred to the old alfalfa pasture when three or four months old, at which time they will be large enough to resist serious infes tation from the round worm.

"Under certain conditions annua" pasture crops such as soy beans, and cowpeas, may be used to good advan tage. Rape, although not a legume ranks very high as a hog pasture."

Milk and Tankage Good

Protein Feed for Pigs The Michigan experiment station recommends either skim milk or but termilk as a protein feed for pigs or pasture. They have found that when corn is worth \$1 and \$1.50 per cwt. skim milk is worth 28 and 42 cents respectively. Buttermilk is worth just about the same as skim milk Whey has about half the feeding value of skim milk.

Tankage will replace from three and a half to five and a half times as much corn when fed to swine. With pigs of 50 pounds they recommend that 1 pound of tankage be fed with about 6 pounds of corn; as the pig takes on weight the corn should be gradually increased until a weight of around 200 pounds. One pound of tankage should be fed with about 10 pounds of corn.





This is called umbilical hernia and causes grave concern to the owner; but happily it tends gradually to disappear as the foal grows and the abdomen increases in size. In some cases, however, the rupture increases in size and then requires an operation for its removal. To hasten disappearance of a small navel rupture tincture of iodine may be applied two or three times a week

Some owners prefer to blister the part with cantharidine ointment or dilute acid, while others contrive a truss of sole leather to press constantly upon the part. For a truss to succeed it should be kept in place with a harness partly made of suspender elastic, so that the breathing motions of the animal will not be

# SHEEP PAY BEST

When kept under proper conditions, no farm animal pays better than sheep, and there is new interest in the animals now as shown by the fact that nearly every breeder in North Carolina has sold out his supply of

"The fact that sheep produce both a crop of lambs and a crop of wool adds greatly to their value and significance on the farm," says R. S. Curtis of the animal husbandry department of the North Carolina State college. "The wool from a good sheep will pay for its keep, especially where the necessary feed is produced on the farm. In most cases from 20 to 40 sheep is a sufficient number for the average farm. There is usually enough pasture going to waste to supply such a small flock of sheep during the pasture season, and it is easy to make provision for the win-

Mr. Curtis states that sheep are not so different from other farm animals. The two most serious problems before the sheep grower are the roaming dog and the active stomach worm. The latter may be overcome by a change in pastures and the use of the bluestone treatment, while the dog may be frustrated by the use of corrals at night. Placing the sheep in the corrals is one of the necessary farm chores in good sheep practice.

"Other than these two things, the growing of sheep is a pleasant, satisfying and profitable job which most any member of the family may have in charge," says Mr. Curtis. "The flock may be built up by using a purebred ram on a flock of common grade ewes, and any farmer can follow this plan with little initial or subsequent cost. A net profit of \$320 per year can be secured from a flock of 30 sheep, according to actual demonstre

Sheep are much less troubled with lice, possibly for the reason that they are regularly dipped to rid them of

Hogs are notoriously subject to infestation by sucking lice, especially in old, insanitary houses.

Grooming cattle with raw linseed oil on a hard brush has been recommended as a sure method of ridding them of lice.

If possible keep the ewe and lamb in a separate pen for a few days after lambing. If each ewe cannot be kept in a separate pen, only those having lambs at about the same time should be kept together.

Previous lamb-feeding results had indicated that oats was not equal to corn for the fattening process, but in this case, with cottonseed meal added to the ration, very satisfactory results were ob-

> The lambs fed on oats and cotton-The owner returned to Sonora seed meal gained 1.2 pounds more in and clover hay were fed in addition to the other feeds named. It has been definitely demonstrated that a legume hay is essential in feeding lambs on the dry lot, although the amount fed may be small. Two feeds of clover hay every five days are enough to keep the lambs in good condition, according to the results of this experiment. Compared with the lot fed clover hay daily, the lot receiving a limited amount of this feed made cheaper gains and finished just as well. The oats lot required less hay than the corn lot.

#### Pigs Need Special Care Immediately After Born

In discussing the care of pigs newly born, Professor Morton of the Colorado Agricultural college says: "Pigs as soon as the weather will permit, and the sow should be compelled to come some distance for her feed, so that she will keep up her exercise. If she starts eating pigs at birth or shortly after, it is probably due to extreme constipation, and feverish condition as a result of improper feeding or lack of exercise. A dose of salts will do much more good than feeding raw pork or meat of any kind.

"Where a sow has too many pigs some of them may be transferred to another sow, as many as she can handle, provided this is done within a few days after the sow with the smaller number has farrowed, so that the extra pigs put upon her can develop teats for themselves.

So important is it that milk be produced in clean barns and by clean animals that several of the states have rather stringent laws on the subject. For instance, in Michigan no dairyman is allowed to house his cows and horses in the same building unless there is a tight wall between the two stables. The health departments of practically all municipalities inspect and exercise supervision over the sources of the milk that is supplied to the consumers.

Milk, undoubtedly, is the most easily contaminated of human foods. Milk, too, is the principal article of diet of children, whose delicate bodies and digestive apparatus are especially susceptible to disease germs. For these reasons, as well as for the protection of the community against germ diseases, city health departments pay particular attention to the quality of "ilk distributed within their limits,

Aside f. m care in handling milk after it is drawn from the cow-sterilization of containers, immediate cooling to take out the animal heat, and keeping the milk at a low temperature to prevent the ever present bacteria from multiplying—the stable in which the cow is maintained is an important consideration. The stable must be well ventilated; it must have as much sunshine within it as possible, and it must be kept clean, so that particles of dirt that may per-meate the air will not get into the milk pail. This cannot be accomplished in a poorly constructed, ramshackle barn.

It is to secure cleanliness and health for the cows that the modern dairy barn has been designed. This type of barn was not made standard overnight-it is the result of study and experience. But now it is considered as near ideal as can be. A dairy barn of this design is shown in

the accompanying illustration. If the reader will closely study the illustration he will see that there are almost continuous rows of windows in the walls of the stable floor. These windows are of the proper height to admit sunshine during a greater part of the day to the litter alleys in the rear of the stalls. Sunshine is a germ killer; also it is a dispeller of mois-

shine that can be admitted the more

sanitary will be the stable. On the ridge of the roof of the barn are suction ventilators. These connect with foul-air shafts that lead from the stable. The action of the air in passing the ventilators creates a vacuum which draws the foul air out of the stable, at the same time drawing in fresh air. This continuous circulation keeps the air of the stable sweet and clean, which means healthy


cows, and better milk. The floor plans which accompany the exterior view of the building show how the interior of the barn is arranged. There are stalls for 43 cows. each cow having at the manger a bowl which is constantly filled with fresh water. Cows consume enormous quantities of water by taking small drinks frequently. A cow which is watered three or four times a day is not following her natural inclination; she wants a little at a time and that often.

The stable is so equipped that the work of caring for the cows may be done with the smallest possible amount of labor. Overhead both in the feeding alleys and the litter alleys there is a carrier track, on which either the feed truck or litter truck is run. This method of making it easy to remove the litter also promotes cleanliness as the work is leshard, which means it will be done more often. The building itself is of frame con-

struction, set on a concrete founda tion. The building has excellent lines, which make it an attractive ad dition to the farm building group. Adjoining is a silo, wherein is stored the winter supply of chopped fresh corn and corn stalks, while above the stable is mow space for the roughage the animals will consume during the months they are confined indoors. This is a barn that is weathertight. designed to house comfortably and keep healthy a good-sized herd of dairy cows. At the same time it will be noted that its dimensions are such that there is no waste space.


