The Sonora Lady Broncos utilized the fifteen run rule after three innings on Tuesday at home. The umpires declared the game over in the bottom of the fourth inning when the twentieth Lady Bronco crossed the plate. The final score was 20-5.

Sonora got three runs on three hits in the first inning off losing pitcher, Valaz, including a two run home run by Alexa Sykes. Jill Buitron had a two run double in the second inning to make the score 5-2. In the third, Sonora's batters pounded Valaz for six runs on seven hits. The final blow came in the fourth inning when eleven Lady Broncos came to bat. The scoreboard flashed with eight runs on five base hits and three Lady Owl errors.

Senior Kylie Love was the winning pitcher. She had two strike-

outs, gave up four hits and only faced seventeen batters. The following Lady Broncos had three hits in the victory: Sykes, Buitron, Tori Guerrero, Shea Holmes, and Lydia Rodriguez.

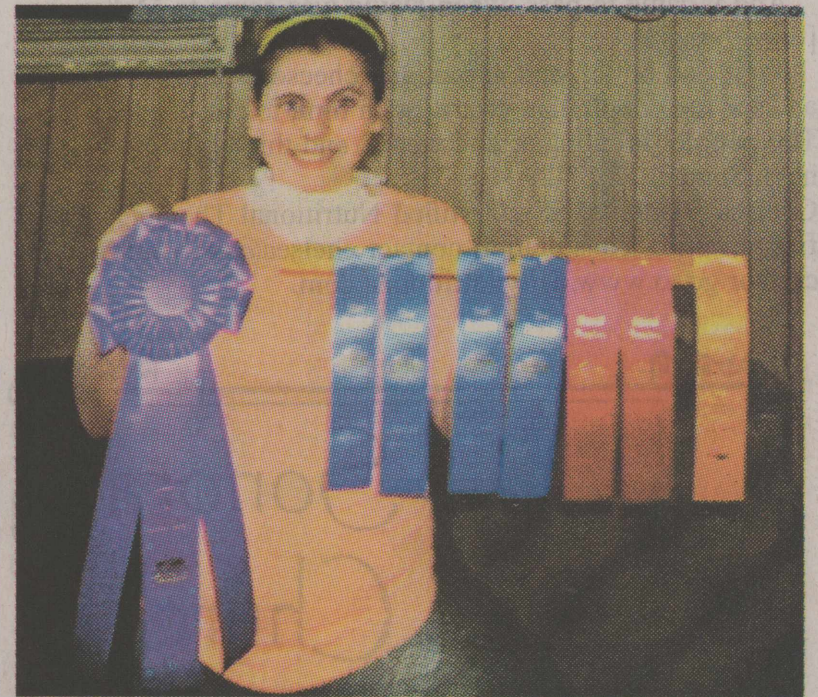

No New Positives Found in 2013-14 Trans Pecos CWD Surveillance

AUSTIN – Nearly 300 tissue samples were collected from hunter harvested deer and elk from the Trans Pecos ecoregion during the 2013-14 season to test for Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). Over the last two hunting seasons upwards of 600 deer and elk have been tested for CWD, thanks to the cooperation of hunters and landowners who have participated in the state's hunter check stations.

"Undoubtedly without the hunter check stations, and hunter and landowner participation, we would know very little about the prevalence of the disease or where it exists," said Mitch Lockwood, Big Game Program Director with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

To date, 617 deer and elk have been tested through the CWD check stations and strategic sampling that occurred during the summer of 2012; 215 were in the Containment Zone, 172 were in the adjacent High Risk Zone, 57 were in the Buffer Zone, and 173 were outside of the CWD zones. Forty five of the samples tested from the Containment Zone were from deer harvested in the Hueco Mountains.

"Additional sampling is necessary to develop more confidence in the geographic extent and prevalence of the disease, but the fact that CWD has not been detected in Texas outside of the Hueco Mountains of northern El Paso and Hudspeth counties is encouraging," said Lockwood.

Including the positives reported from last year's sampling effort, and the three positives reported by New Mexico Game and Fish in 2012, CWD has been detected in 9 of 49 deer sampled in the Hueco Mountains.

CWD is a member of the group of diseases called transmissible spongiform encephalopathies (TSEs). Other diseases in this group include scrapie in sheep, bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE or mad cow disease) in cattle, and Cruetzfeldt-Jakob disease in humans. CWD among cervids is a progressive, fatal disease that commonly results in altered behavior as a result of microscopic changes made to the brain of affected animals. An animal may carry the disease for years without outward indication, but in the latter stages, signs may include listlessness, lowering of the head, weight loss, repetitive walking in set patterns, and a lack of responsiveness. CWD is not known to affect humans or livestock.

There is no vaccine or cure for CWD, but steps have been taken to minimize the risk of the disease spreading from beyond the area where it currently exists. TPWD and Texas Animal Health commissions adopted rules to restrict movement of deer, elk, and other susceptible species within or from the CWD Zones as well increase surveillance efforts.



NEWSPAPER ARTICLE: Know Your Forbs

With spring green-up under way, there are quite a few range plants trying to make a stand. It is a good time to learn some of these plants and what they have to offer. Texas croton and Upright prairie coneflower are two common plants we're likely to find. Let's take a quick look at these.

Like the other native, annual crotons, Texas croton (*Croton texensis*) has a distinctive aroma when the leaves are crushed. Its height can vary from 1 to 4 feet, depending on rainfall.

The leaves are grayish to yellowish green and may be lighter on top and darker underneath. Each leaf is attached to the stem by a small stalk called a petiole.

The flowers are arranged in spikes at the ends of the stems. The fruit of Texas croton is a capsule divided into three segments supporting three individual seeds. Texas croton produces a seed crop that is very valuable to dove, quail and other seed-eating birds but has low value for livestock grazing.

Upright prairie coneflower

(*Ratibida columnifera*) is a native, warm-season perennial in the Sunflower family. It is a common weed and wildflower of roadsides, parks, vacated lands and managed pastures.

This hairy-stemmed plant reproduces from seed or short underground stems. The stems grow from 12 to 40 inches tall and branch near the top. The leaves lobe into distinct segments that are long, narrow and pointed.

The flowers are attached at the end of slender stems. Each has yellow to brownish petals and a dark brown center that can be 1 inch long. Due to its appearance, it is also known as Mexican hat.

Upright prairie coneflower provides good grazing for wildlife and poor grazing for livestock.

There are many good resources for finding out about plants and their value. One good source is Texas AgriLife Extension's "Plants of Texas Rangelands". Visit the site at <http://essmextension.tamu.edu/plants> and you can learn about brush and weeds, grasses, or toxic plants.
