

# The Sutton County Arena Looks To Its Future:

Through the Strength of Its Past



Tommy Love continues to lay the foundation for the rodeo arena.

Most of us that enjoy the annual Sonora Outlaw Pro Rodeo assume that it is nothing more than dirt, horses, and leather. The few that compete in the event see it is an expression of skill, work, and sacrifice. To the men and women who work tirelessly on the renovations and upkeep of the Sutton County Rodeo Arena it is much more than that. These people see that structure of metal and wood as a reflection of a culture and the definition of community, and their role with it as stewards. To them the arena serves as a memorial in time for a community that has never waited for assistance, rather it simply joined up and did what needed to be done. Within that group of dedicated stewards no one person seeks recognition but each one deserves it, and nobody deserves it more than Tommy Love.

I met up with Tommy under a shade tree by the rodeo arena where he is helping to get it ready for Sutton County Days on August 13th. The conversation began with a statement by Lee Bloodworth, "I bet you won't find a weld or joint of pipe out here that Tommy Love has not

Tommy was quick to point out that a lot of people helped with the arena over the years, but when I asked him if he helped build the arena he laughed and said, "about 99 and 9 tenths of it. I remember when Claire called me and said Micky wants to talk to you. Micky [Powers] told me he needed some help-so that's when we redesigned it to fit into the PRCA standards. Micky and I could get things done. For some reason we could just work together and he had some real good ideas, but I did redesign the loading shoots and all that area by myself."

It may have taken a few torch bearers to keep the arena over the years, but as Tommy recalls it has always been the community that has stepped up to rekindle the flame. "It's like that chain link fence out there. We put all the posts up and we were stretching that stuff out and we realized one night that a come along and bar is not what you need. You need a bunch of people scattered along that line with their fingers in it. They would stretch it out and we would tie it to the posts that worked better than

Just like the arena he helped build Tommy always feels the need to look to the future and to keep doing what needs to be done. That is one reason why Tommy keeps working on the ranch.

"Why do I stay working on the ranch all the time? I could be working for the oil field making a lot more. If a rancher ever says he's caught up on work then he isn't doing a good job. I have a million things I could be doing right now and I like that."

To a microwave safe or heat toler- of chile peppers. Make sure the roasted chiles are placed in a food grade plastic bag (not a trash bag), or other food-safe container. Promptly transport chiles home in a chilled ice chest. Divide into small batches for quick cooling. If roasted peppers are not chilled and frozen in a timely manner, bacteria can grow and become dormant during freezer storage. Once the peppers thaw, the bacteria can revive and cause a foodborne illness.

> Freeze chiles to 0 degrees F. or below immediately after packing. Put no more food into the home freezer than will freeze within 24 hours (2 to 3 lbs of food for each cubic foot of freezer space). Leave a little space between packages for proper air circulation. For best quality use peppers within 1 year.


