Alfred "Mac" Gilliat, Jr. passed away on Sunday, April 25, 2010, in Leakey, TX at the age of 67. He was born on November 1, 1942, in San Antonio, TX to Alfred McDonald, Sr. and Elizabeth Gilliat. He is preceded in death by his parents.

Mac was raised in Boerne and graduated from Boerne High School. Mac graduated from Texas A&M University and was proud of his Aggie heritage. He served in the US Army in the late 60's. Mac was a retired County Extension Agent-AG for Baylor and Real counties where he werved from 1968-1995. He served as a Director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association from 1985-2007. He served as Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent at the San Antonio, San Angelo and Hill Country District Junior Livestock Shows in the Sheep and Goat Shows. Mac worked at the State 4-H Horse Show starting in 1968 through 2009. Mac was honored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association as Outstanding County Extension Agent-AG in 1987. He received the TEMA Distinguished Service Award in 1991. He was a life member of the Texas Pecan Growers Association. He received the Man of the Year in Agriculture Award in 2009. He was an advisor, mentro and friend to every county agent across the state. He also enmiss his Dutch oven cooking.

was amazed by the breadth of knowledge and skill available through the Borlaug Institute," Buffett said. "When I see people who've actually had their hands in the dirt, I know that's how the answers will come, not by politicians and bureaucrats who've never been involved in agriculture."

What both of them realized is that little has been done to help foster conflict resolution so that a nation's agriculture industry can produce food and fiber for its people and thus grow a healthy population and economy.

Shortly after returning to the U.S., the two came to an agreement. The Howard G. Buffett Foundation has given \$1.5 million to Texas AgriLife Research and the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Texas A&M University to establish a teaching and research program to explore how conflict is affected by agriculture and natural resource management.

The gift, made to the Texas A&M Foundation, will establish the Howard G. Buffett Foundation Chair in Conflict and Development.

"This gift helps us achieve our goal of international outreach," said Dr. Mark Hussey, vice chancellor and dean of agriculture and life sciences for Texas A&M AgriLife. "The world will learn much to benefit impoverished and hungry people in the areas of conflict as a result of this effort."

"This new effort will promote scholarship and understanding of how conflict is affected by the development of resources such as agriculture," said Price.

That's important because 34 of the world's poorest countries and 11 middle-income countries were affected by fragility and conflict as of October 2009, according to the World Bank, which also estimated that 1 billion people ting something going in agrilive in those places.

"The area of conflict and development is something we've been interested in for a long time," he said.

The funds will be used toward programs and graduate student fellowships with initial efforts in Afghanistan. Buffet's foundation is also building a separate agricultural facility for an Afghan many of them are due to fununiversity.



# An open letter about proposed transmission lines

fter 18 months of detailed planning, two sets of open houses, A numerous discussions with landowners, and meetings with elected officials at the local, state, and federal levels, LCRA Transmission Services Corporation (LCRA TSC) is filing the largest application to build a transmission line in its history. This case is not only unprecedented in size and scope for LCRA TSC, but also for the Hill Country, the area LCRA has served for many years.

Throughout this process, but particularly over the last few months, LCRA TSC has made every effort to listen to the concerns of people in the Hill Country. We have tried to address and incorporate their wishes with our legal duty to address the statutory and regulatory routing criteria and mandates with which we must comply.

We understand that landowners potentially affected by these lines will have strong feelings about whether the lines should be built at all, and if so, whether they should be routed along the routes

proposed by LCRA TSC in this filing.

However, it is also important to understand that construction of these lines is a state mandate. LCRA TSC has not only been assigned the lines to construct, but also assigned the start and end points for the lines themselves. As a result, there are only so many corridors through which these lines can

We received more feedback on this project than any other:

be built. Nonetheless, LCRA TSC has proposed more than 75 different routes (composed of segments that produce more than 20,000 possible routes) in an effort to give the Public Utility Commission (PUC) as many reasonable choices as possible.

Does that mean all the residents in the Hill Country will be happy with LCRA TSC's proposed routes? No, and we understand that. Unfortunately, that scenario is an inescapable element of any

application to build transmission lines.

Having said that, I can assure you that LCRA TSC has strived to incorporate in this filing what we heard from people in the Hill Country. We have also tried to learn from recent cases decided by the Commission. For example, in this application you will find more focused efforts to route the transmission lines along parcel or property lines. In addition, LCRA TSC is committed to continuing our dialogue with landowners after this application is filed.

Perhaps as important as any issue raised by folks in the Hill Country is the question of single pole structures, known as monopoles. The one common request we hear from potentially affected people is, "If you have to construct these lines, can you use monopoles?" The answer to that question is "yes"; however, the PUC assigned LCRA TSC these projects largely on the basis of the cost information we provided. That cost information was based on using lattice towers, which were (and remain) the most cost-effective and efficient transmission structures. Given that history, we felt it would not be right to completely eliminate lattice towers in this application.

What you will find in LCRA TSC's application is a thorough. description and discussion of the costs associated with types of monopoles (i.e., steel, spun concrete, and tower pole), as well as cost information for all the route segments. LCRA TSC has continued to work with our pole suppliers to narrow the cost difference between lattice towers and other structures, like monopoles. The suppliers' progress is encouraging

The bottom line is that while LCRA TSC has recommended lattice towers on the basis of cost and efficiency, we stand ready, willing, and able to construct any route using whatever structures, including monopoles.

I hope everyone takes the opportunity provided by the PUC to participate actively in this case. It is our hope to present routes to the Commission that have landowner support. I realize that may not be possible in every instance; however, LCRA TSC staff will be working diligently to reach this goal whenever possible.
