the ability to apply it through Handling food safely on existing irrigation equipment, requiring only minimal purchase to pump from the lagoon to the center pivot, Park

Both the anhydrous and beef manure require the purchase of application machinery, he said, which adds a fixed cost. Because of that cost, beef manure application costs were higher than swine, at \$30.52, \$35.47 and \$47.19 per acre, respectively at the same rate.

Beef manure, however, becomes a more economical choice if the crops are located away from the originating farm of either manure, Park said. While swine effluent has a lower breakeven price, it is too bulky to transport offfarm to other producers.

"The breakeven is figured by using the actual price of corn plus the cost of fertilizer," he said. "During this study, there was a widening margin in the breakeven between the animal manure-treated corn crops and anhydrous ammonia-treated corn crops, which generated an increased profitability for producers and increased the economic viability of marketing beef manure as a commercial fertilizer."

Park explained if beef manure averages \$2.20 per ton with a shipping cost of 50 cents per mile, it can be prof-

itably transported up to 29 miles from its point of origin in the Oklahoma and Texas panhandles and be competitive with high anhydrous ammonia prices, as experienced from 2005-2007.

Another benefit of animal manures is the improvement of soil properties such as micronutrients and soil pH, Park said. Throughout his experiment the beef-manure and swine-effluent plots maintained higher soil pH levels than the corresponding anhydrous plots.

Additionally, continued application of anhydrous can lead to acidification and thus losses in productivity, he said. Appropriate nutrient-management practices should be implemented to prevent environmental damages.

Park also warned that sitespecific conditions such as weather, animal waste management practices and soil properties would need to be taken into consideration when adapting this information to locations outside the Oklahoma Panhandle.

"This is a unique economic study on various nitrogen fertilizers using rare and valuable data from a long-term field experiment from 1995 to 2007," Park said. "The next step is to determine best nutrient practices based on this experimental data."

**Texas Forest Service** Deploys Incident Management Teams to South Texas for Tropical Storm Alex

Texas Forest Service is sending nearly 50 emergency responders to South Texas in preparation for Tropical Storm Alex, which is expected to make landfall as a hurricane early Wednesday morning.

The agency has mobilized one Type 3 All-Hazard Incident Management Team and placed on standby two additional teams that have been assigned to Rapid Response Task Forces Task Force Austin and Task Force Texas.

"We're working with all our agency partners and private partners to provide a coordinated state response to the Valley in the aftermath of what we believe will make landfall as Hurricane Alex," said Texas Forest Service State Incident Management Team Coordinator Bob Koenig.

Trained and operated by Texas Forest Service, the Type 3 All-Hazard Incident Management Teams are made up of local emergency responders from across the state. When deployed, they work with local officials, providing command and leadership support to communities in need of help following a di-

Generally, the teams are tasked with tracking resources in different counties, operating resource distribution points and staging areas or providing support for public information. When assigned to a task force, the teams provide operational and logistical support for the group such as coordinating transportation conveys and operational briefings.

Two additional Texas Forest Service employees — a regional fire coordinator from Gilmer, Texas, and a resource specialist from Pittsburg, Texas — also were deployed Monday to McAllen, where they'll be embedded with the District Disaster Chair, the regional coordinator for the disaster response.

The storm is expected to make landfall Wednesday morning on the extreme northeast coast of Mexico, possibly near the mouth of the Rio Grande River or just south of South Padre, according to National Weather Service meteorologist Tom Bradshaw.

Currently a tropical storm, Alex is forecast to become a hurricane within the next 24 hours as it hovers over the warm Gulf Coast waters.

As a result, heavy rain, flash flooding and hurricane force winds are predicted for South Texas, Bradshaw said during a statewide emergency response conference call on Monday morning. Up to 12 inches of rain is expected between Wednesday and Friday with up to 16 inches in isolated areas. Coastal flooding also is predicted with the storm surge expected to rise six to eight feet — and possibly up to 12 feet near South Padre.

"The bottom line is: it's certainly going to produce adverse affects for South Texas," Bradshaw said.

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

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
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## The Philosophy of America:

July 2nd, America's First Independence Day

We celebrate Independence Day on the anniversary of the day when Continental Congress approved the Declaration of Independence. Since the document had actually been released earlier, founding father John Adams suggested July 2nd as a day on which future generations would celebrate with guns, bonfires, and other things.

The First Fireworks

The first celebrations involved rockets not fireworks. At the Philadelphia celebration in 1777, they fired thirteen rockets to represent the thirteen colonies.

Fourth of July Was Not Universally Celebrated The new Americans did not all celebrate the Fourth of July. During the 1770s and 1780s, the holiday was not celebrated in all American towns. In fact, many of the states had made their own independent declarations after the Continental Congress approved the Declaration of the Independence. They used their own words and language to declare their break as colonies from England.

Declaration of Independence Facts

Here are a few interesting facts about the Declaration of Independence. Many founding fathers signed the Declaration of Independence in August not July. The Declaration of Independence spent the war at Fort Knox.

Other Important American Events Occurring on July 4th

Many other important American events occurred on the Fourth of July: In 1803, the Louisiana Purchase was announced to the American people. In 1817, construction of the Erie Canal begins. New York abolishes slavery on July 4,1827. Thoreau begins to live at Walden Pond in 1845. The Siege of Vicksburg ends in 1863 on the Fourth of July. President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Freedom of Information Act in 1966. Famous Americans born on July 4th include writer Nathaniel Hawthorne, songwriter Stephen Foster, James Bailey of circus fame, filmmaker Louis B. Mayer, advice columnists Ann Landers and Abigail Van Buren.
